


Globetrotting Clowns






New Plymouth's First Ever Rodeo

The first full rodeo staged at New Plymouth brought a "Wild West" at-mosphere to the Show-grounds recently. Organ-ised by the Taranaki Rod-eo Association, it featur-ed more than 40 riders from all parts of the North Island. A crowd of about 5000 attended. For many of the spectators. many of the spectators, it was their first look at a full-scale rodeo with events that included bulldogging, calf-roping, bull-riding and buck-jumping. The high stan-dard of competition, es-pecially in the riding events, was due to the experience and class of the entrants. They included past and present NZ champions, many of whom had Australian riding experience.






Bishops Play Cricket






ELTHAM'S 75th JUBILEE














Beautiful Begonias
