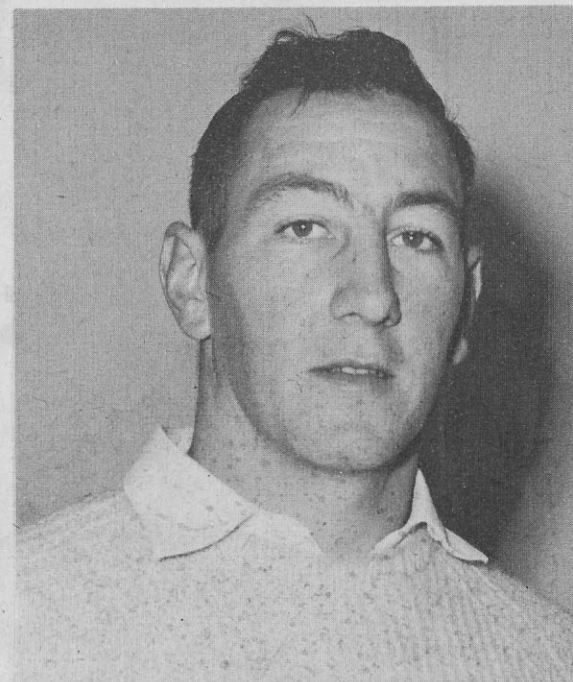

Taranaki's All-Blacks

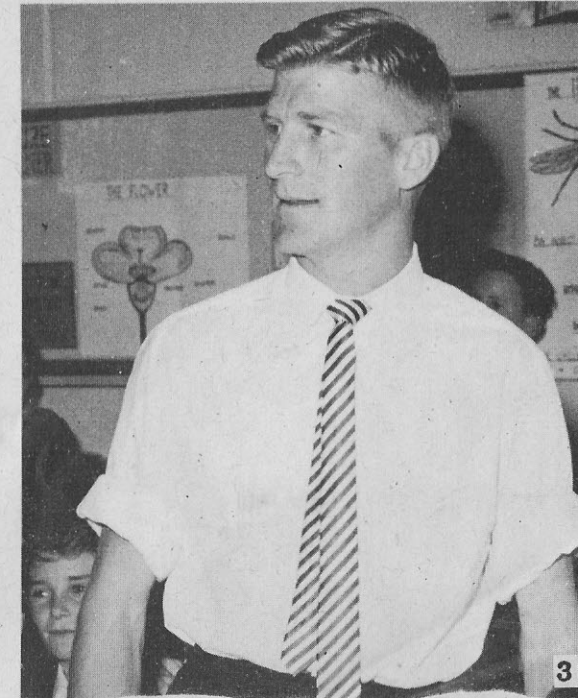

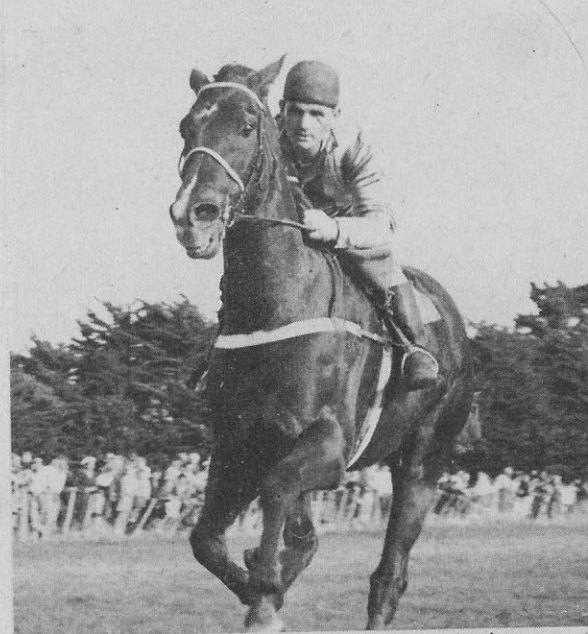
First Races at Pihama For 20 years

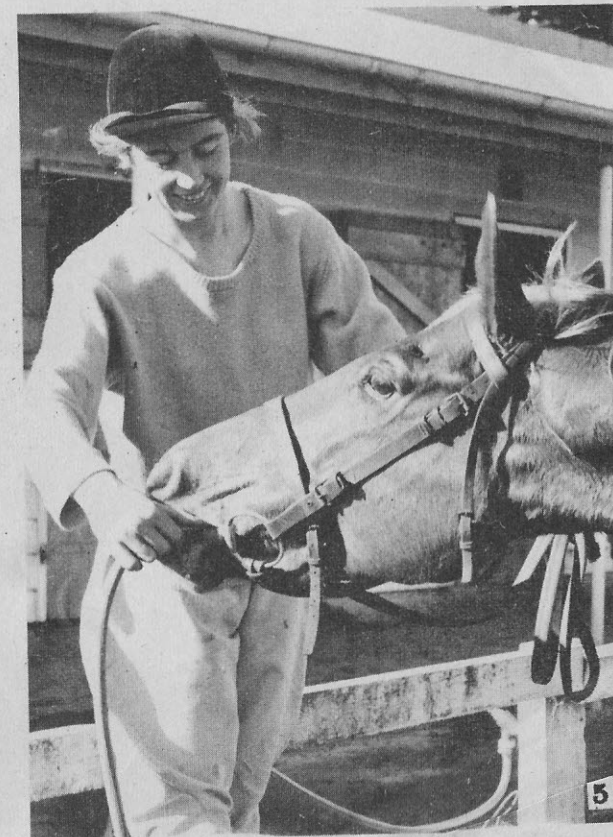
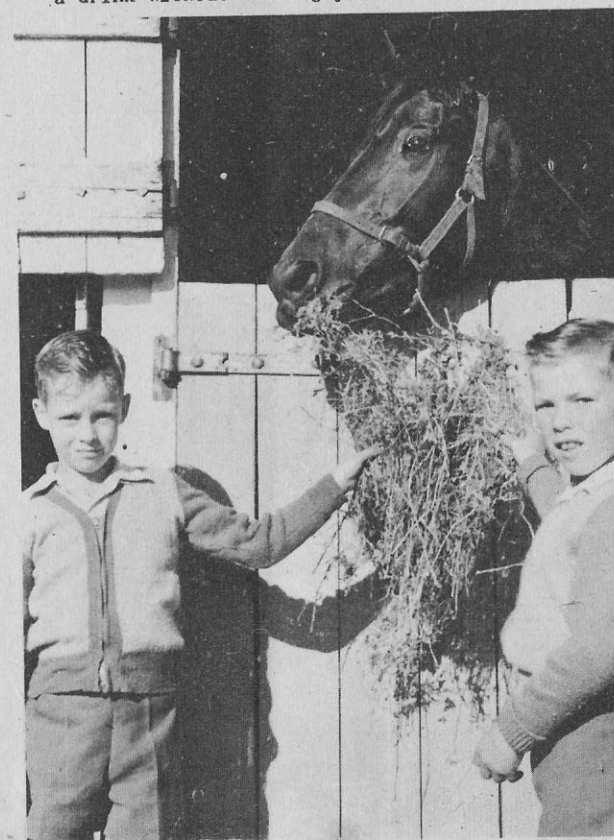

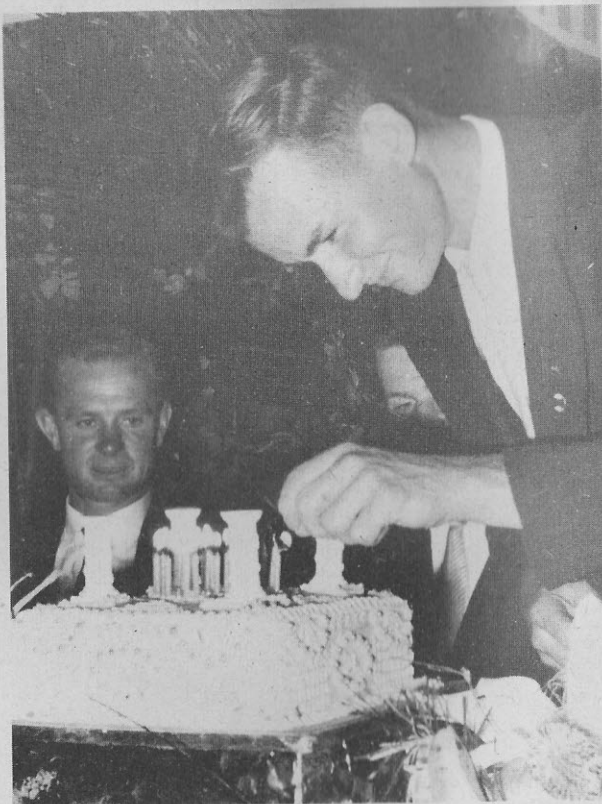

Boys' Army Goes to Mock War

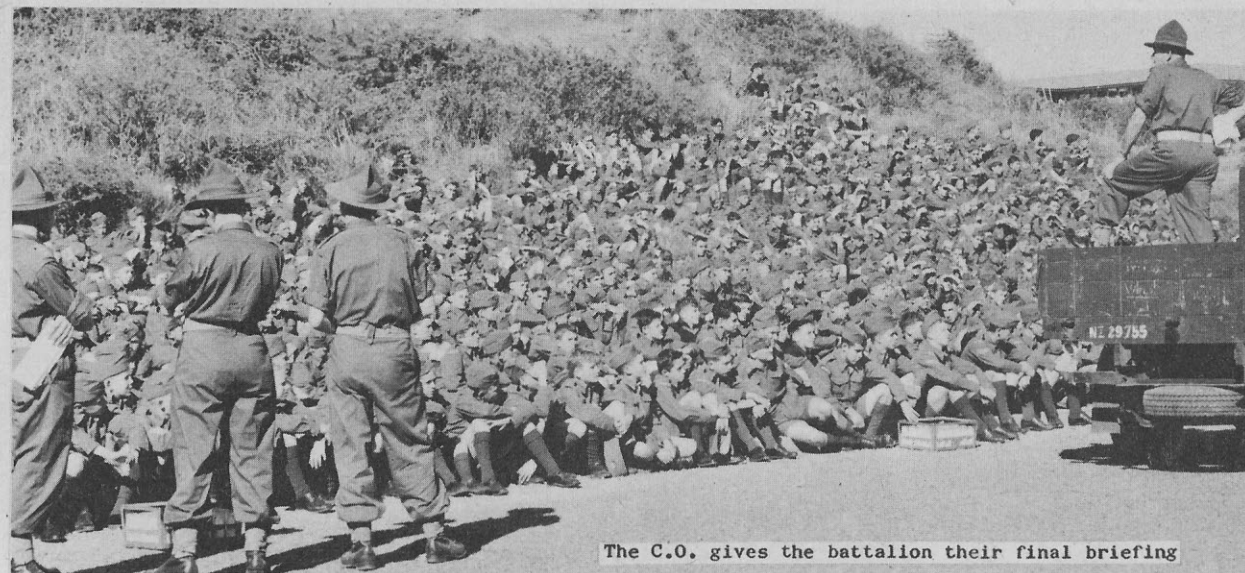

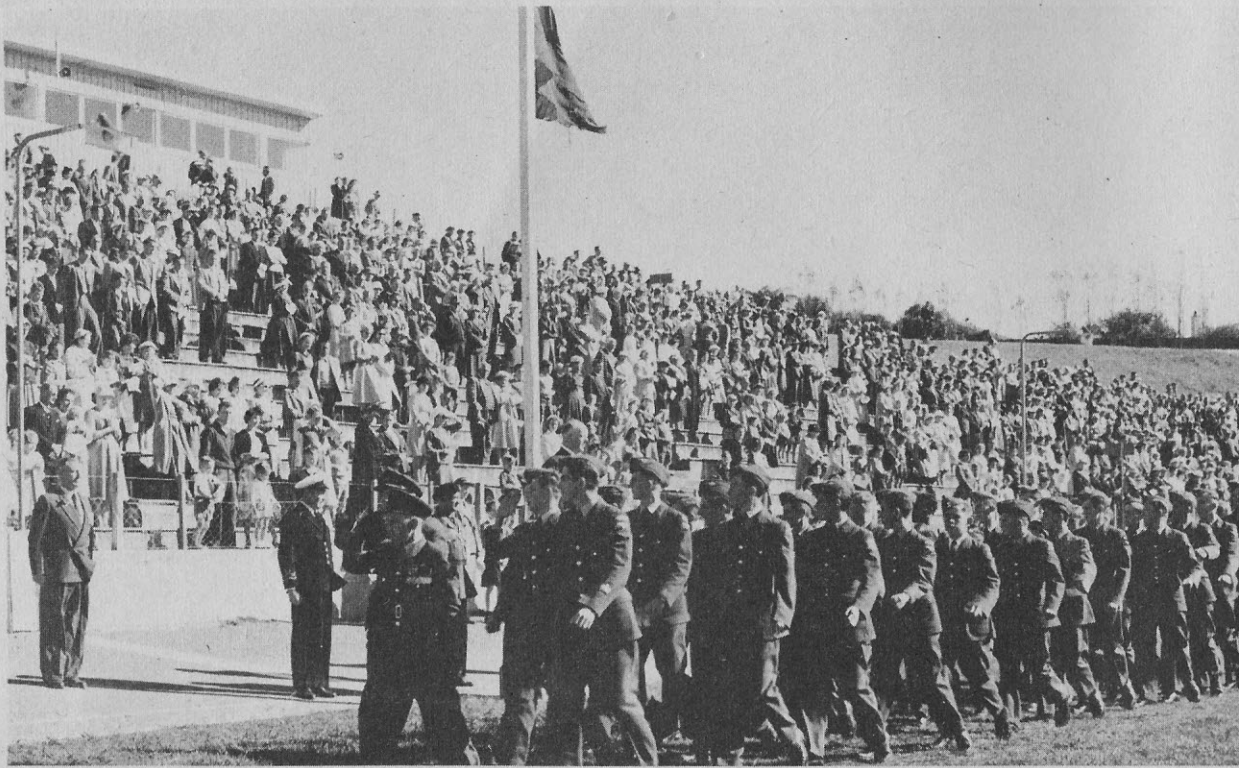

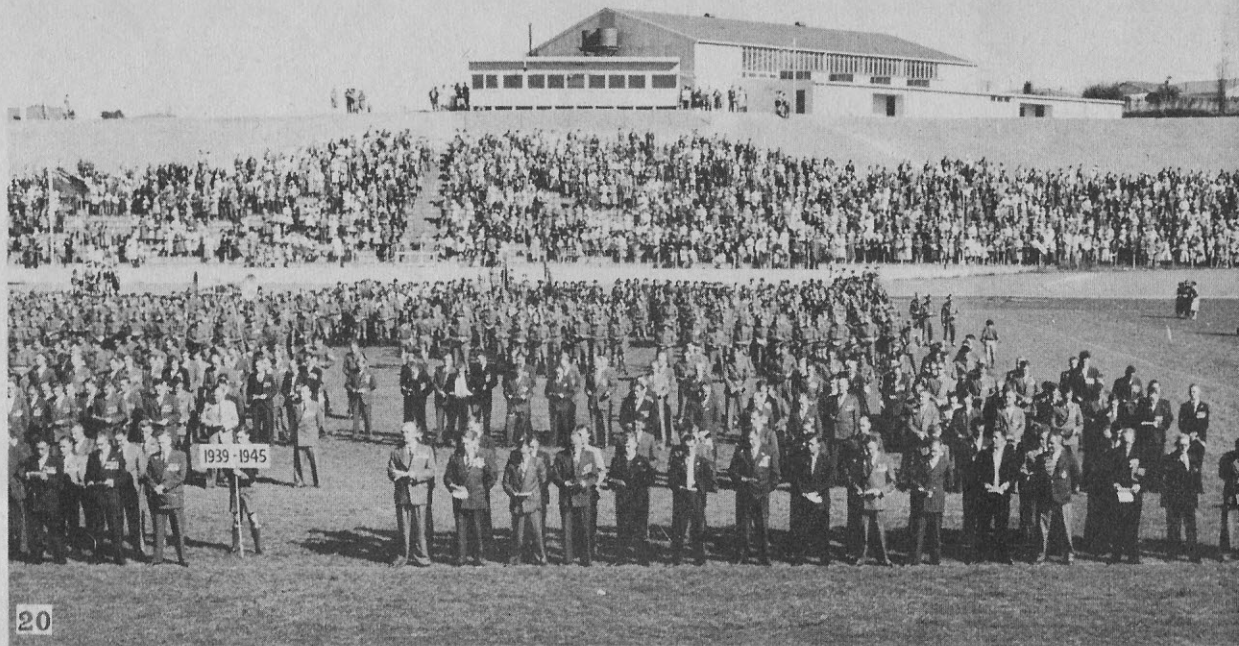


Anzac Parade in New Plymouth

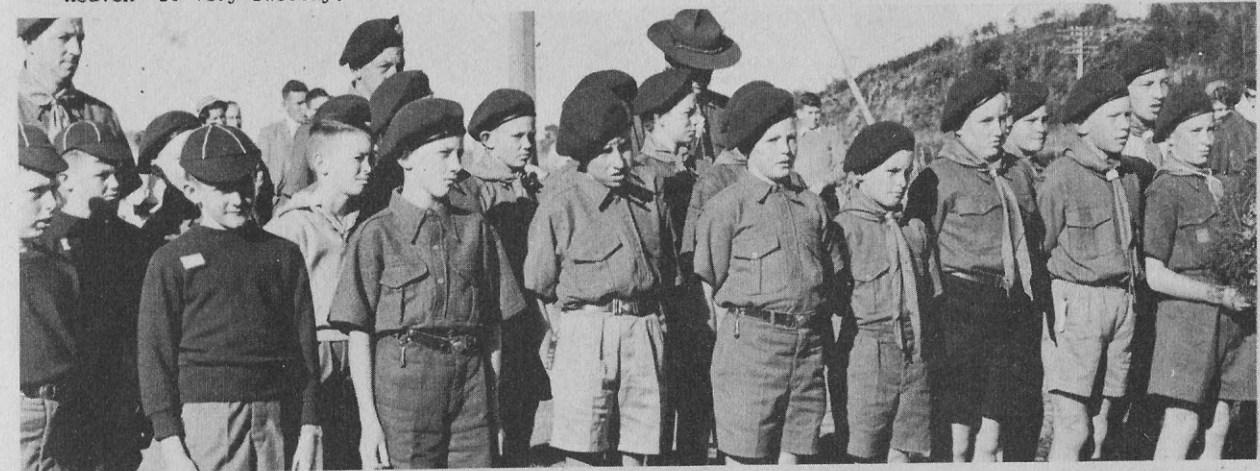

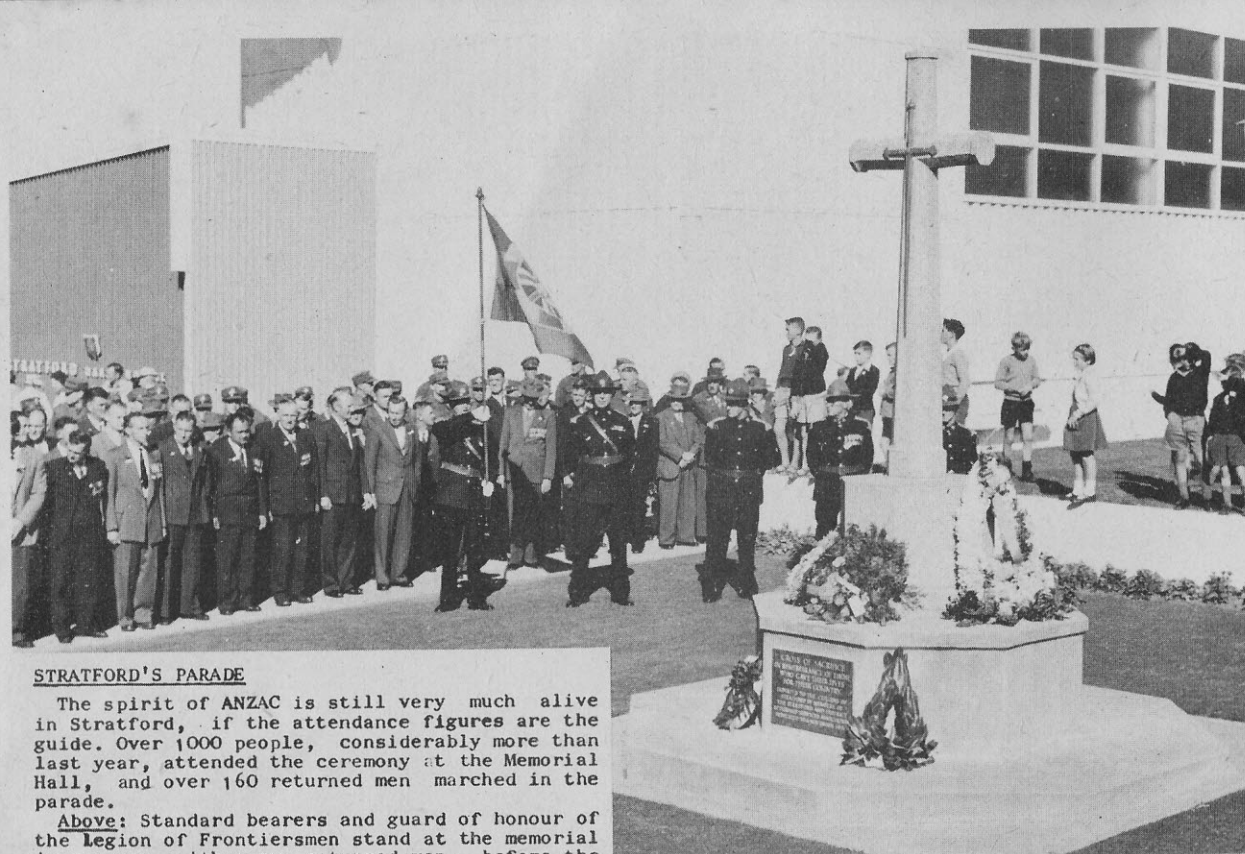

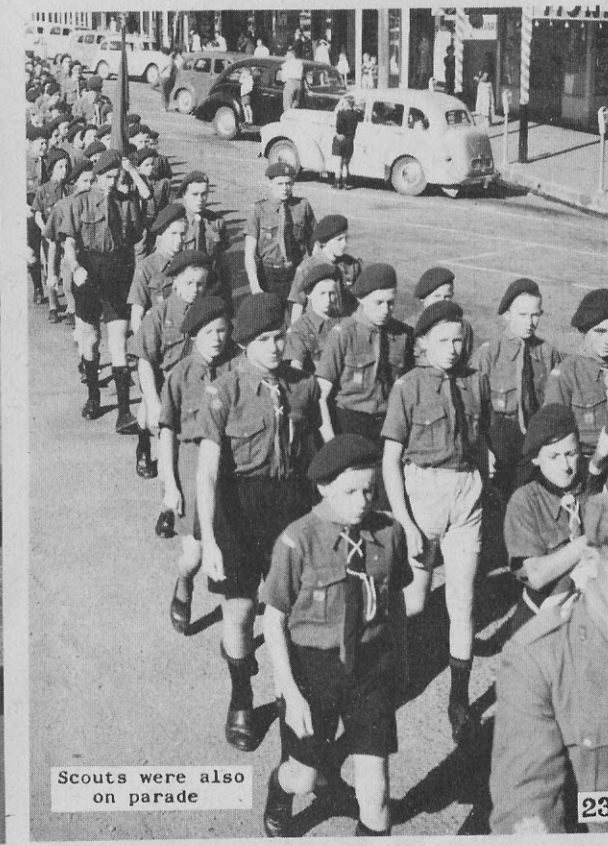

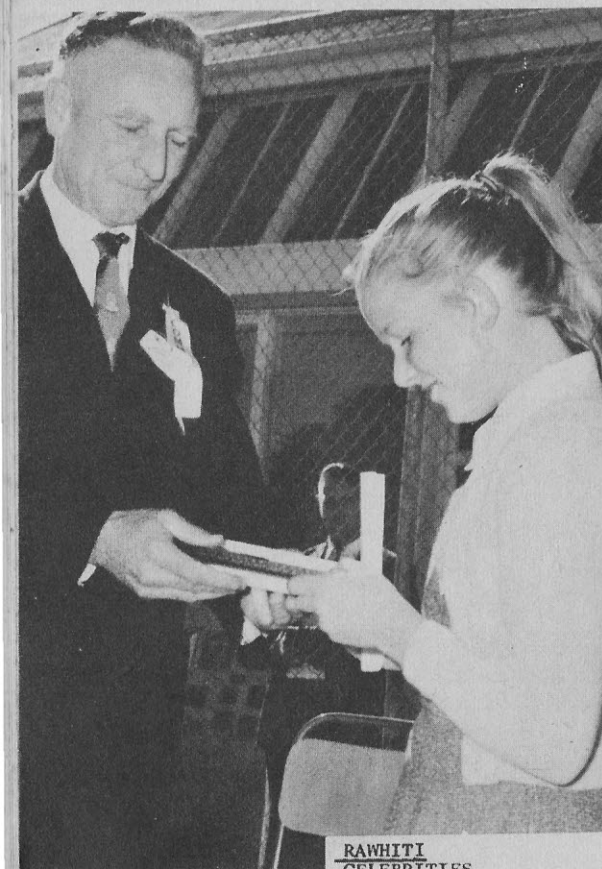

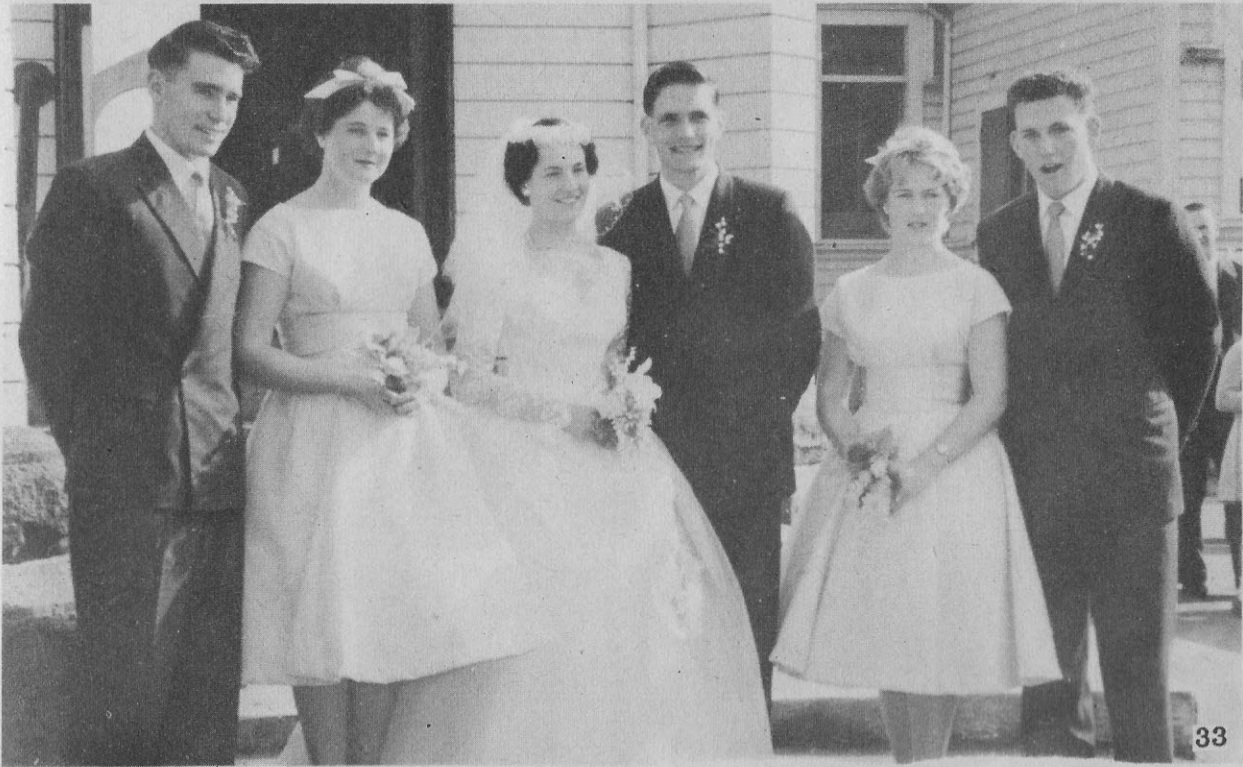

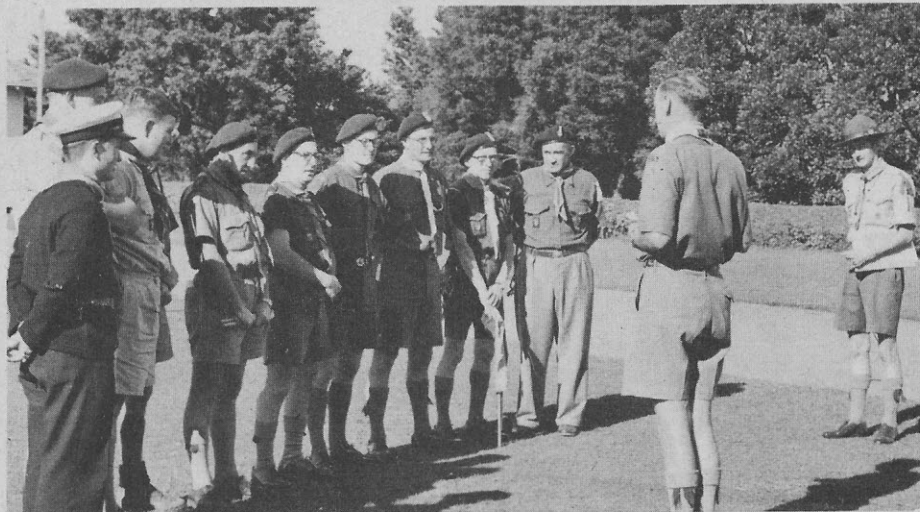

Course For Taranaki Scoutmasters

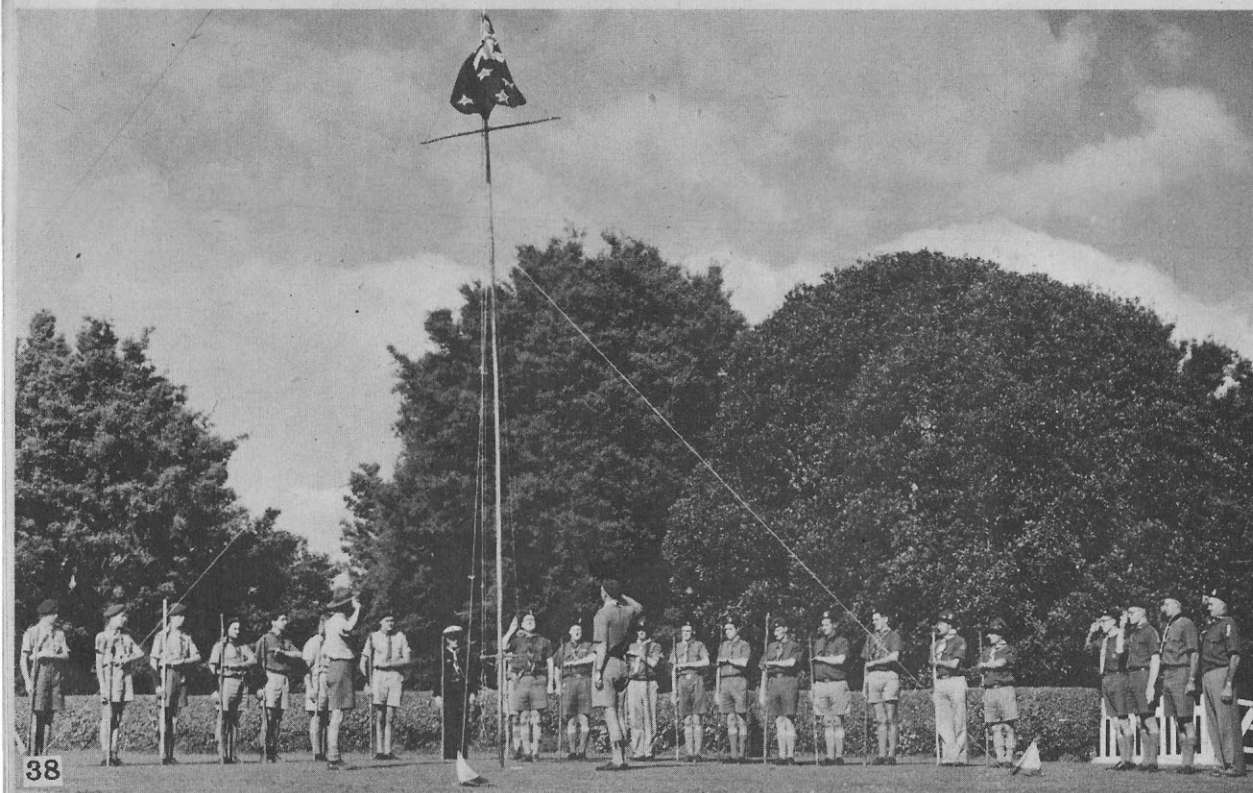

There were practical demonstrations in basic scouting principles and methods included in a very full and active week-end.

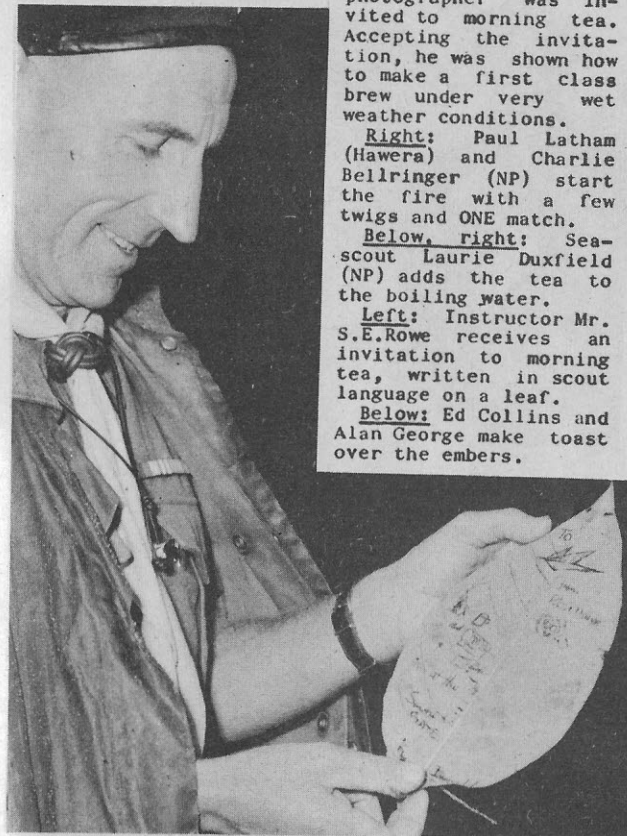

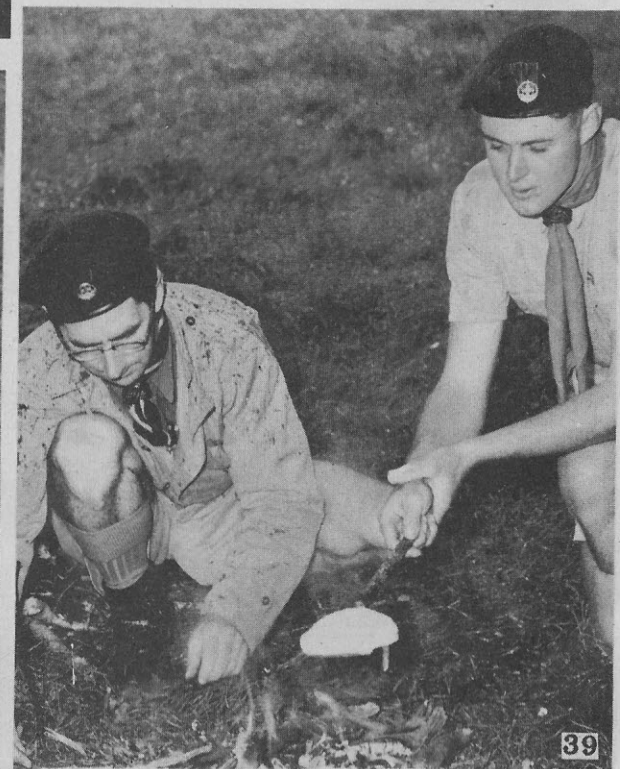

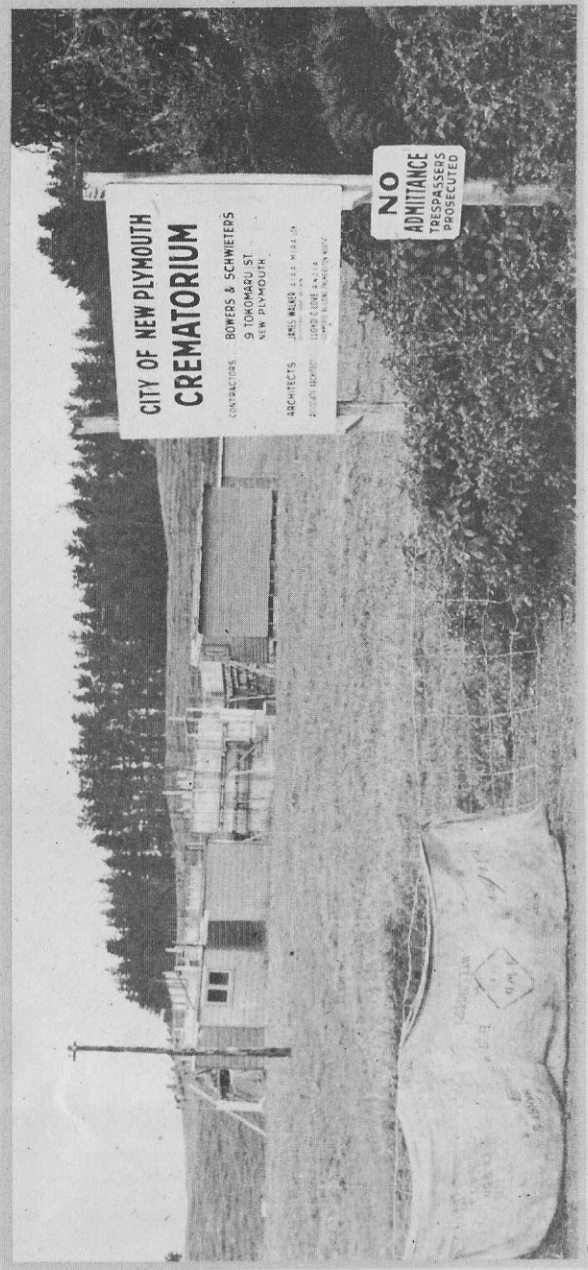

N.P. Rowing Club's Successful Season

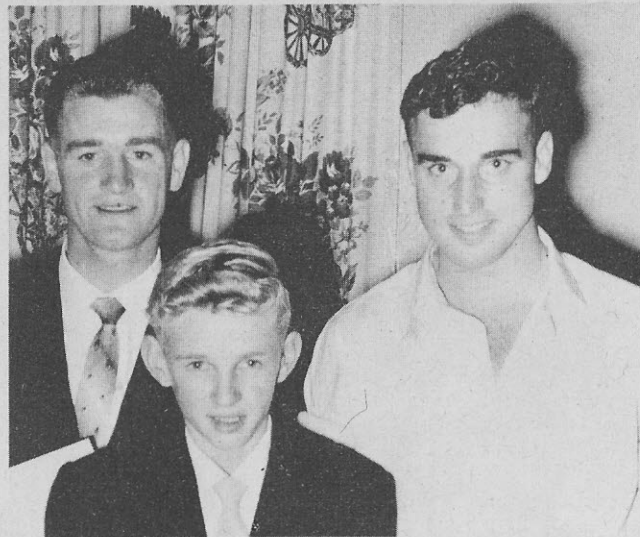
