






MAGNIFICENT NEW Whiteley Church


Taranaki's Life-Saving Rocket Goes into Orbit



The team, led by Alec Draper, is now fitted out with the latest in rocket life-saving apparatus. The rocket and other life-saving gear were tried out recently on the Rewa Rewa rifle range, with great success. The rocket head is capable of carrying a line to a distance of over 500 yards, such is its power. This apparatus could save lives in marine, flooding, or mountain emergencies.




The Game...and a Good Win to Taranaki




Arbor Day Planting at Vogeltown


New Bridge for Waiwaka Terrace

New bridges for the district are the fashion these days, but for some, like the bridge over the Henui stream at Waiwaka terrace, renewal is long overdue. Built originally as a railway bridge, Henui stream at Waiwaka terrace, renewal is long overdue. Built originally as a railway bridge, it has served a useful purpose, but with the traffic problems of today, has proved totally inade-quate for the area it serves, besides being a source of danger to the pupils of the NFGHS, who were the most frequent users of the bridge. 
