













New Plymouth recently had the pleasure of seeing some international skating stars. The Ngamotu rink was crowded for this brilliant display.














Boys March to Shoot





Quest For Maori Artifacts

Spades and gum spears probed into the turf covering the Waitara swamp recently, as over 50 people, Maori and pakeha, from all parts of New Zealand, began a fascinating quest for Maori artifacts buried there long ago. Under the leadership of Dr. Roger Duff, director of the Canterbury Museum, the diggers first carefully removed turf along surveyed base lines, stacking it ready to be put back in place later. Dr. Duff took an active part in the work and paid special attention to the young members of the party.








