It was no doubt a surprise for many of our readers, as it was to us, to learn that as a result of the recently-applied import restrictions, the existence of this magazine was threatened. The position was that, while we were carrying good stocks of the materials needed for its production and were assured of reasonable supplies in most lines, we were caught almost without stocks of sheet process film. This is a small part of our requirements, but an essential one. Our ration for 1958 was enough to keep us going for only three months.

A number of approaches were made to the Minister of Customs, Mr Boord, the Minister of Industries and Commerce, Mr Holloway, and other authorities. At the same time representatives of the photographic industry, which was also affected, made representations. As a result, the Government decided to provide the industry with 100% of 1956 purchases, instead of 50% as contained in the original restrictions.

In the case of "New Plymouth Photo News", which had no 1956 allocation, it is required that a special application be made. We anticipate that this will be granted. The position then will be that both "Gisborne Photo News" and "New Plymouth Photo News" will be published as usual.







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Despite unfavourable weather conditions, several hundred people gathered at the port to wish the competitors all the best as they set out on their challenging course.







FIRE BRIGADE ANNIVERSARY : How Old Is It?

Here is a question many people are still asking, which well they might, for the brigade seemed to grow several years older with each passing day. It was first announced that the New Plymouth Fire Brigade was to celebrate the 75th anniversary of its founding in 1883. Within a few days it became 12 years older: 87. Not satisfied with the rapidly increasing maturity, researchers revealed that the brigade was founded at a public meeting on November 26, 1866: age now 91¹/₂.











To enable the public to see their display, divers worked in about 10 feet of water, but some have dived to depths in excess of 100 feet.














Inter-Provincial Swimming

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


Hawera's Community Centre






Maori Conference
