










### **Tangled Wrestlers**





### **Dog Training Made Easy**






#### Waitara Boxing Tournament








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


# Children's Art Exhibition











The new railway station at Stratford is fast nearing completion, as our photograph shows. The new station will be both bright and modern, and contain most of the modern conveniences associated with this type of building.








#### **Unwelcome Visitors**




# Merriland Boys' Club Team
