





The Search and Rescue Organisation was recently called out to search for two pighunters lost in the bush for a period of five days. The search area, in the Taurakawa district, is one of the toughest bush areas in the North Island. Over 100 men of the organisation spent up to 5 days in this intensive hunt. The lost men, William Sayle, Stratford, and Samuel Lowe, New Plymouth, in their plight, ate raw pig and drank the blood of a goat and water sucka goat and water suck-ed from moss to keep themselves from starv-

themselves from starvation.
Too high a tribute cannot be paid to the men of the Search and Rescue Organisation, led by Major D.H. Rawson, in their efforts to bring the men to safety. Had it not been for this hardy band of volunteers, it is felt that two lives would have been lost.







Ever been down below on a big ship? We had that pleasure recently, and were confronted with a maze of machinery, running like a well-oiled clock, and shining like a new pin. The lads whose job it is to look after these machines must certainly take plenty of pride in their job.











Above, left: This is the main propeller shaft casing. In this huge piece of machinery, all the shocks of the movements of the ship are taken. As the ships direction is changed from astern to ahead, then the thrust is taken up by this huge casing. From there, the propeller shaft runs to the aft of the ship through a series of joints and bearings down a part of the ship known as the tunnel, above, right.

Below: Here we have part of one of the main gearboxes. This massive machine is kept in tip top order, and is as clean as a new pin, with all the copper pipes shining and the casing kept painted silver.






HOT AND COLD JOBS ABOARD SHIP.

Above: A bit different from the old ships, when stokers had to shovel coal for hours on end, is the boiler room of the S.S. Athenic, where two sets of six burners keep two huge boilers fed with fuel oil, to keep a level of 400lb steam pressure. This is one of the hot jobs aboard, where the temperature can rise to over 120 degrees.

Below, left: After our visit to the boiler room, we visited the refrigeration department, where things are pretty cold. Our photograph shows the pipes in the brine room, which always have a coat of ice over two inches thick on them.

Below, right: The refrigeration engineer checks on his gauges. For the transport of chilled beef, there is only a one-degree tolerance, and the engineer has to keep a constant watch. With beef, a lot of which was carried in this ship, the engineer has to be always on the alert for variations of temperature.


