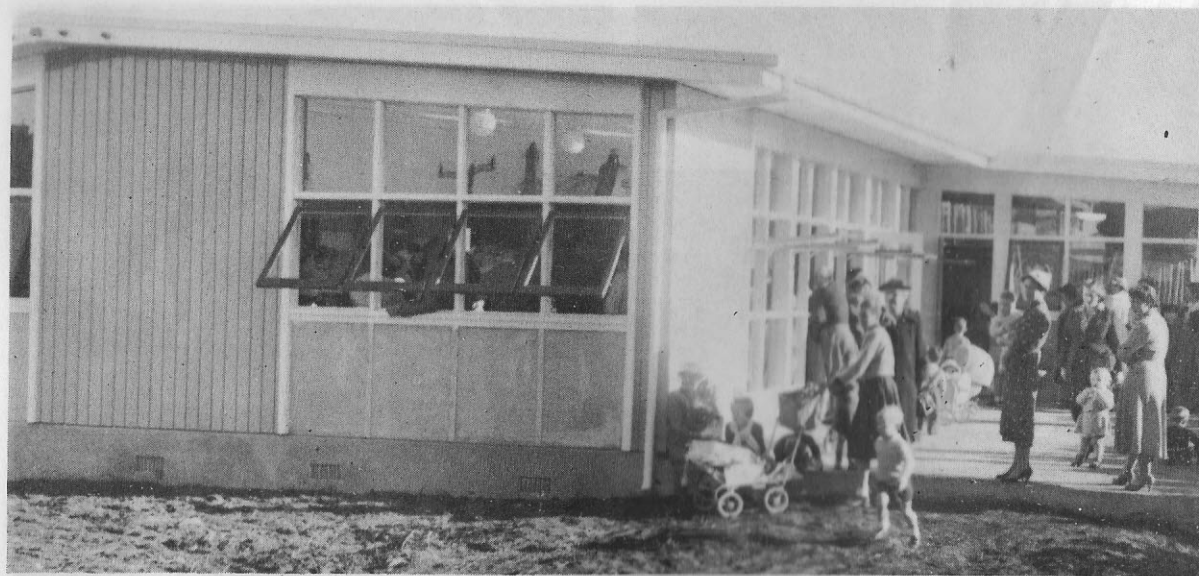

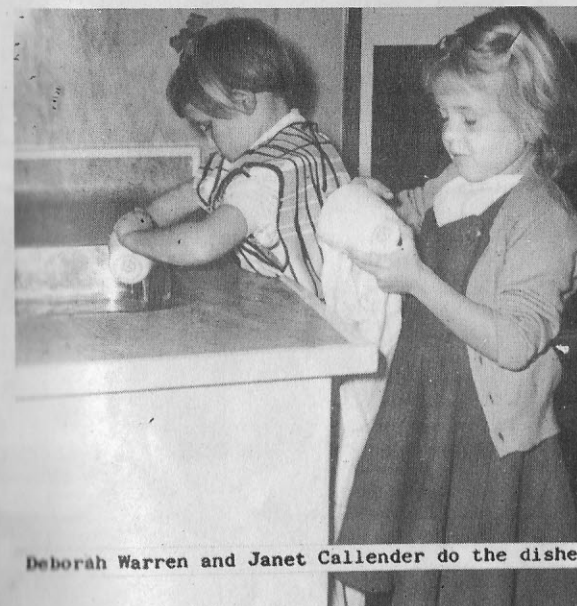


New Kindergarten Opened

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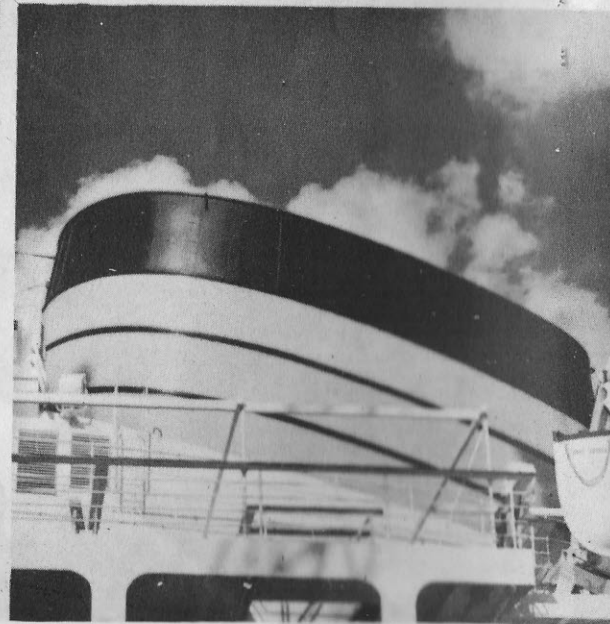

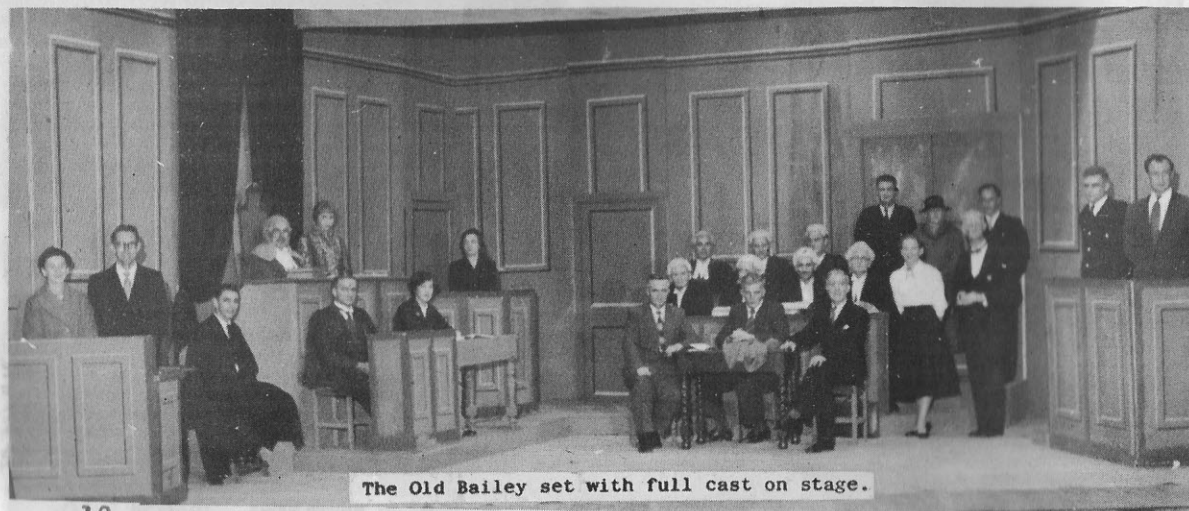




First Play in Hawera's New Theatre

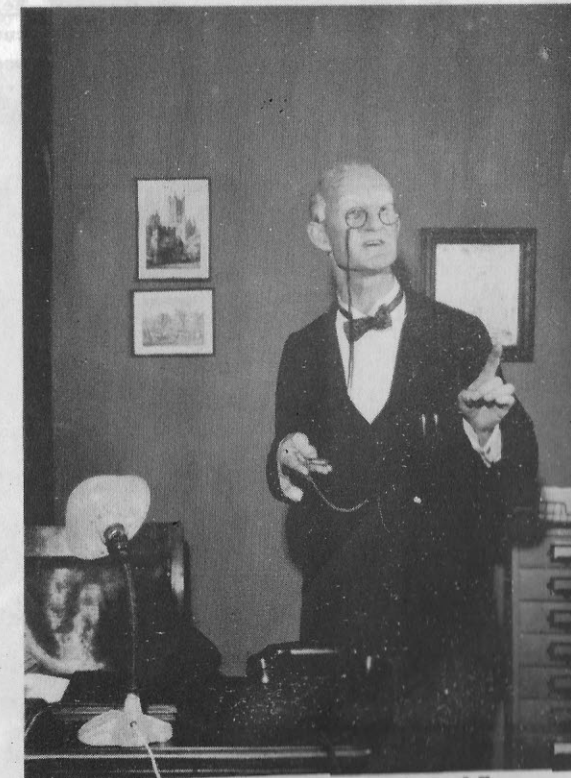

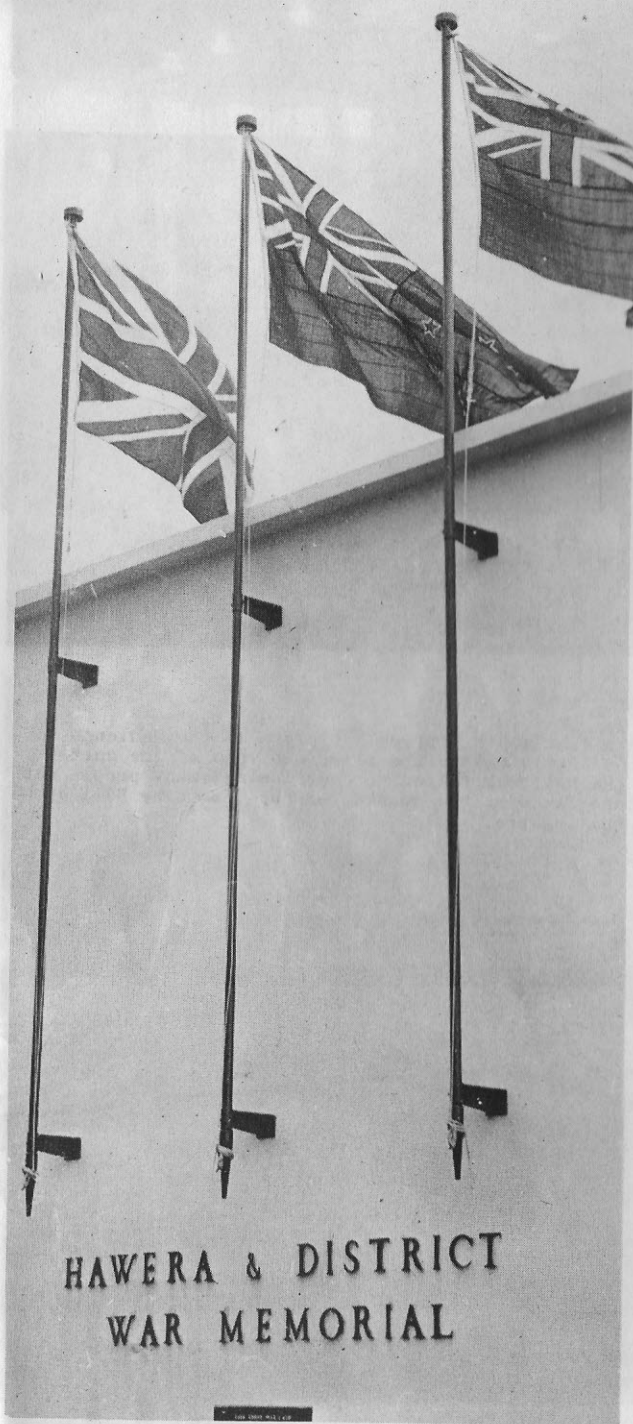

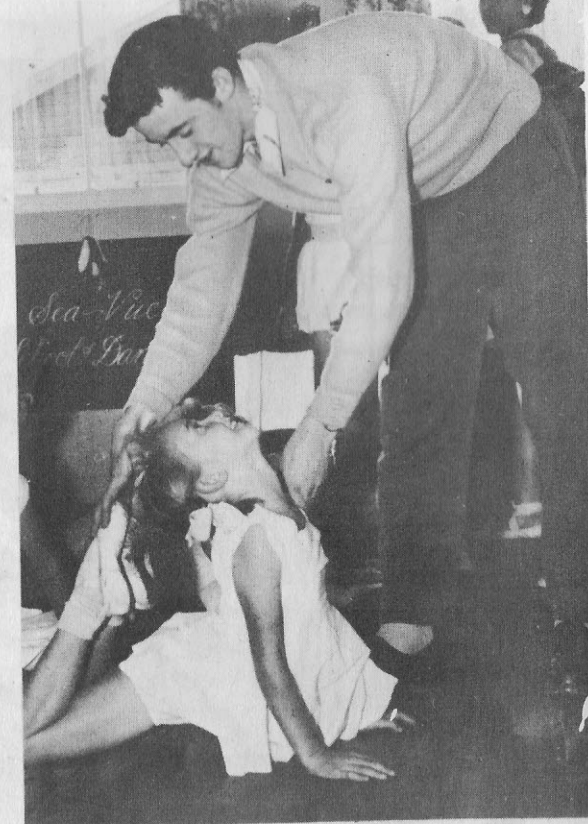
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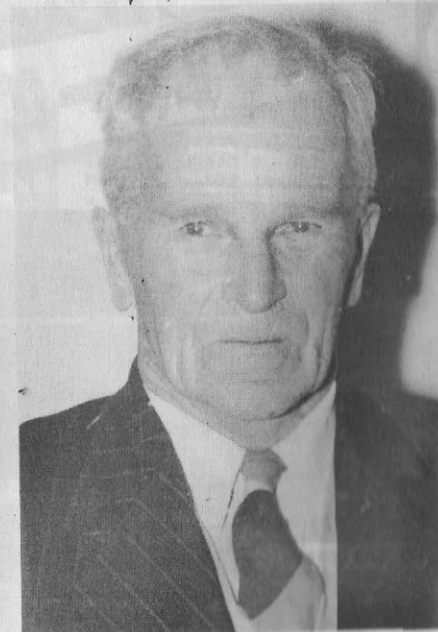

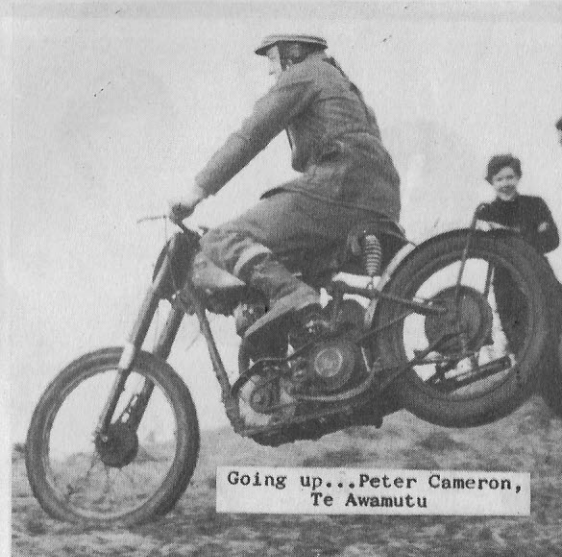

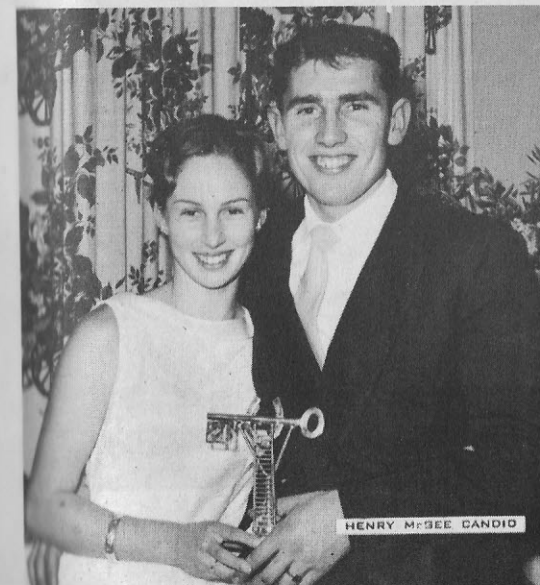

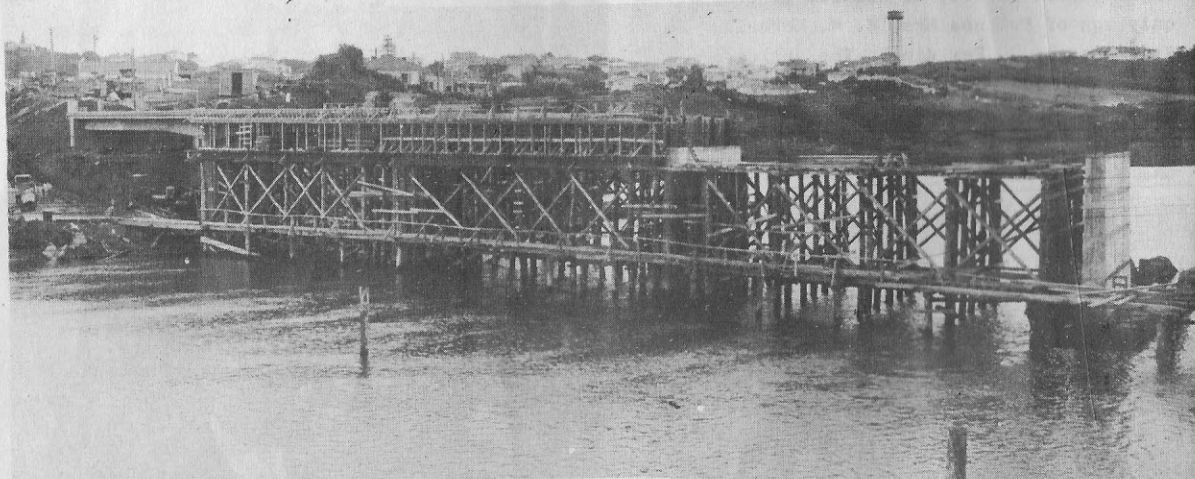

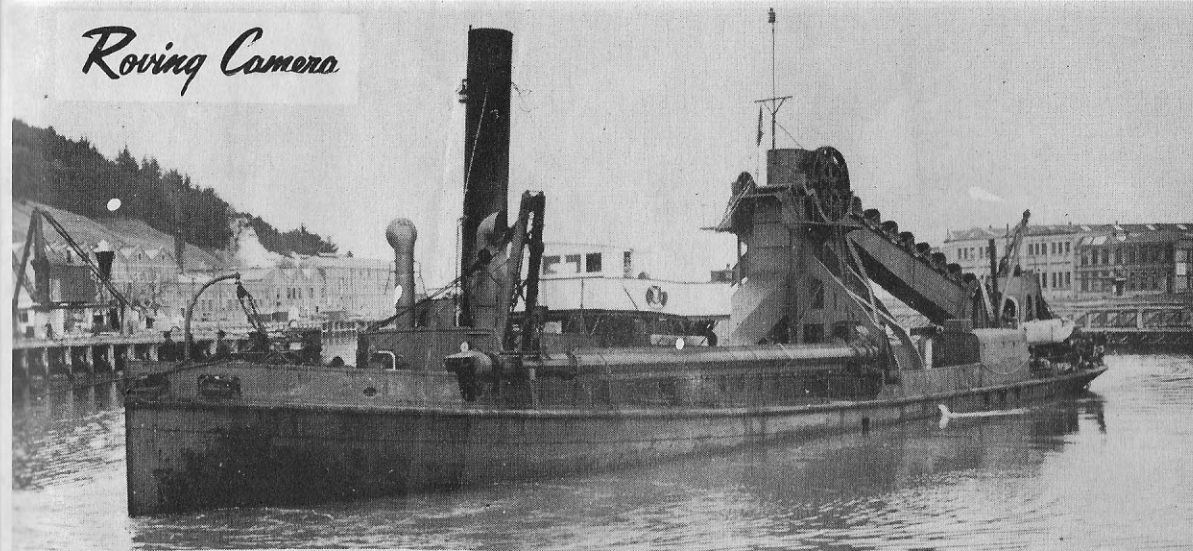

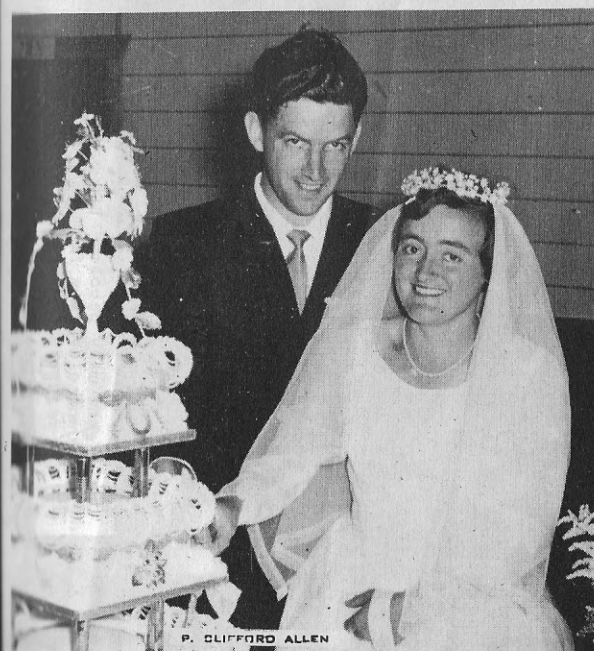

NEW CHURCH

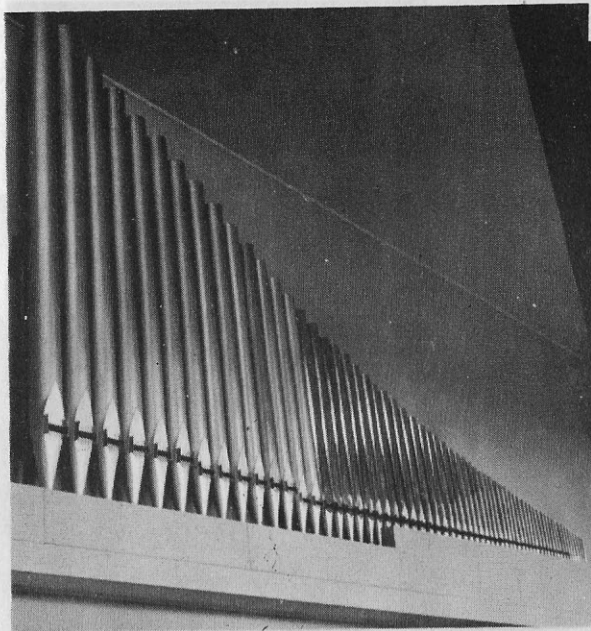
The only Catholic church of its kind in New Zealand has just been completed at Fitzroy. Built at a cost of £24,000 it has a warm and cosy atmosphere, and a design which, though unconventional, is very pleasing to the eye. Into the building went German windows, an organ from Holland, marble from Italy, English lino and timber from Taranaki. It is the first building in Taranaki which employs Pyrotenax cable heating, the cable being buried in the concrete floor: there will of course be no cold feet in this church.

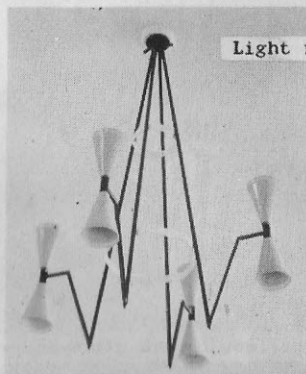

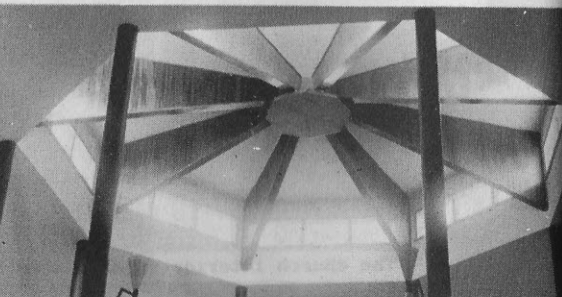

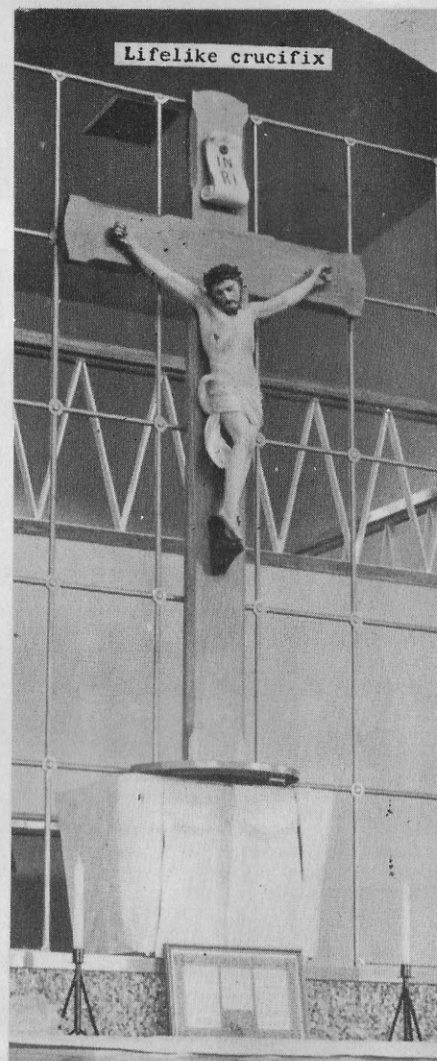

Cement by the Shipload

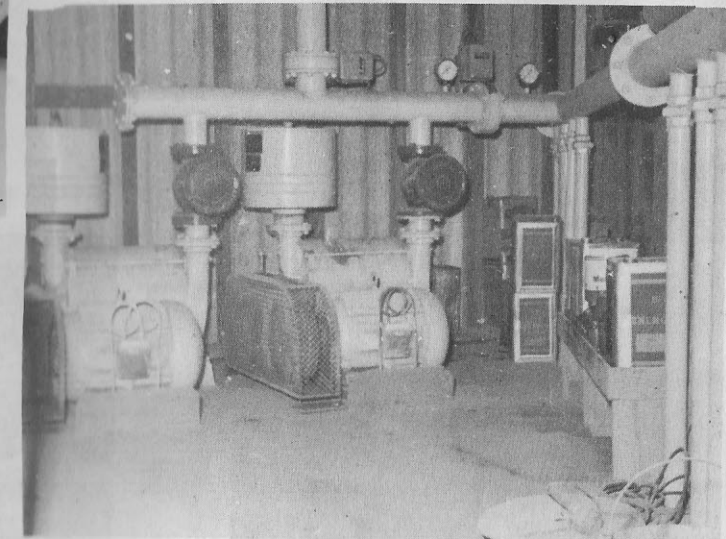
Cement is dusty, commonplace, unromantic stuff, but if the story of advancement of the industry were better known, it would have about it a glamour hardly less than that of any other modern New Zealand enterprise. Cement is a basic need in Taranaki's economy, and with the building of the silos at the port, another welcome industry was brought to the province by the Golden Bay Cement Company. There is no doubt that with the increase in the rate of building in the area, this industry should be a boon to the builder, large or small. Cement is made and comes to the builder from Tarakohe, an isolated bay on the northern tip of the South Island, by the company's own modern ship, the "Golden Bay." On arrival in Taranaki, cement is sucked out of the ship's hold by compressed air, into the two large silos on the wharfside. This bulk cement is then bagged as it is ordered by the builders' merchants of Taranaki.



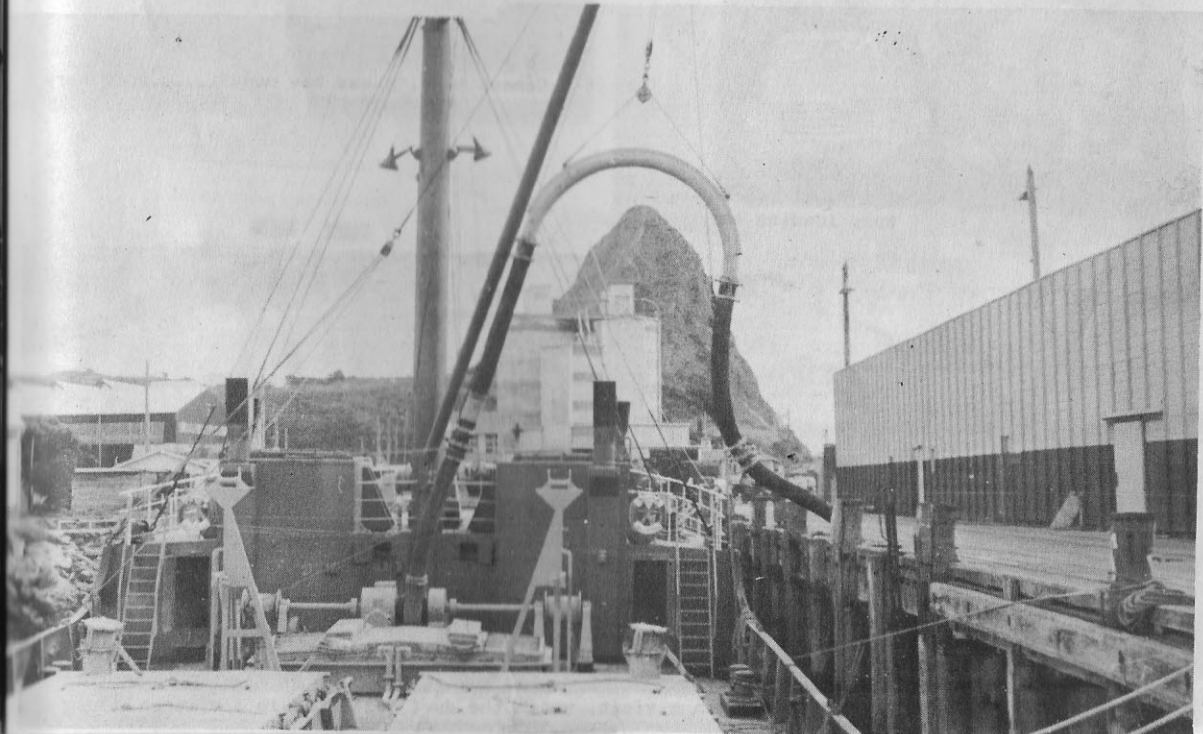

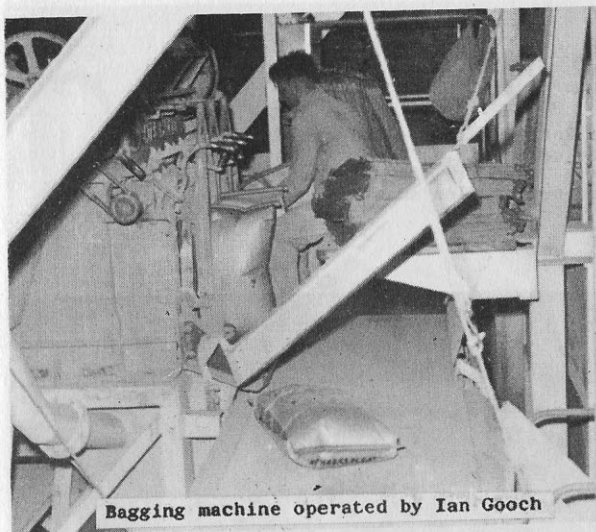


Left: Rotary screen eliminates larger lumps from the cement.

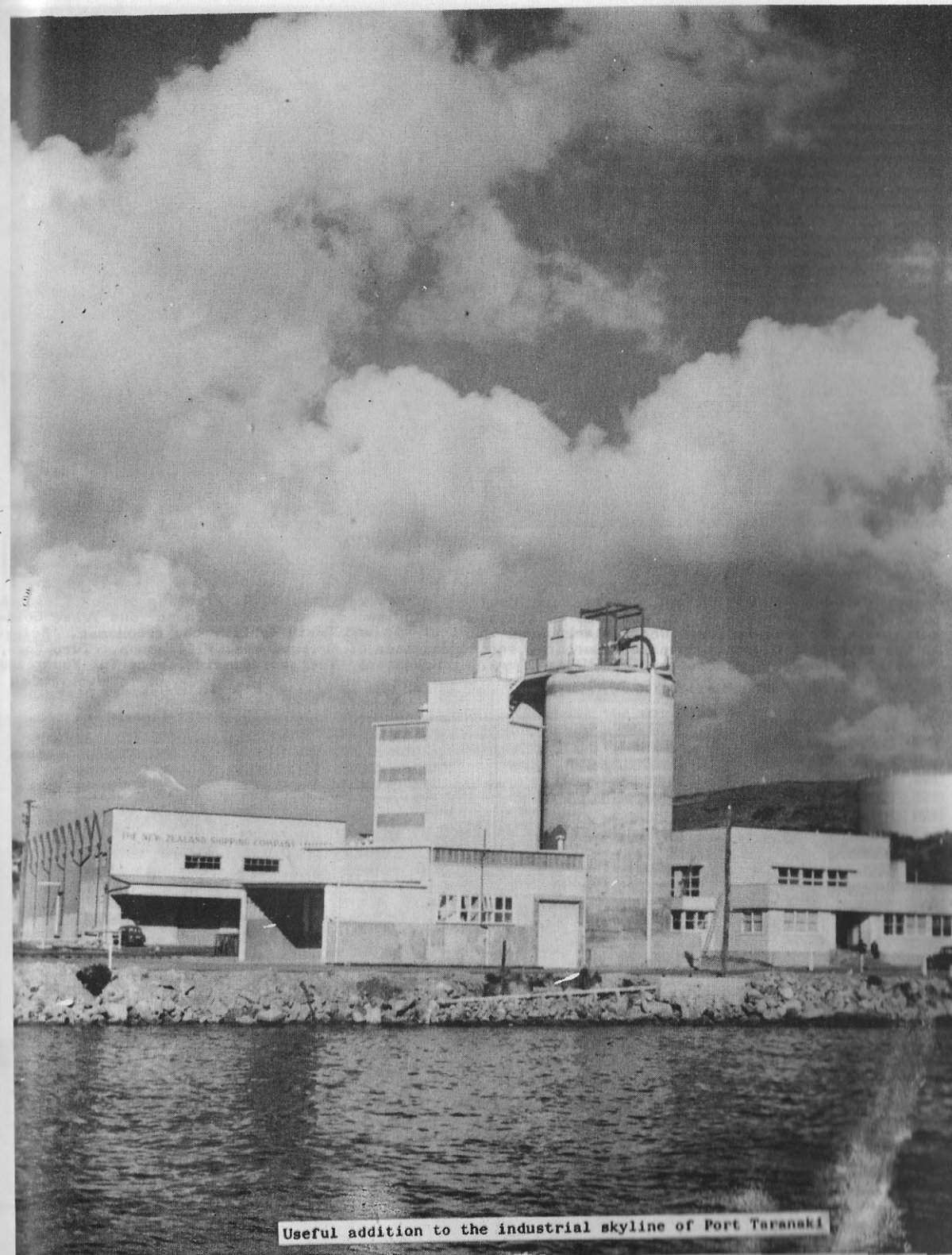

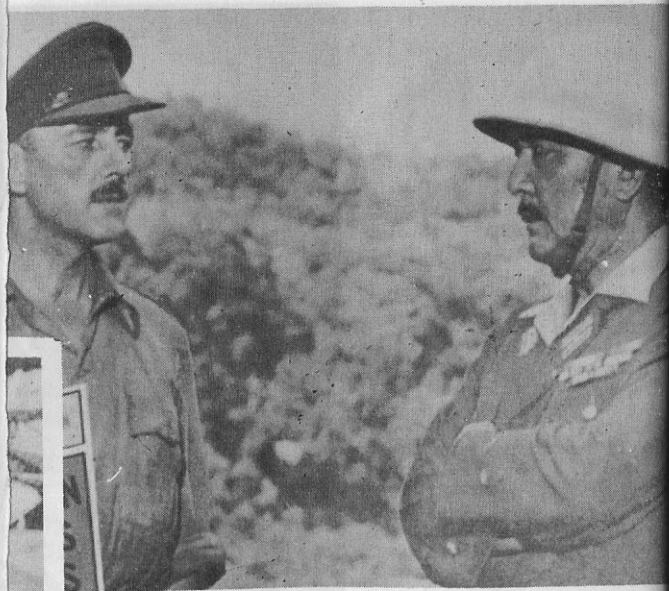

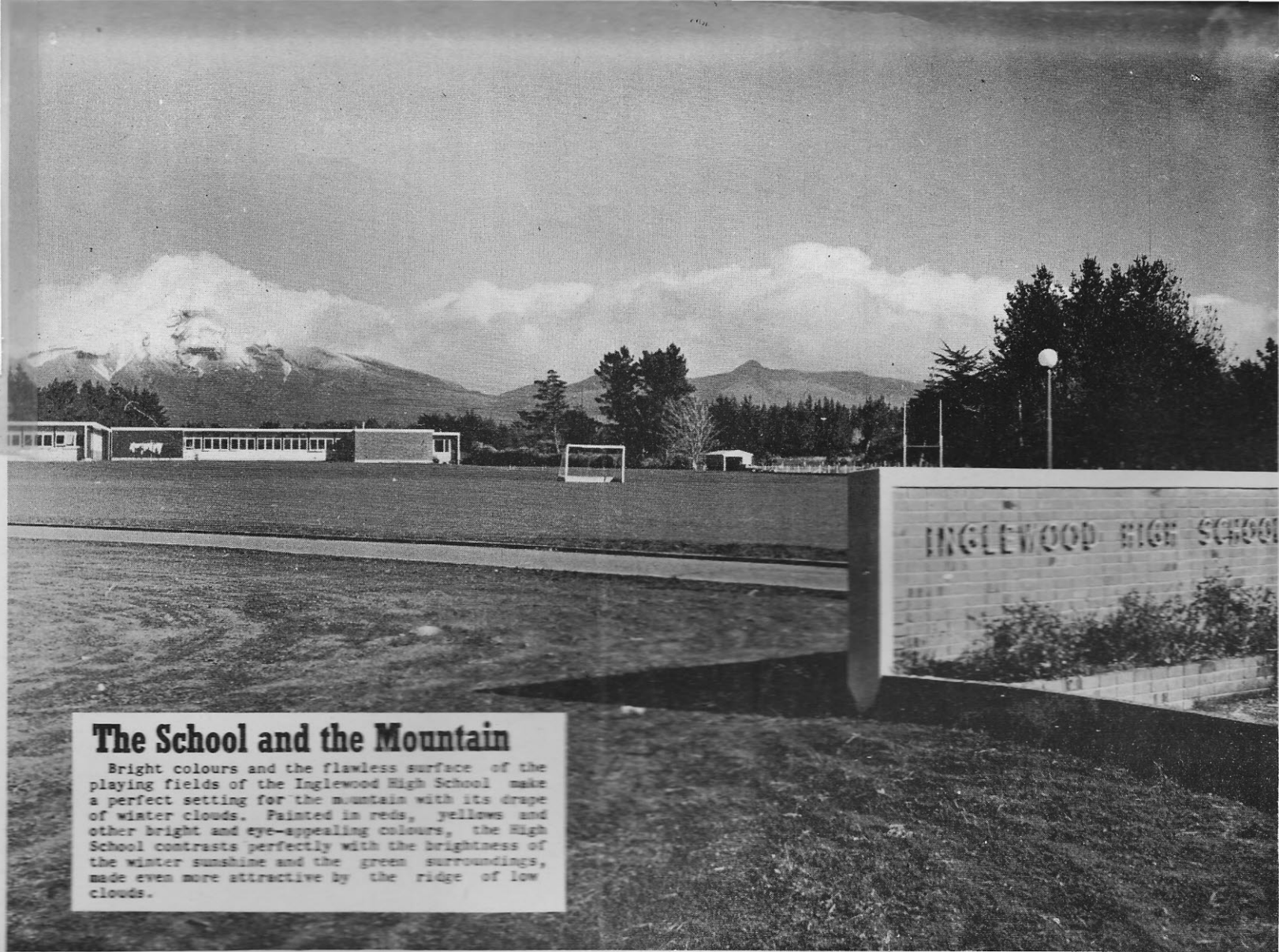
