
"B" Grade Basketball







Inglewood's £65,000 Water Scheme

Aiming at giving Inglewood virtually pure mountain snow (in liquid form) the Inglewood Borough Council's £65,000 water reticulation scheme is under way. The scheme, which will take nine months to complete, involves an intake in the Ngatro stream, running through seven miles of pipes to Inglewood, via a micro-strainer, a chlorination plant and a £12,000 reservoir. At the intake, the water will enter the pipes free of pollution because the area is stock-free. Through the scheme Inglewood will be assured of a constant and pure water supply, claimed to be the best in Taranaki and possibly in New Zealand.







Cage Bird Show




















Indoor Basketball Tourney






