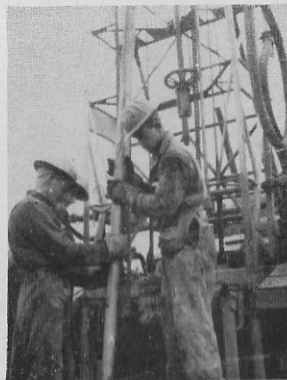

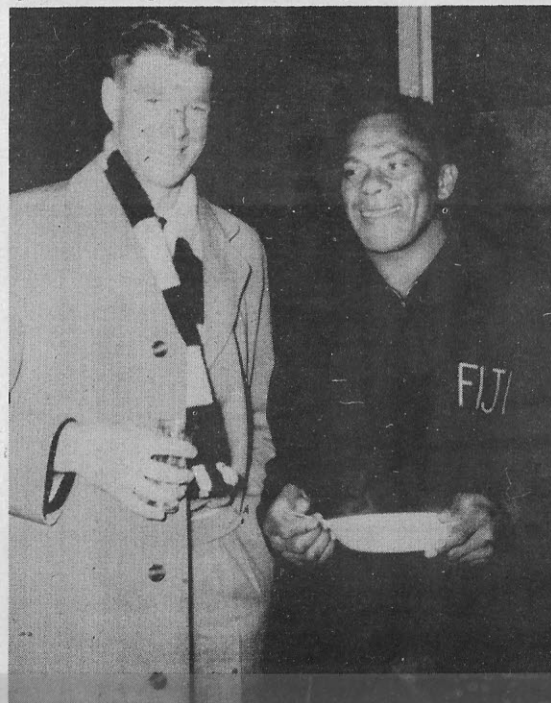

## The Giants from Fiji

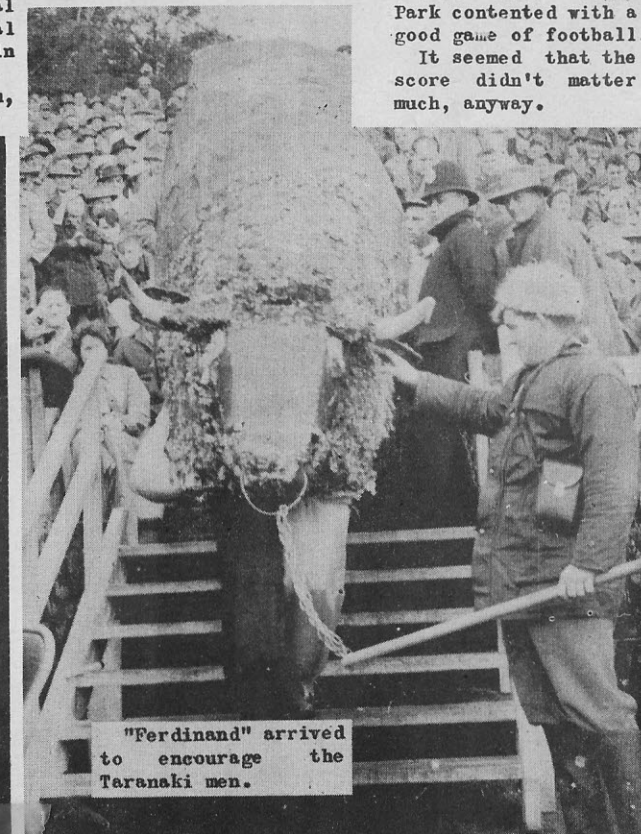
A group of smiling, singing, Rugby-playing giants from Fiji stepped off a plane at Bell Block airport — straight into the hearts of the people of Taranaki.

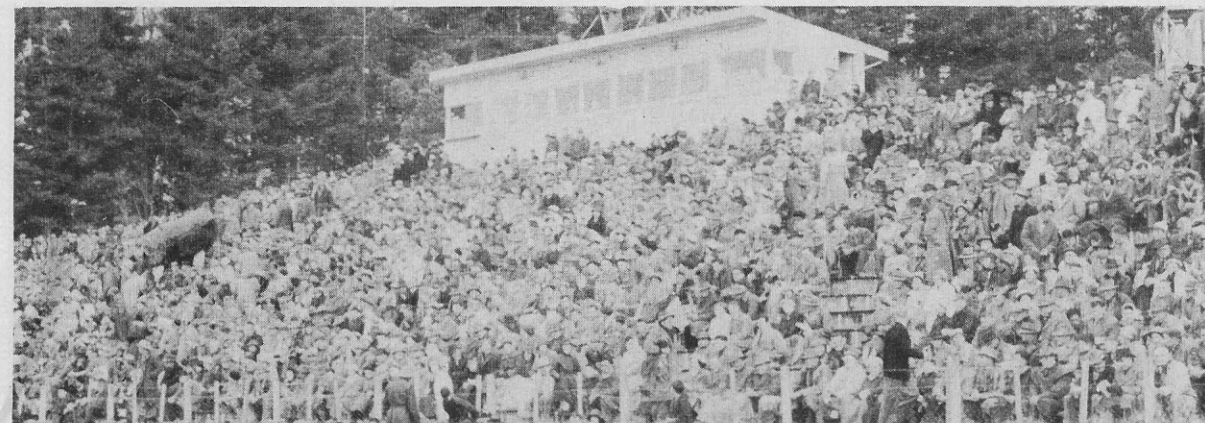

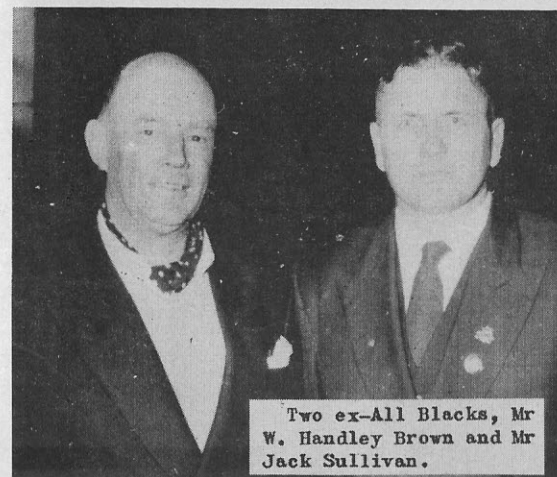

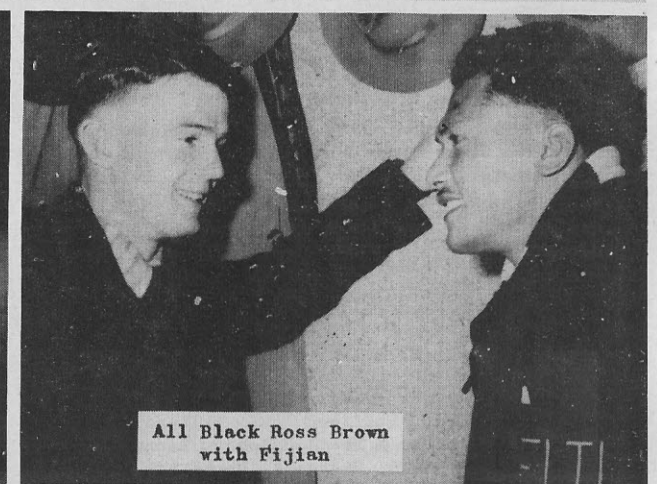

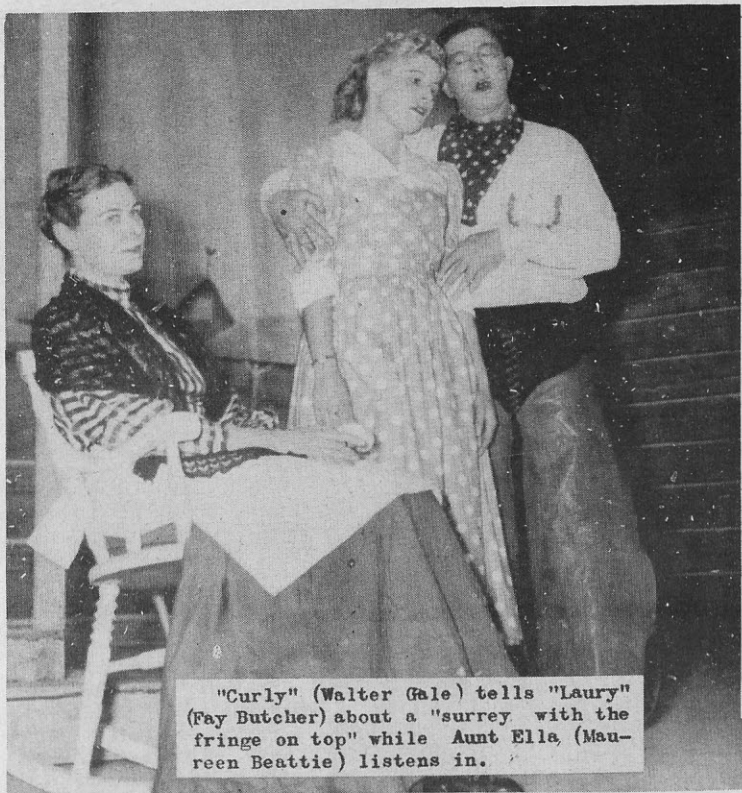

The Stratford Repertory and Amateur Operatic Society has done it again.

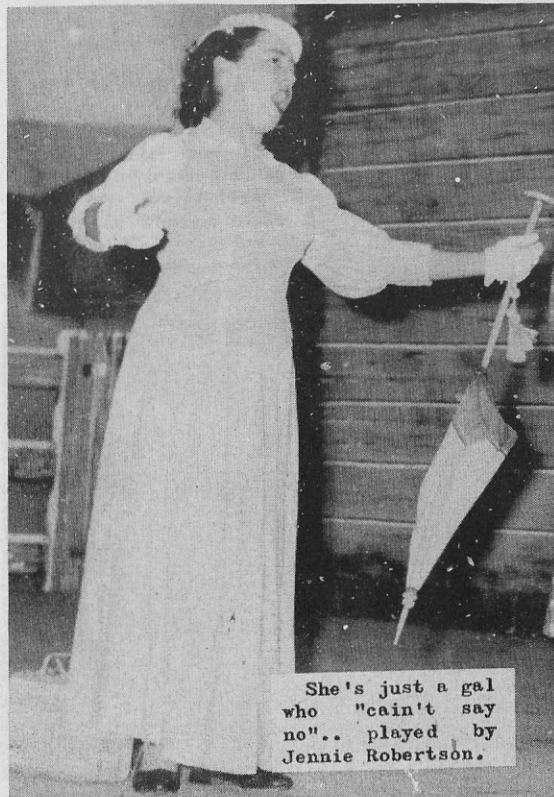

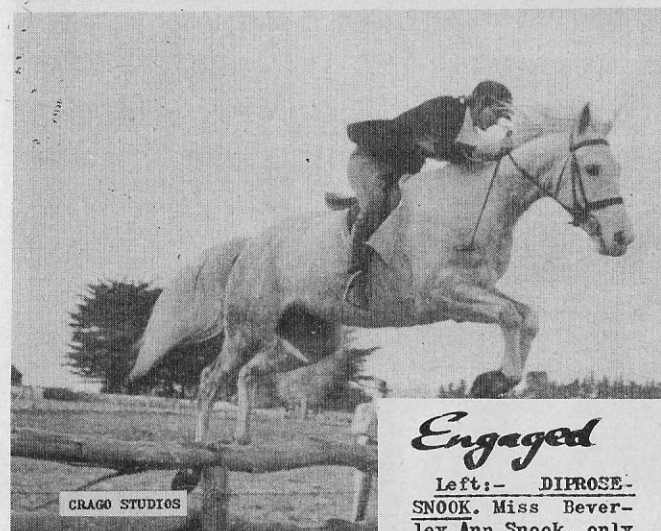

## FIRE IN BLUE CHEESE FACTORY

Fire which swept through the N.Z. Rennet Company's factory in Bridge St., Eltham, last month destroyed more than £12,000 worth of stock.

A storage building was almost completely destroyed, along with the company's blue-vein cheese manufacturing plant.

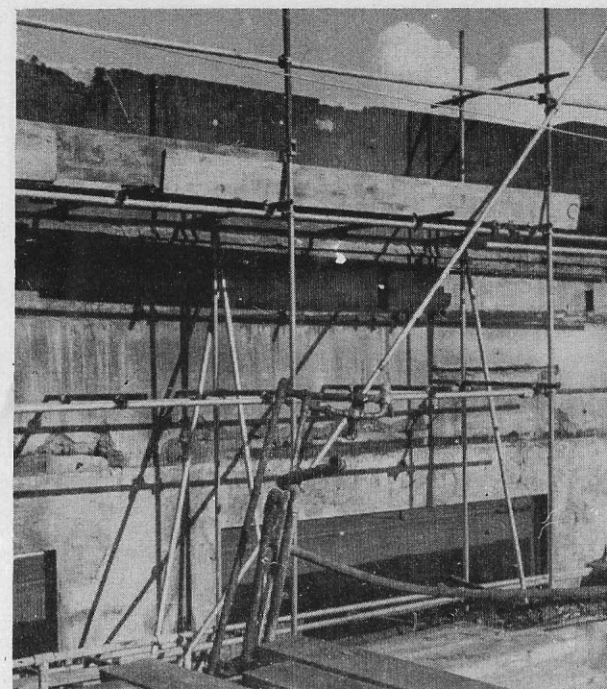
Eight thousand blue-vein cheeses; each weighing 7lb., were also lost.

The company is the only one in N.Z. making blue-vein cheese, and production will not resume for several months.

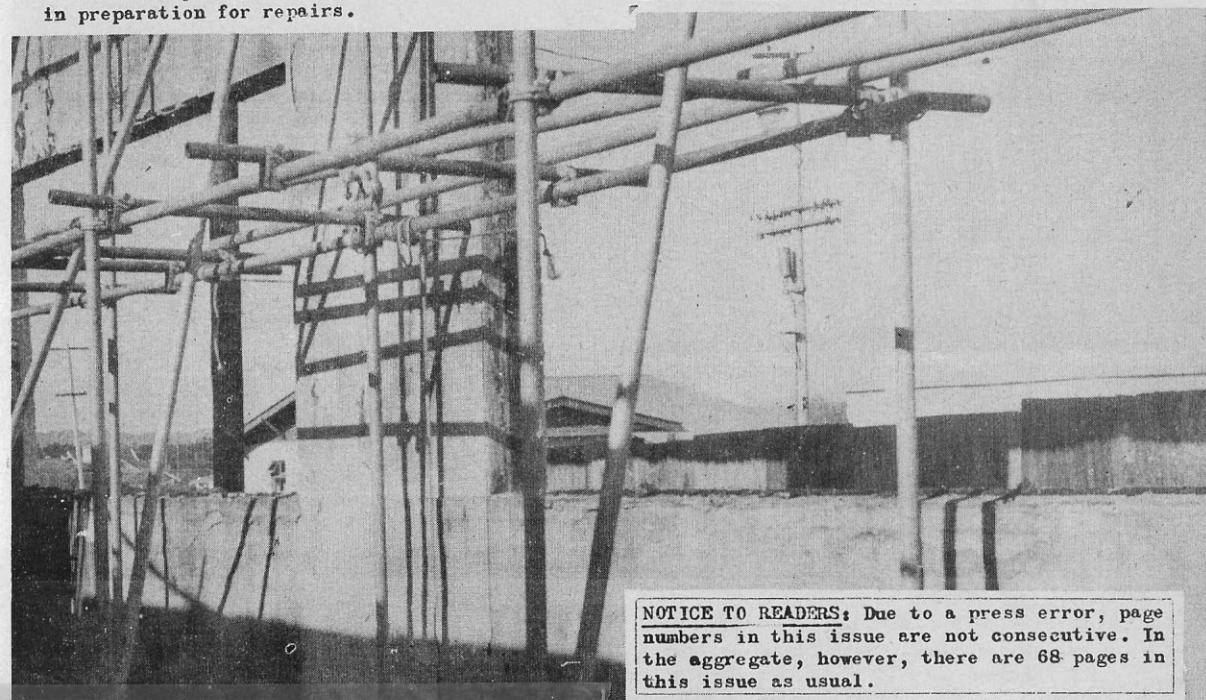
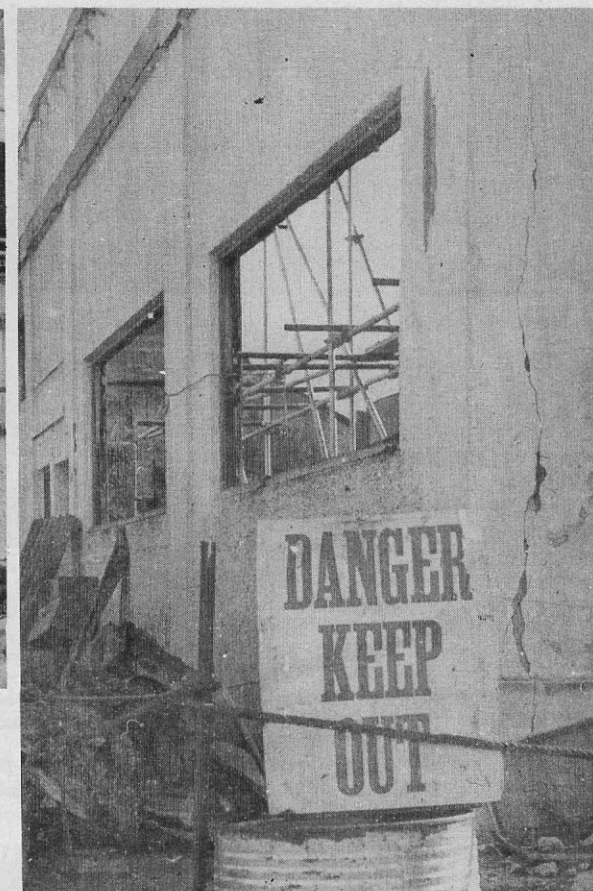
Firemen in early-morning battle against the flames

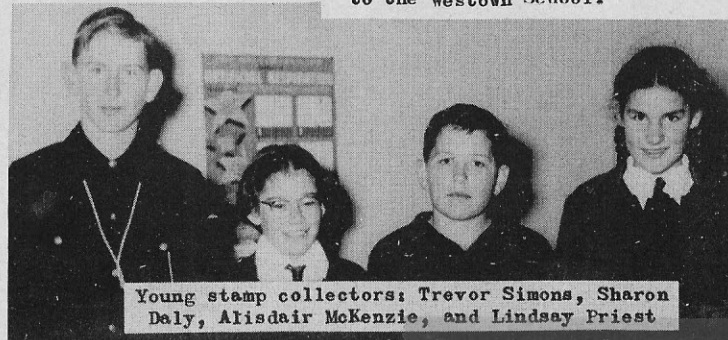

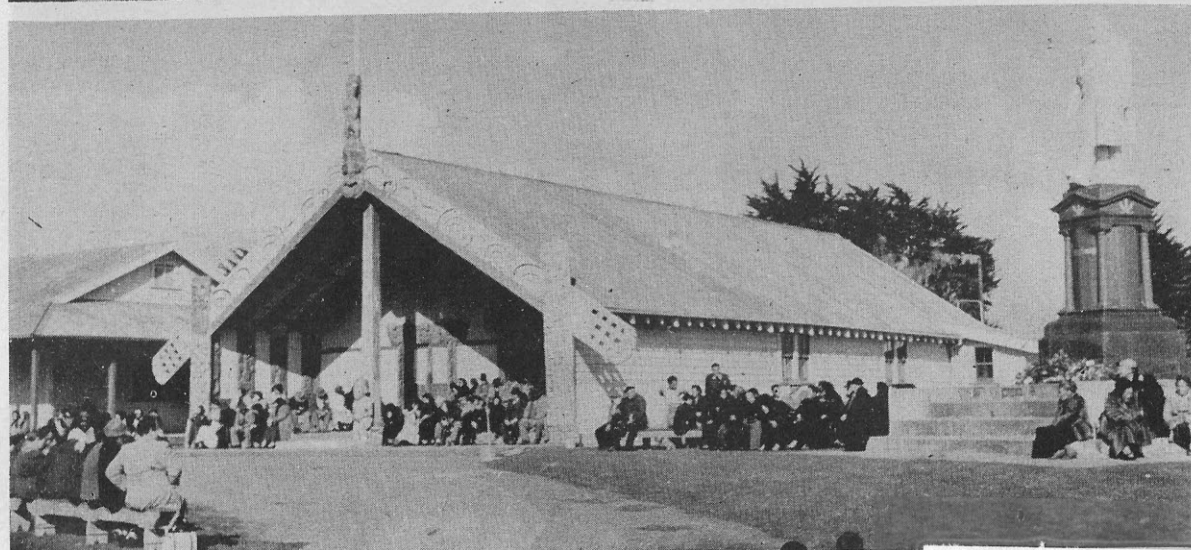
## MAORI PEOPLE HONOUR MEMORY OF A STATESMAN

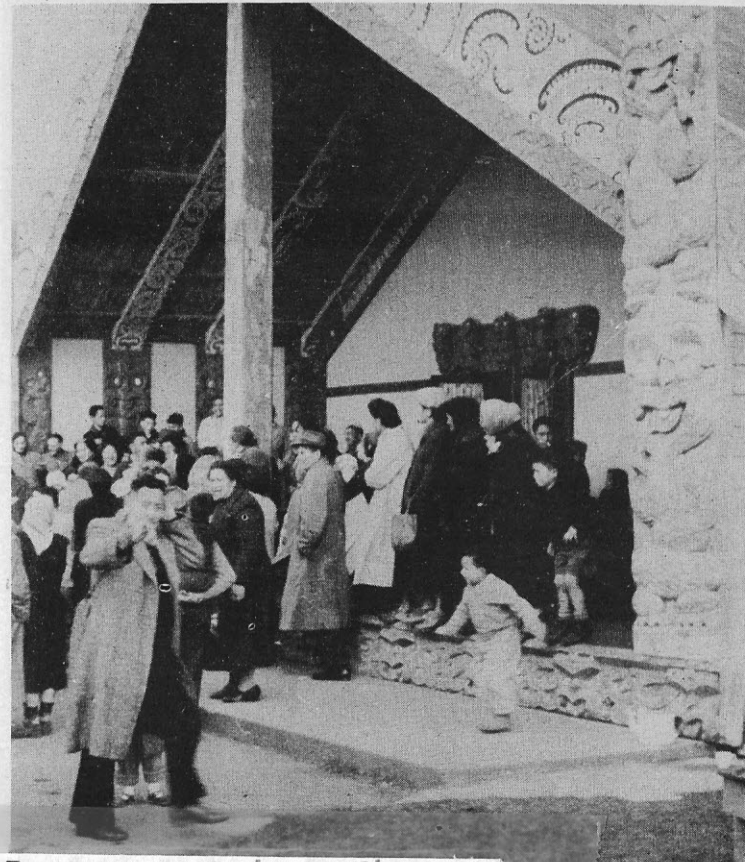

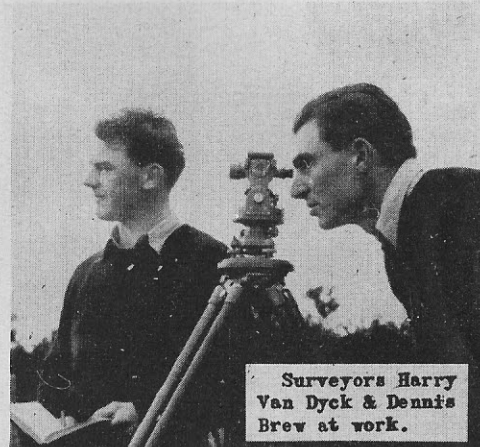

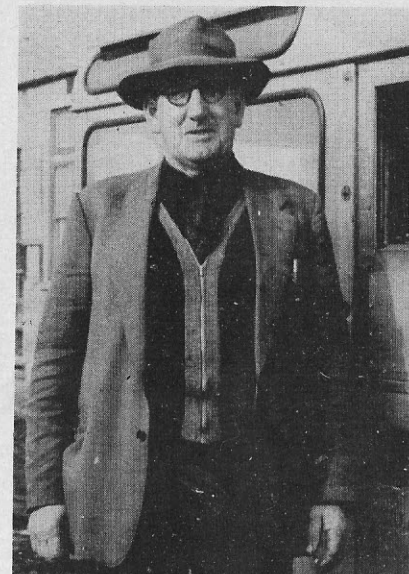

## The Quest for Oil

A team of experts, working with modern equipment and advanced techniques, are bringing closer every day the chances of finding oil in substantial quantities in Taranaki.

Shell, D'Arcy, Todd Oil Services, Ltd., the firm sponsoring the venture, hope to start actual drilling next year. Meanwhile they are carrying out extensive surveys to locate the rock strata most likely to bear oil in payable amounts.

Surveyors are plotting the land, holes are drilled, and charges are set off underground. The resulting shock waves are recorded photographically to provide "charts" — or seismographs — of the land beneath it.

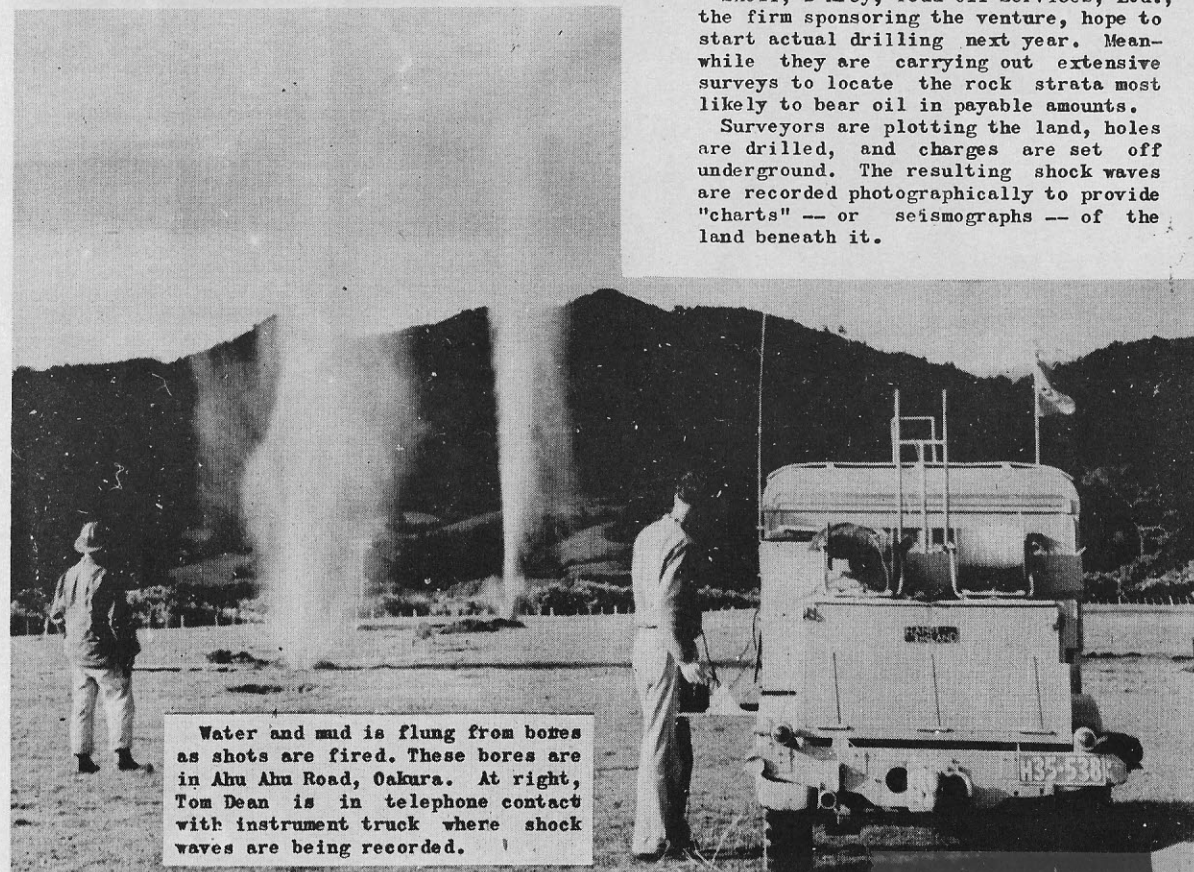

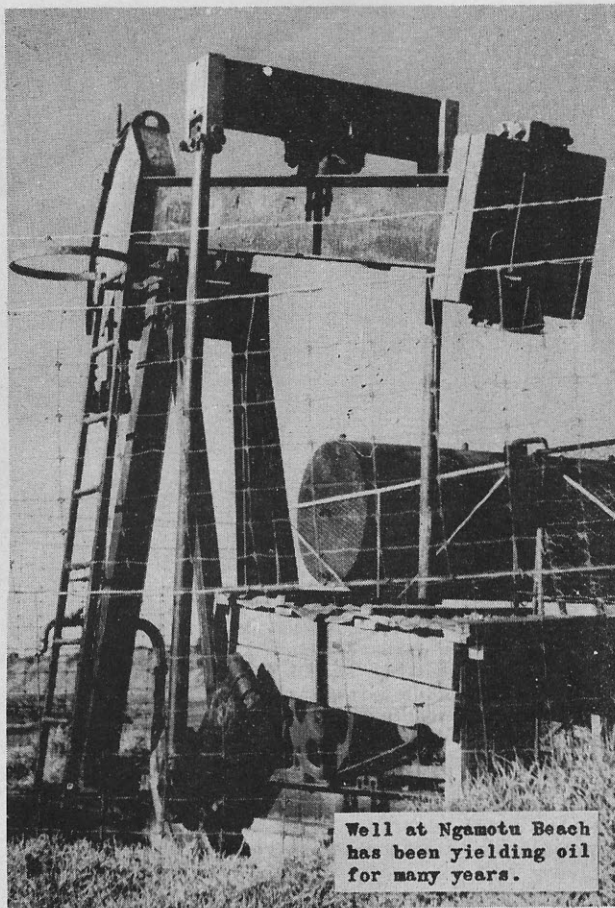




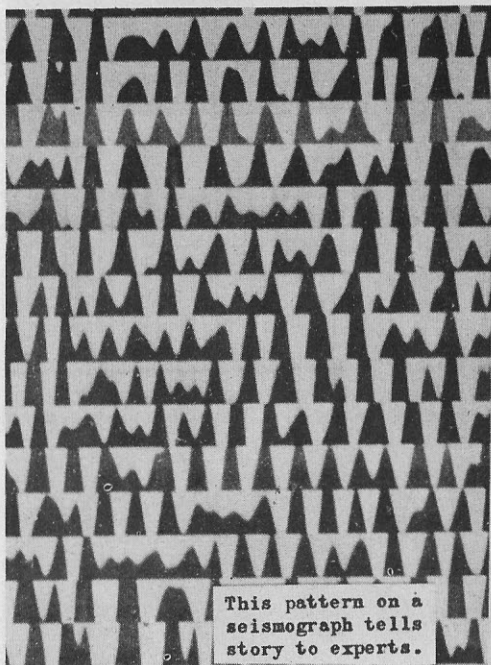
Shots are fired along the survey lines at 700yd intervals, and groups of 24 seismometers are used to measure the sound waves. Variations in the time it takes the waves to reach the meters reveal the type of rock present.

The seismographic research will be collated in Wellington, along with the results of magnetic and geological study.

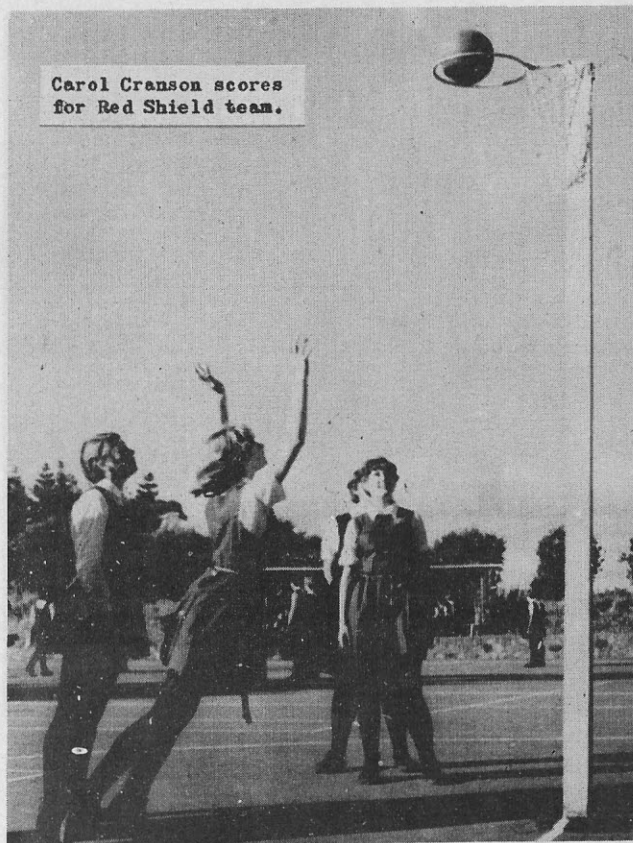

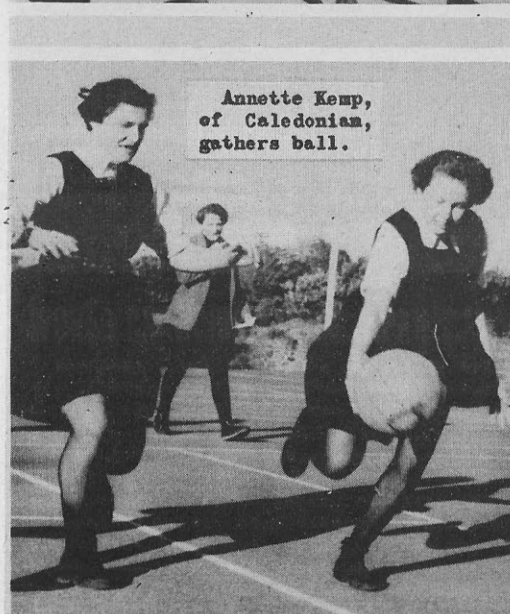

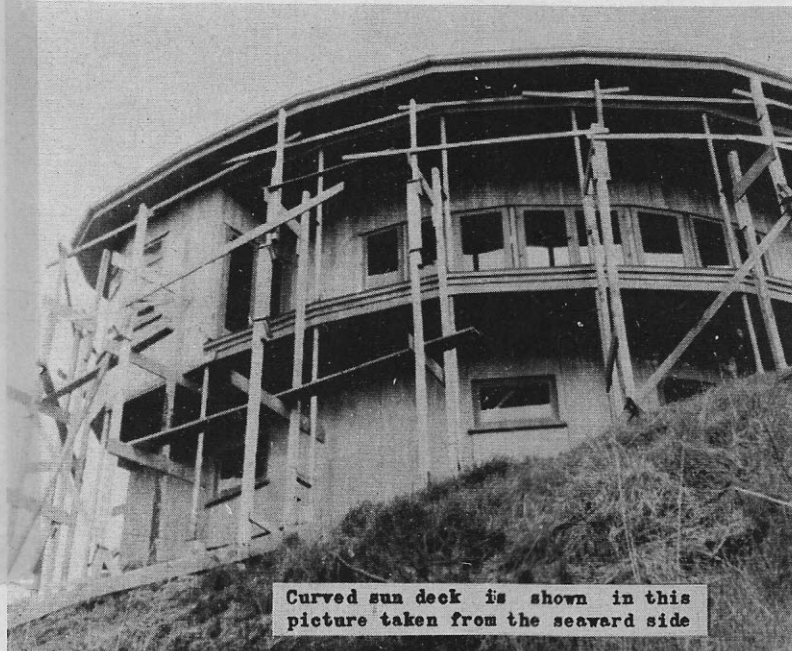

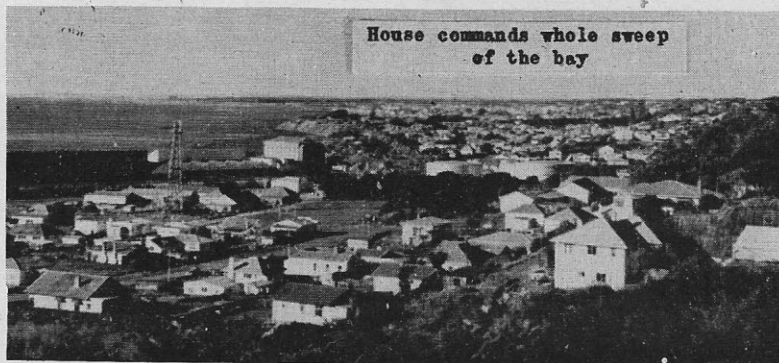

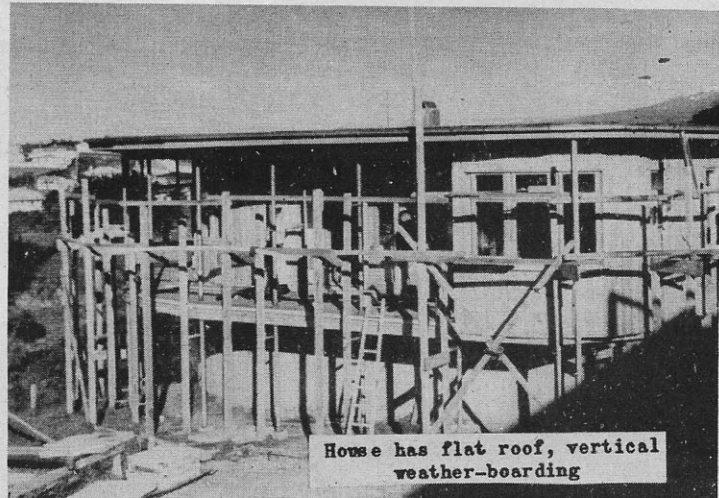
## THE HOUSE WITH THE CURVES

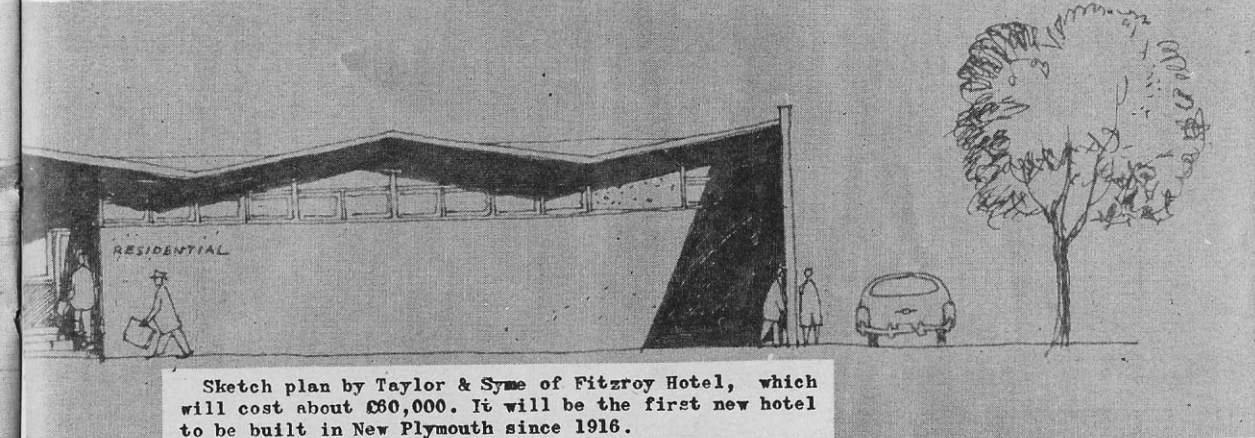
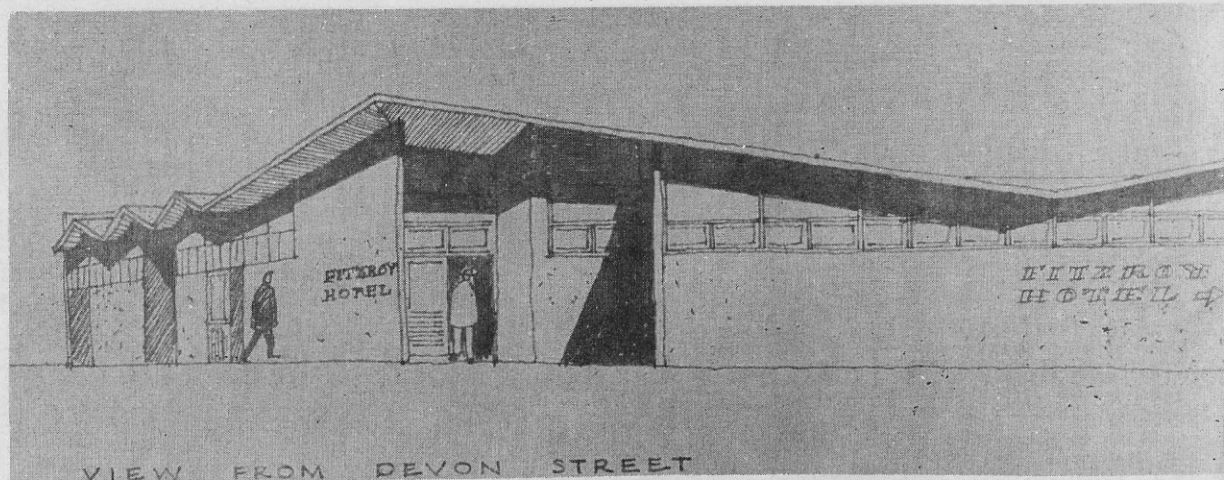

Also in the high-price bracket is the new building for the Farmers' Co-op., the foundations for which are now in place.

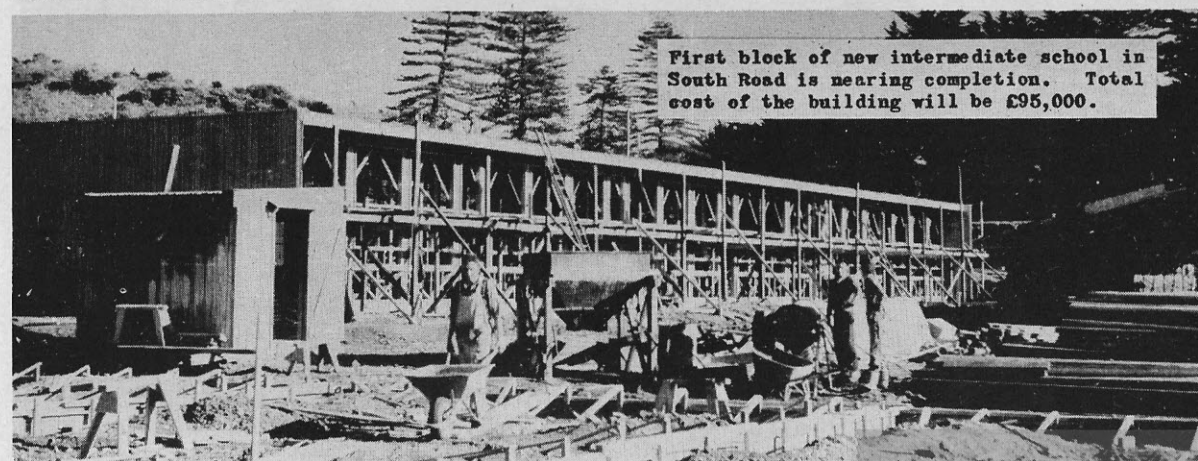

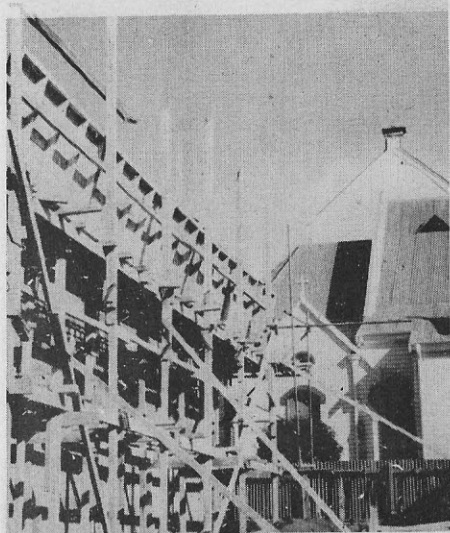

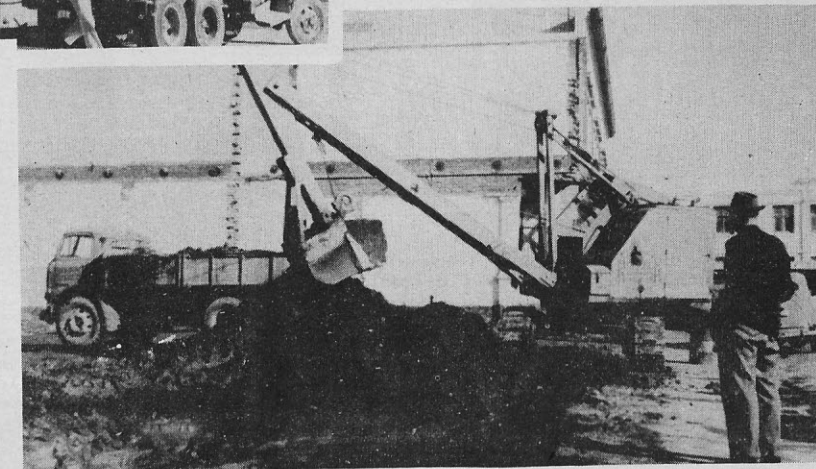

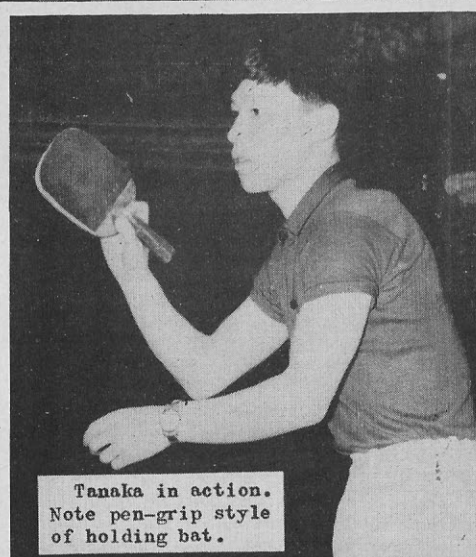

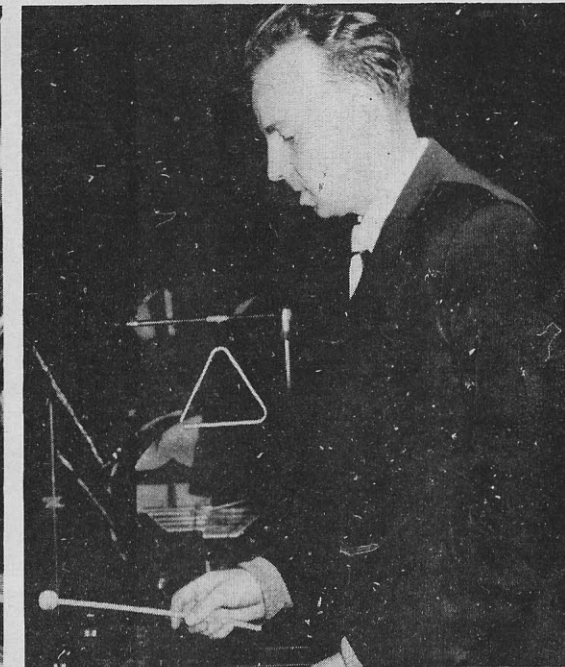

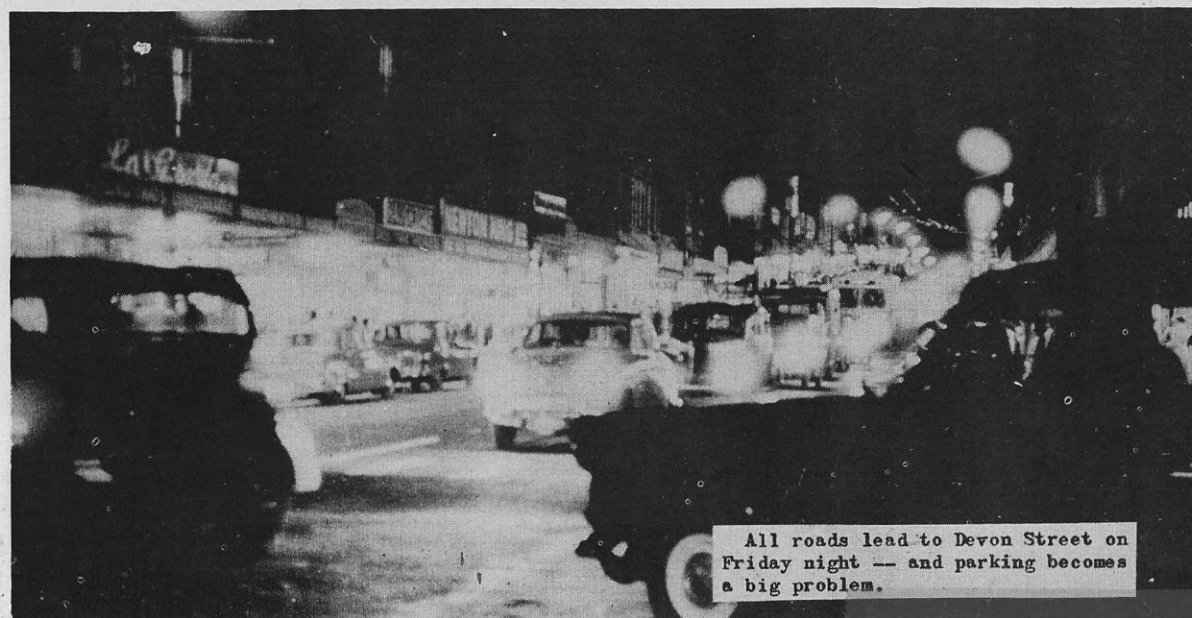
## FRIDAY NIGHT IN THE CITY

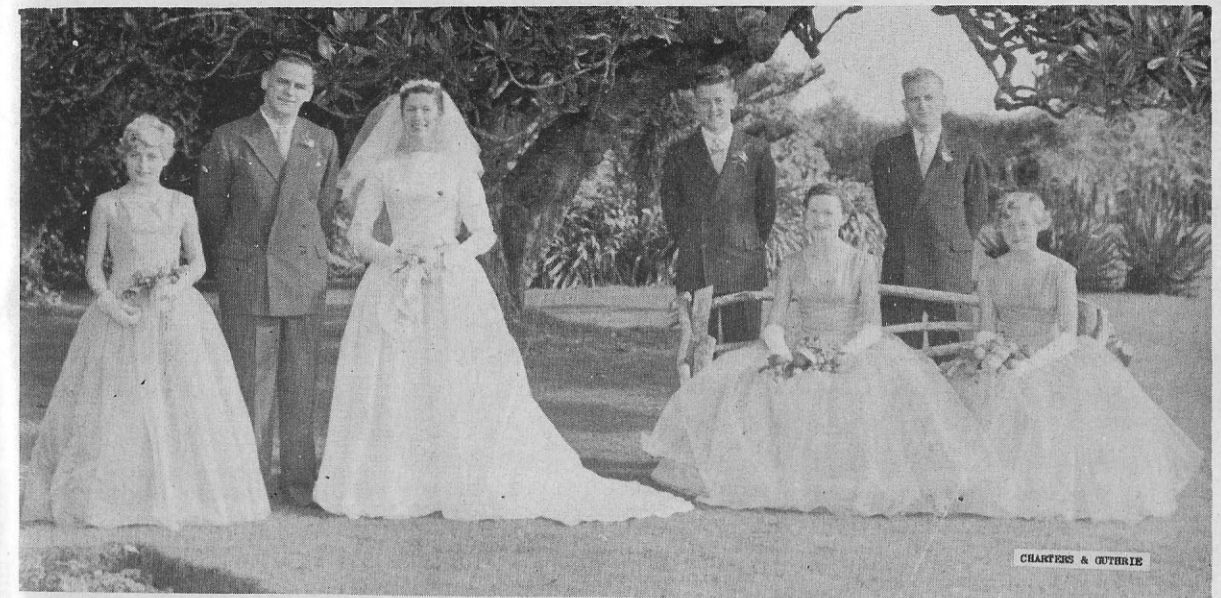

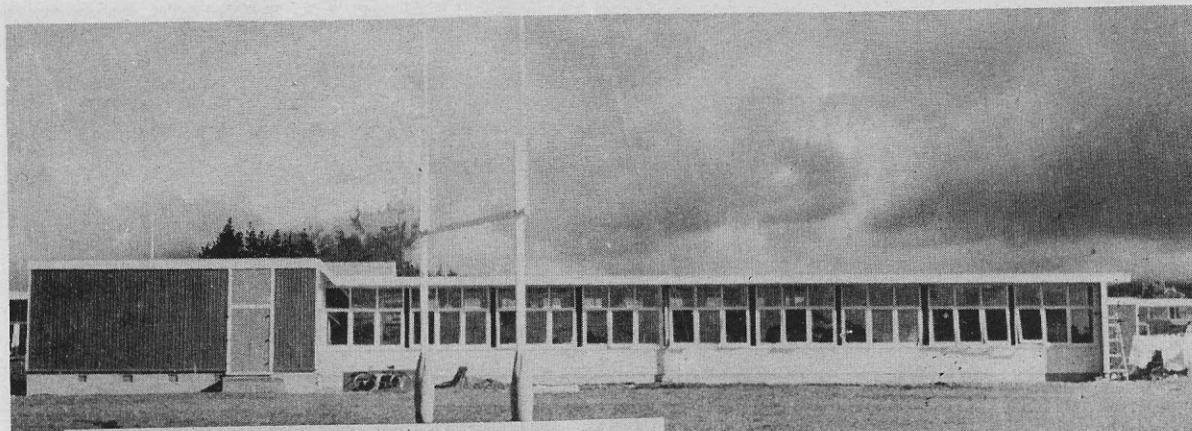

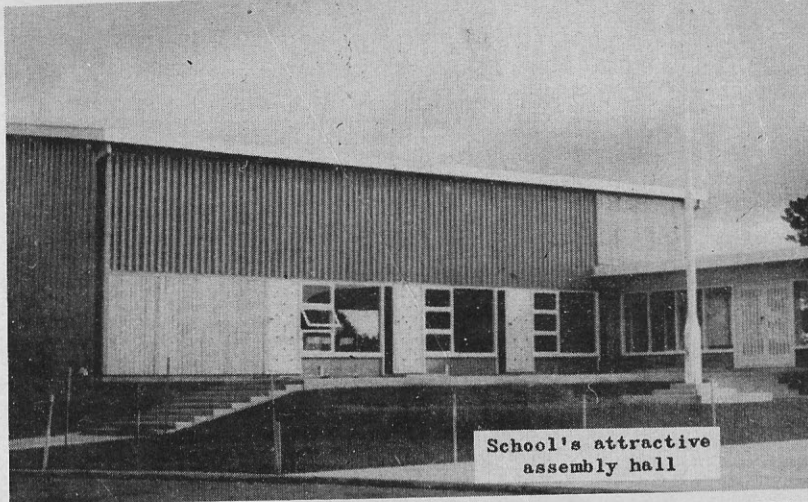

## INGLEWOOD IS PROUD OF NEW HIGH SCHOOL

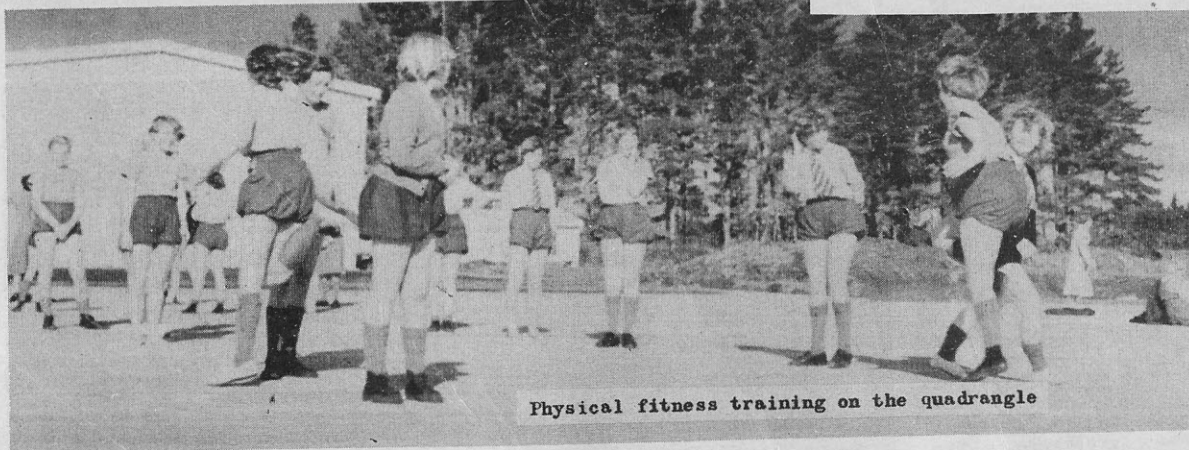

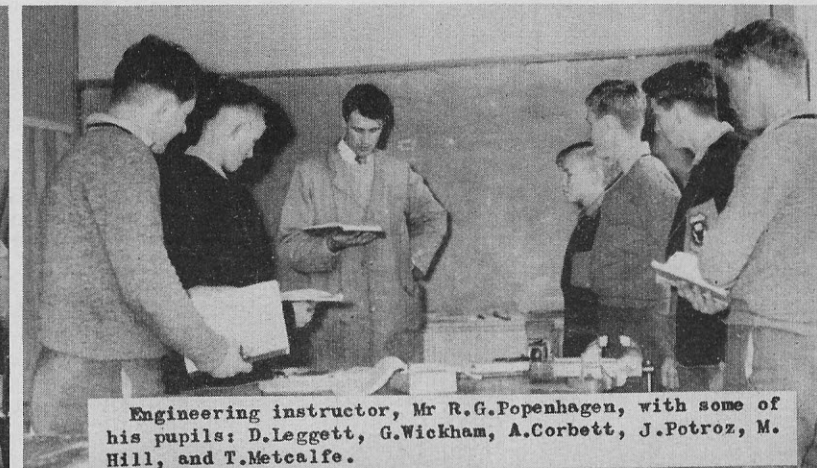

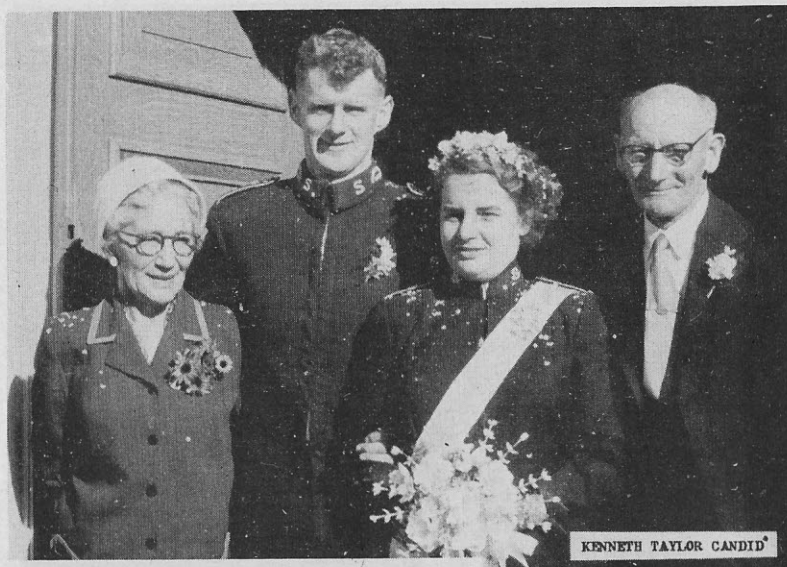

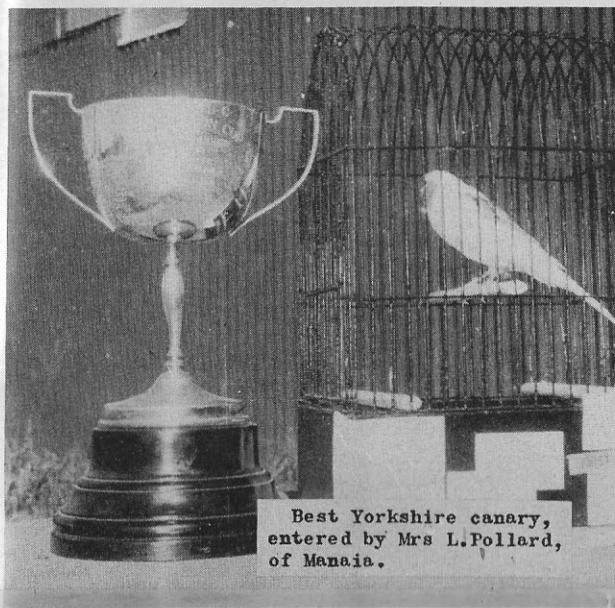

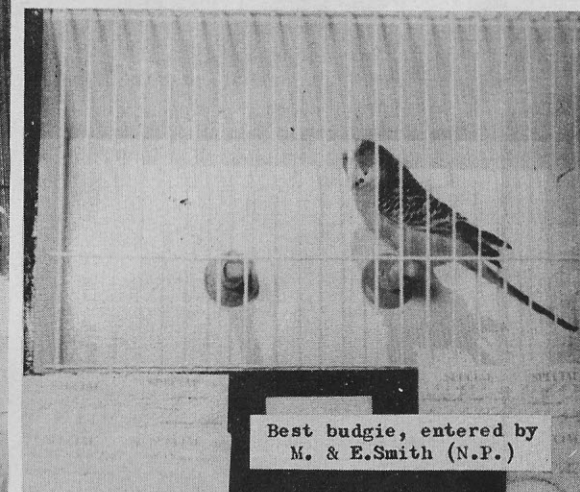
## CAGE BIRDS ON SHOW
