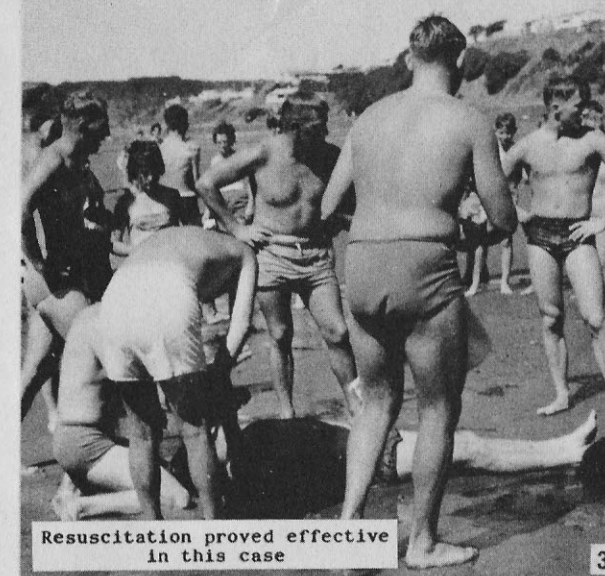

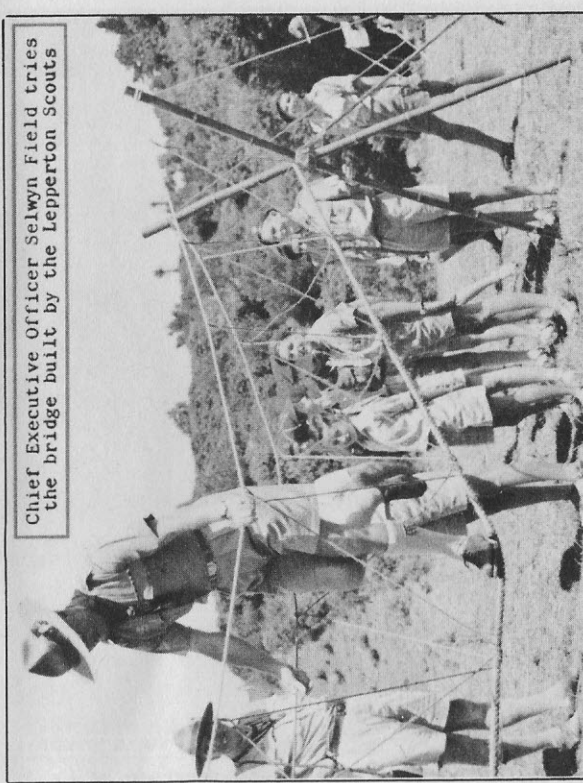




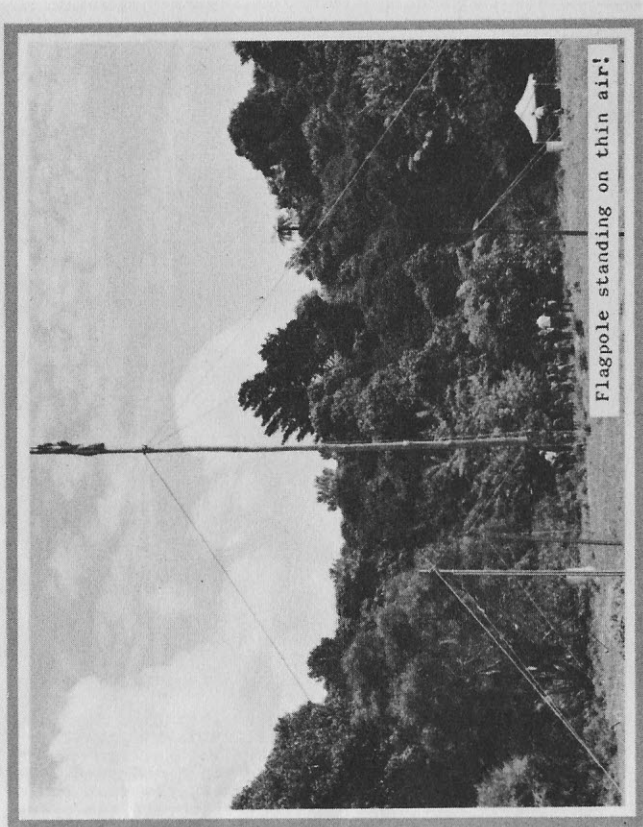
Commonwealth Chief Scout Visits New Plymouth

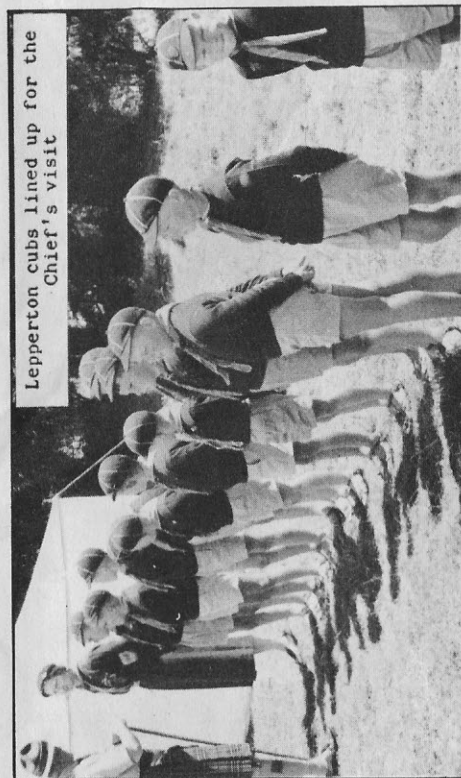

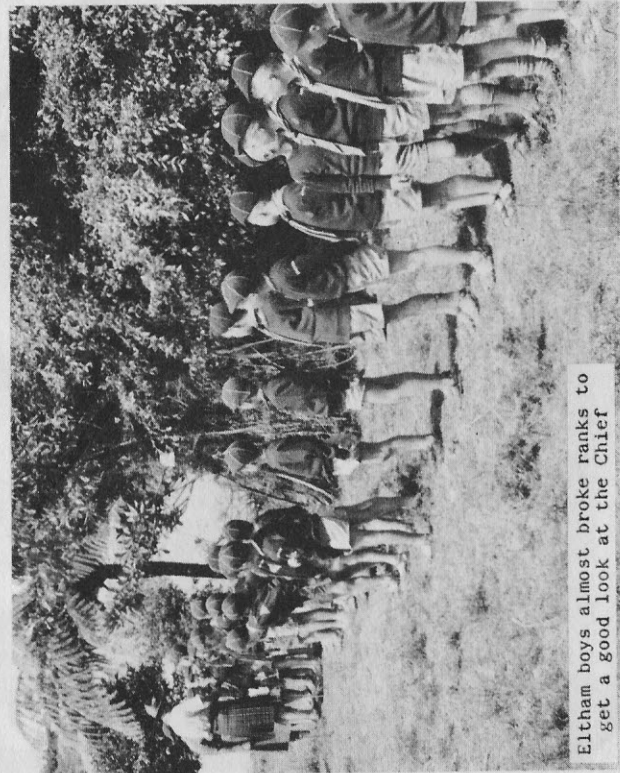

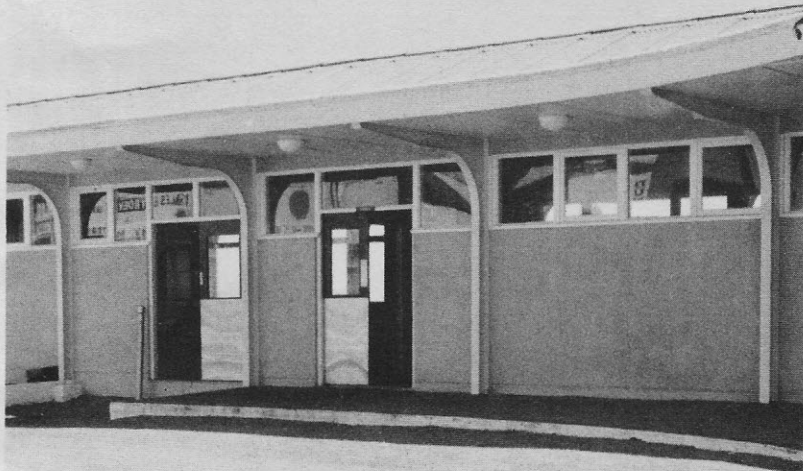

New Railway Station

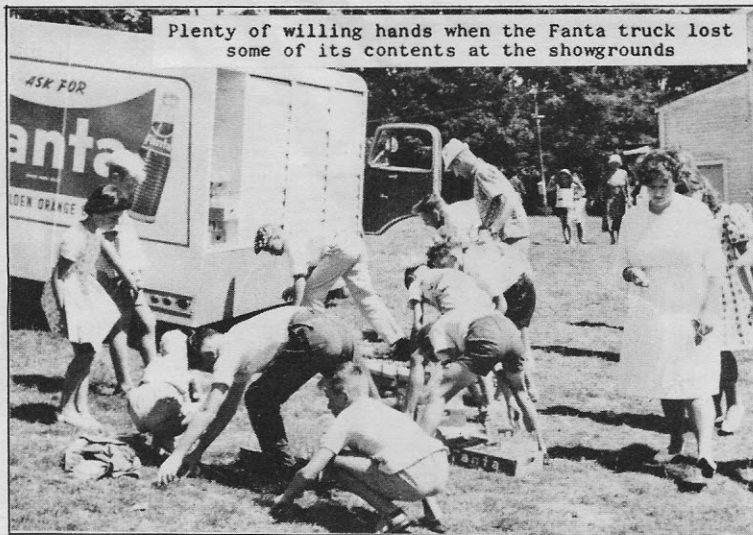

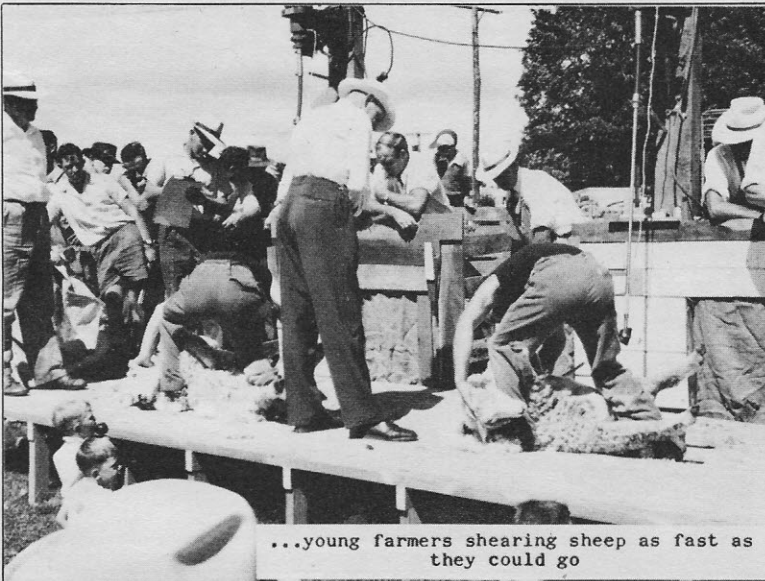
Stratford Highland Games

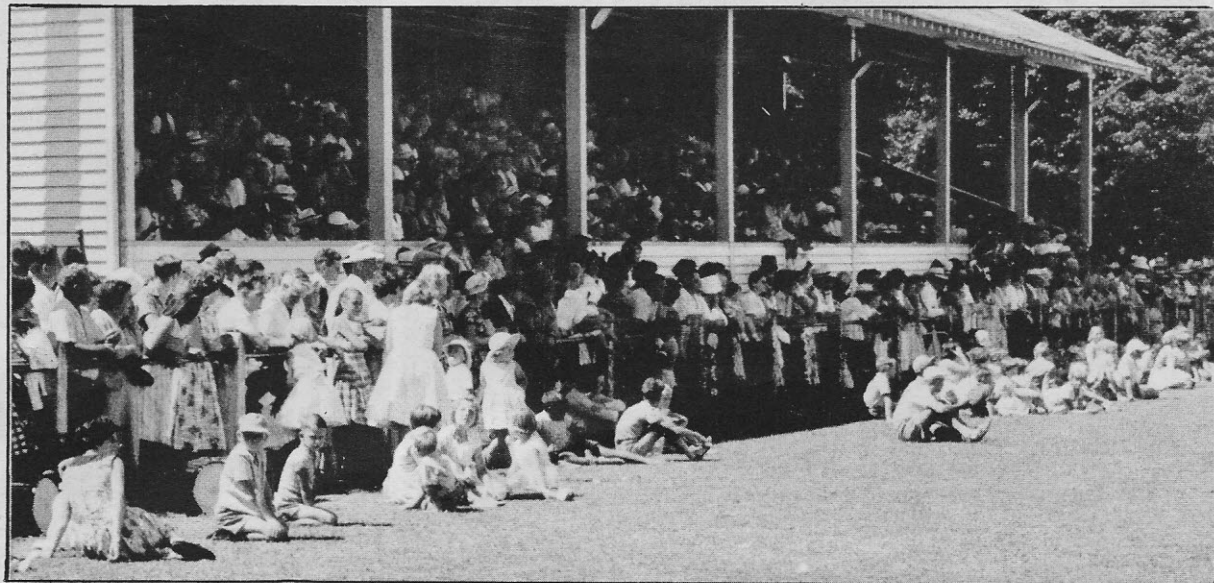

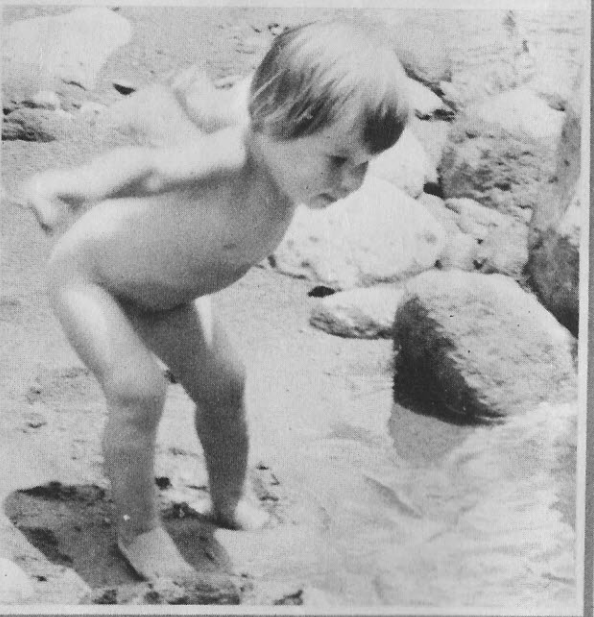

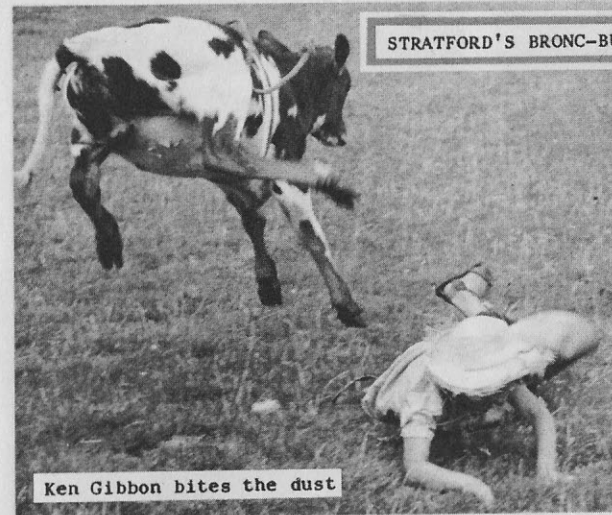

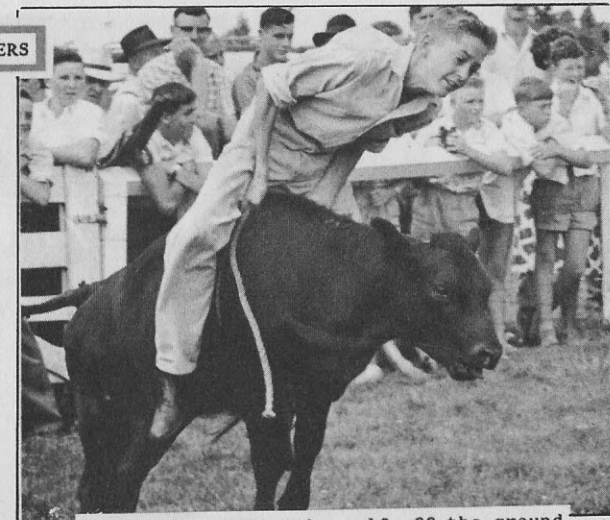

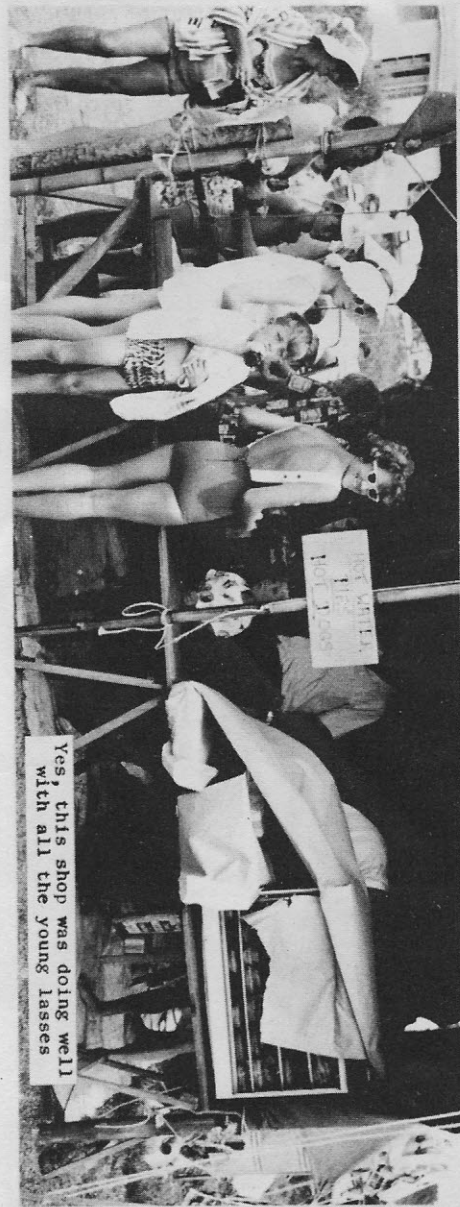

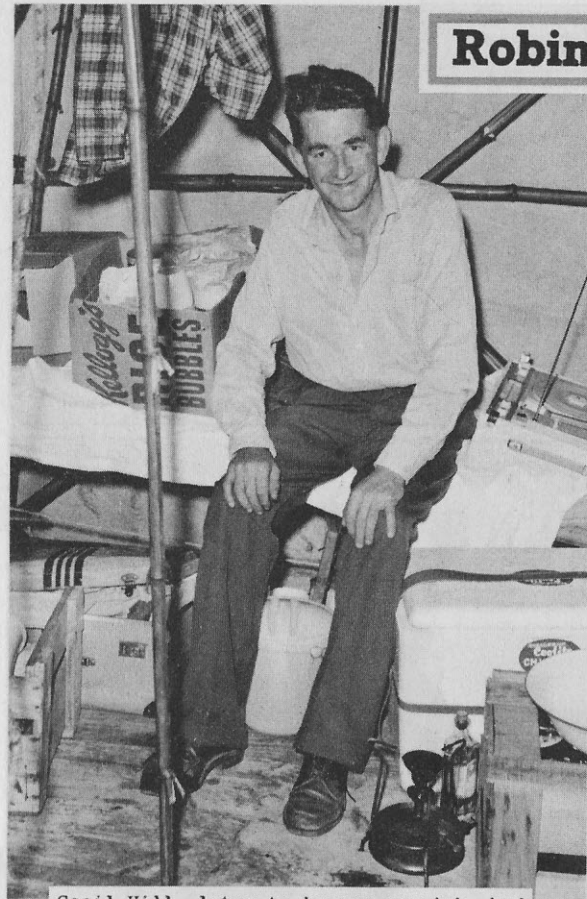

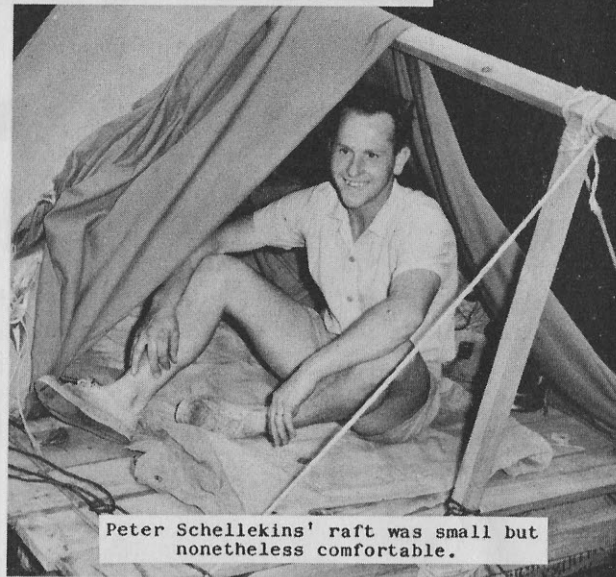

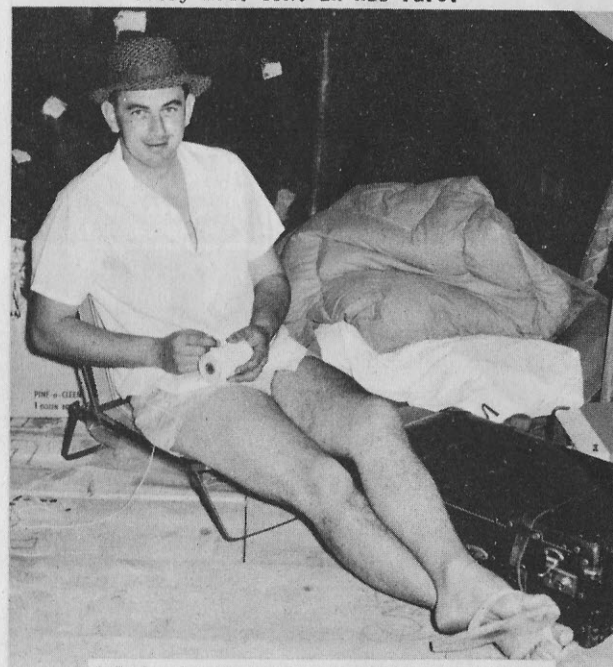

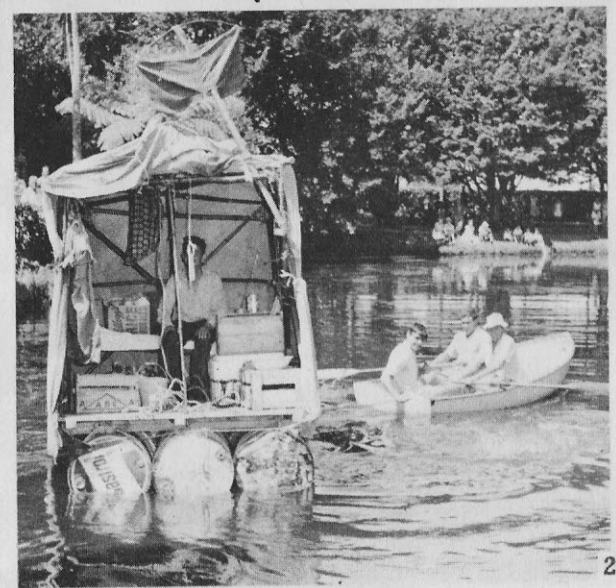
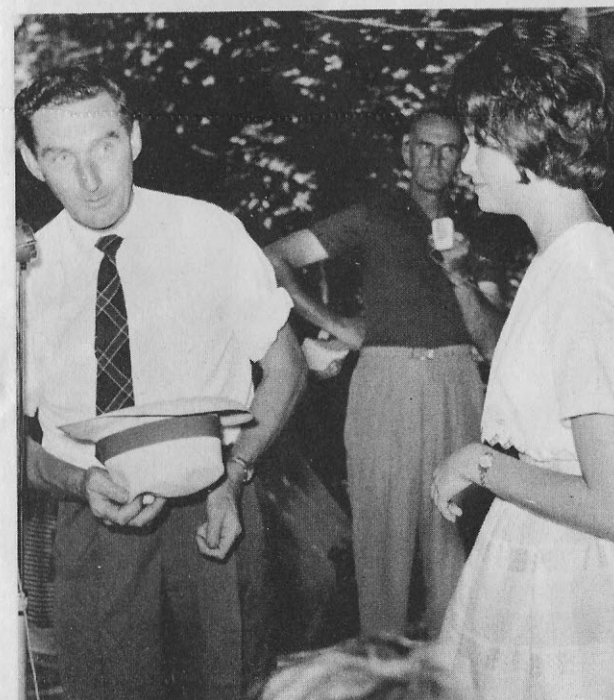

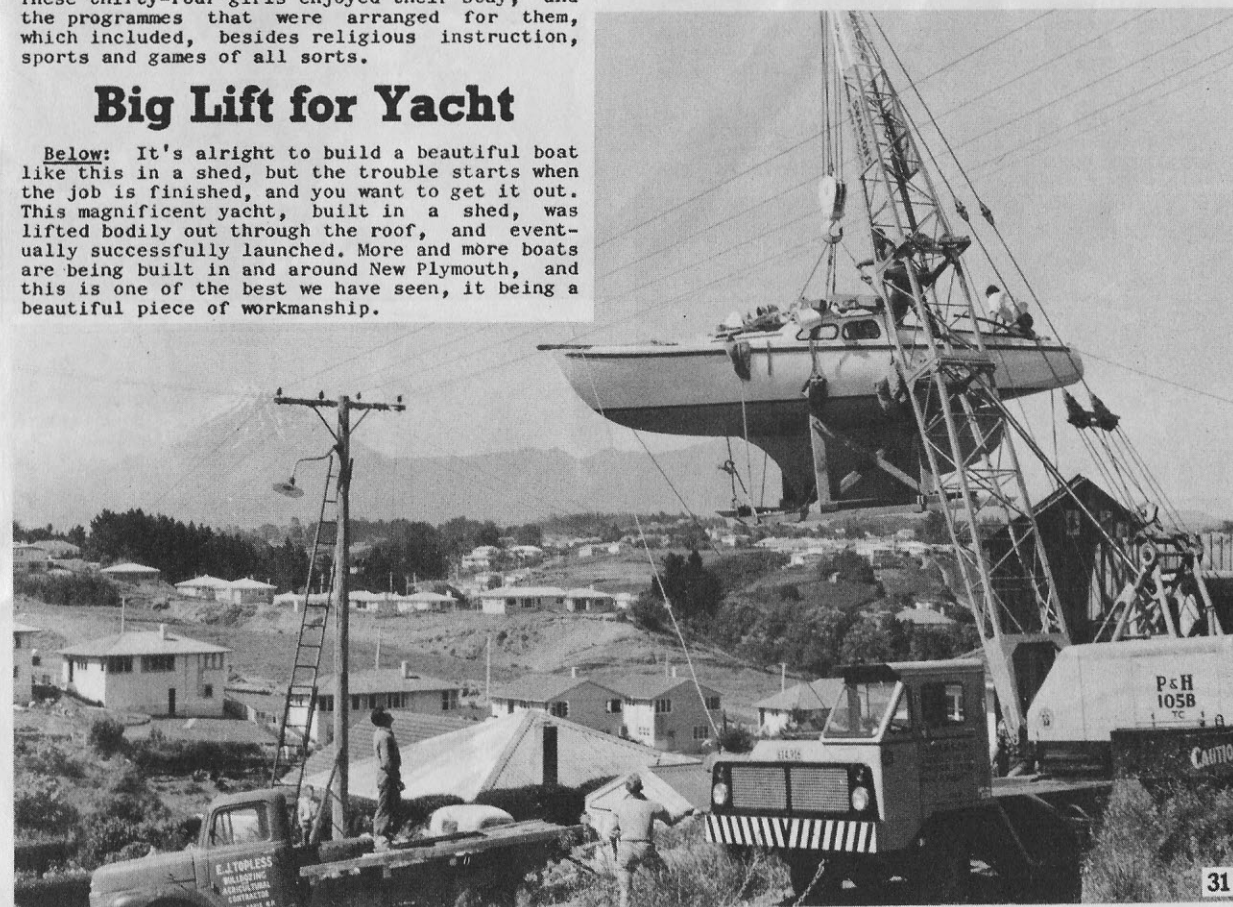


Presbyterian Campers

Taranaki Open Fours A Popular Tournament

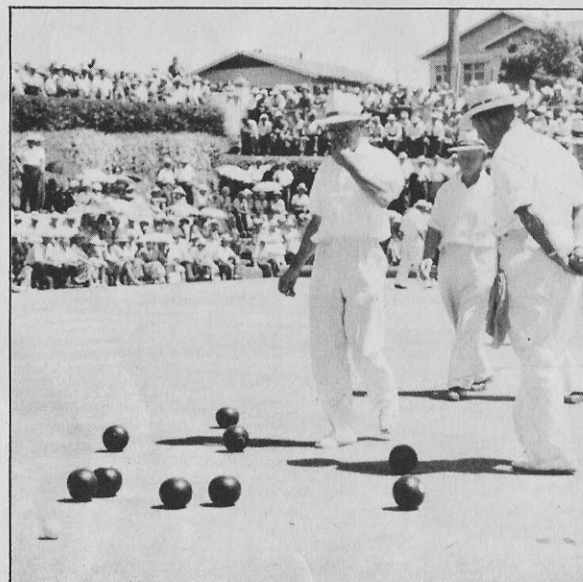

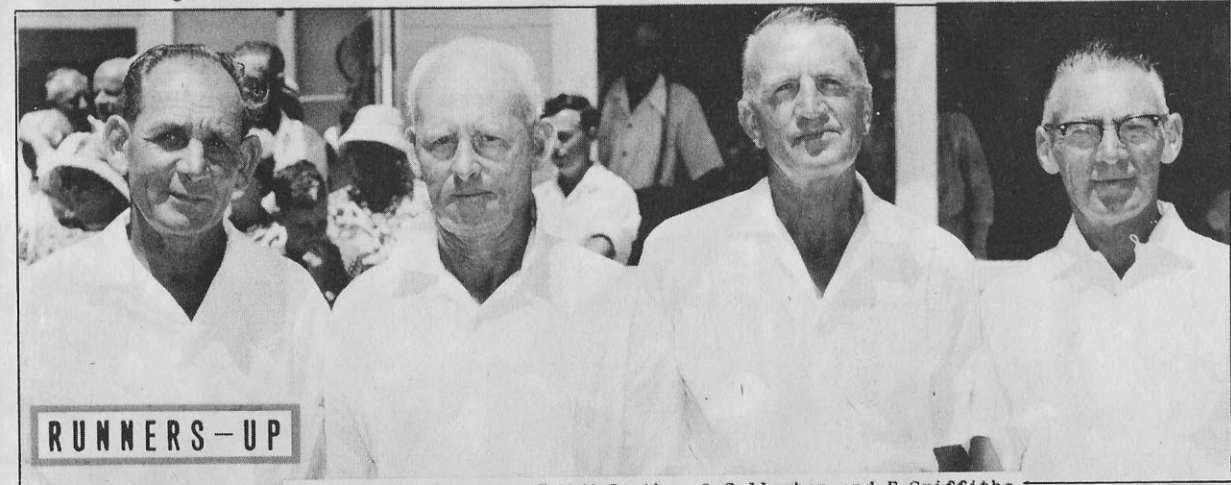

Miss Taranaki 1962 Contest

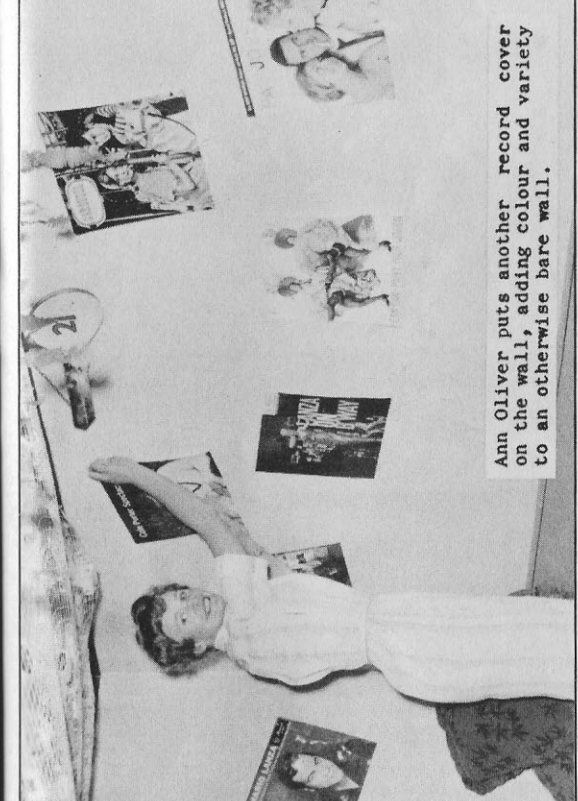

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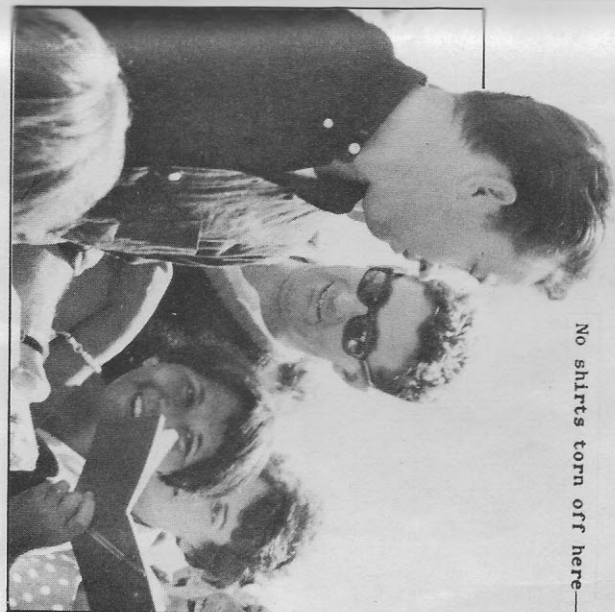

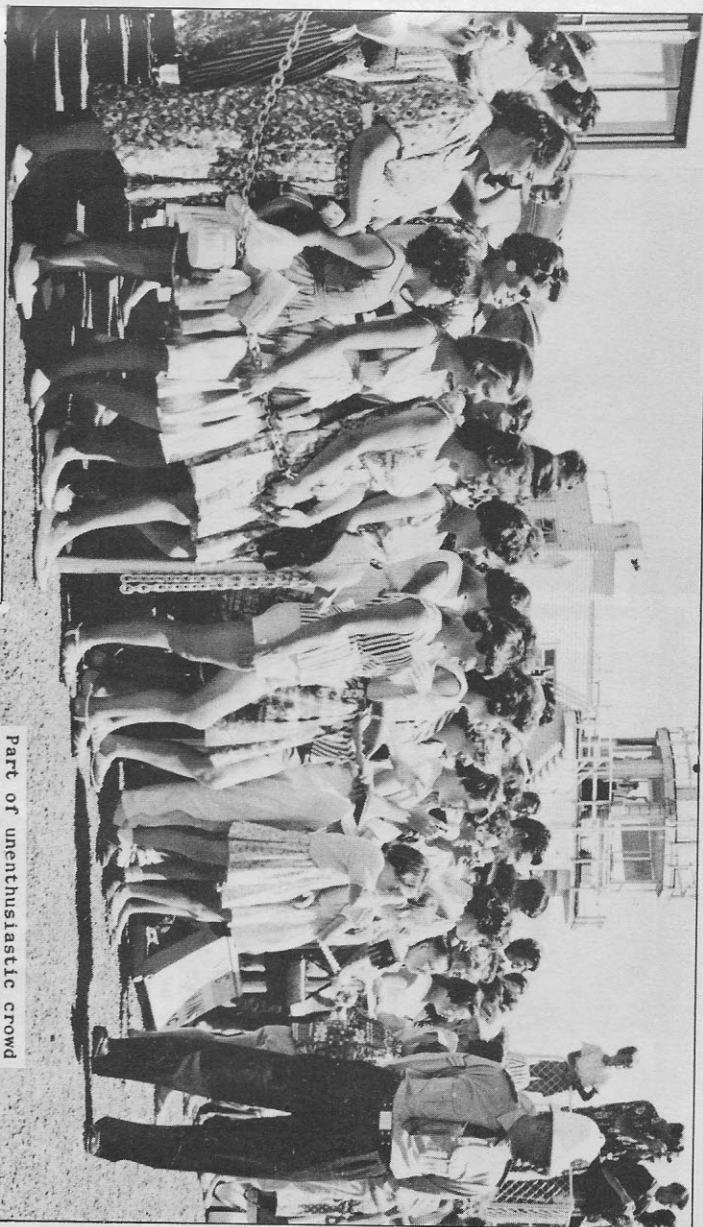

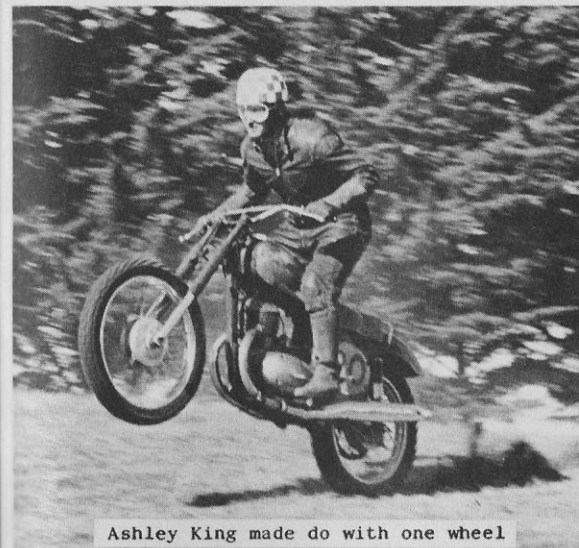

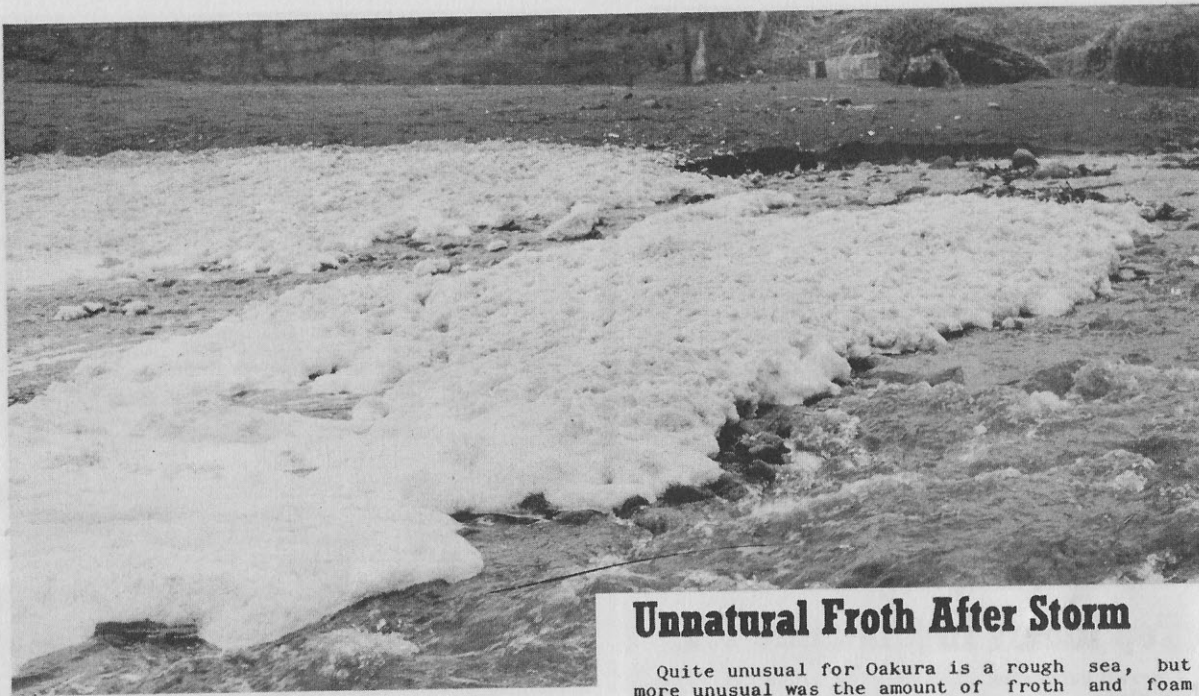

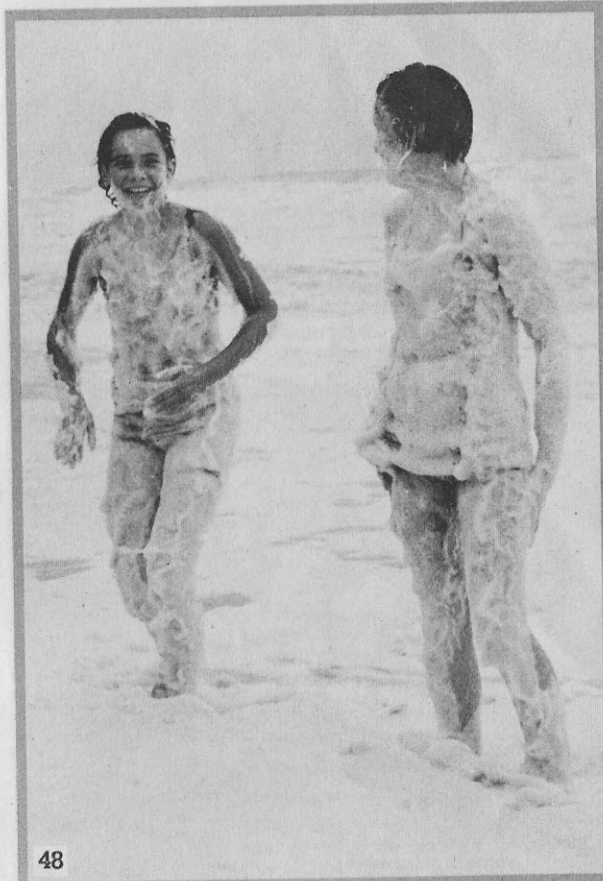
Unnatural Froth After Storm

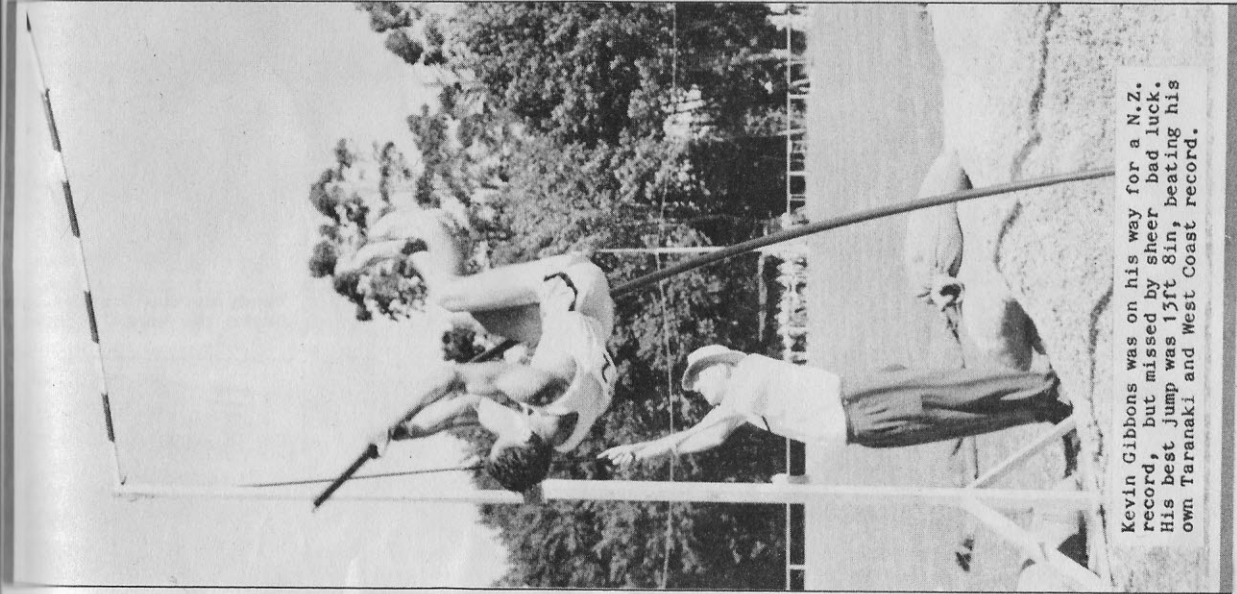

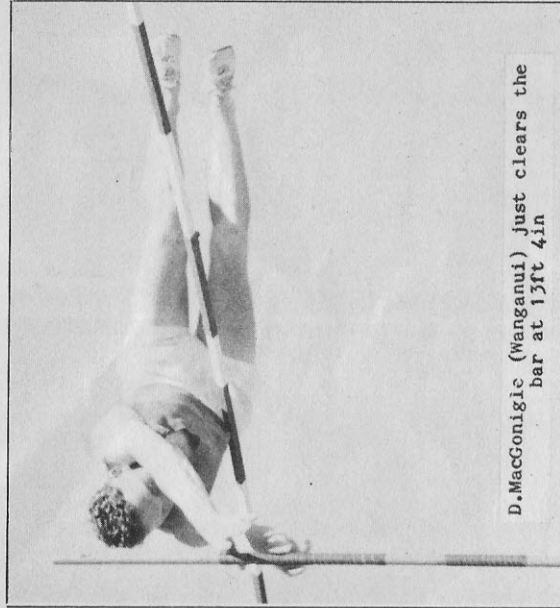

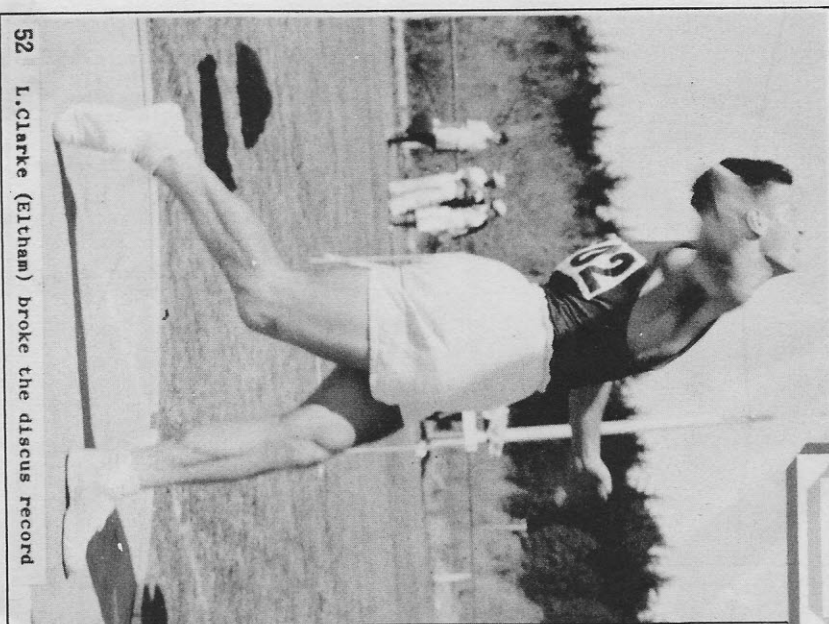

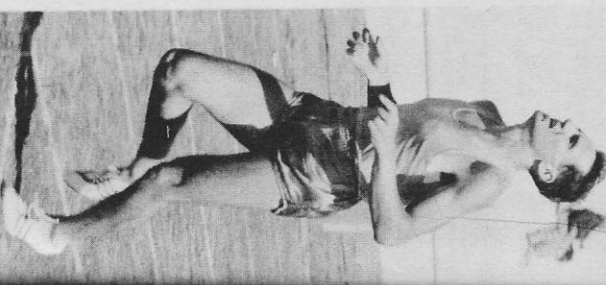

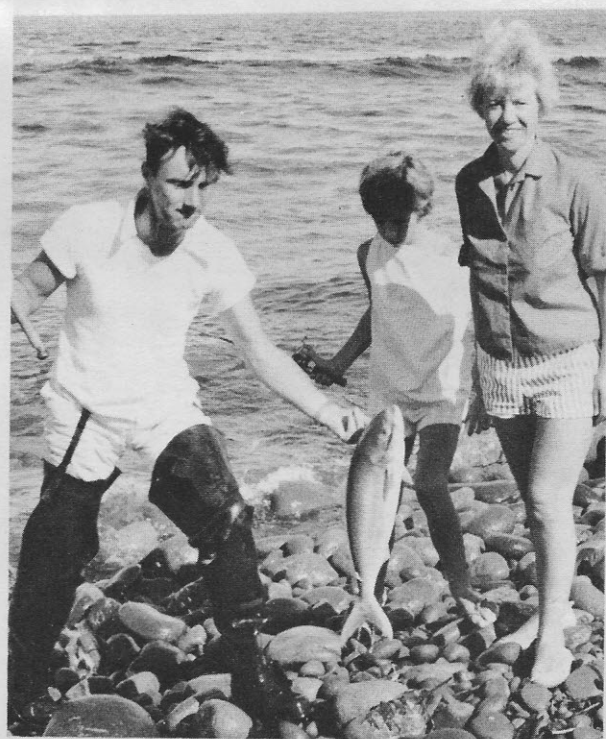

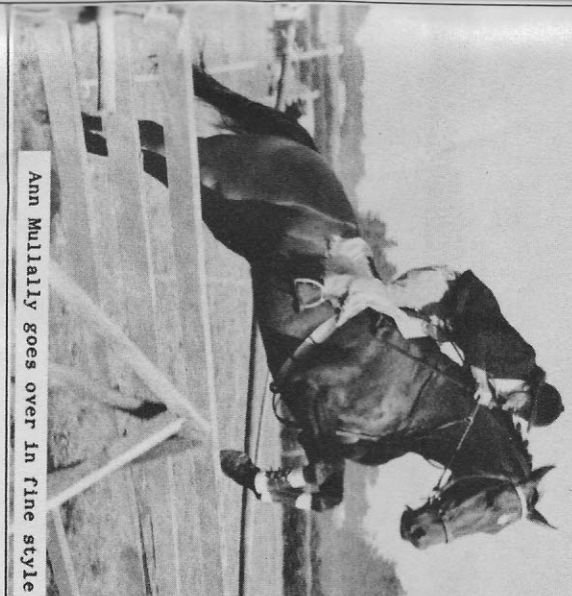

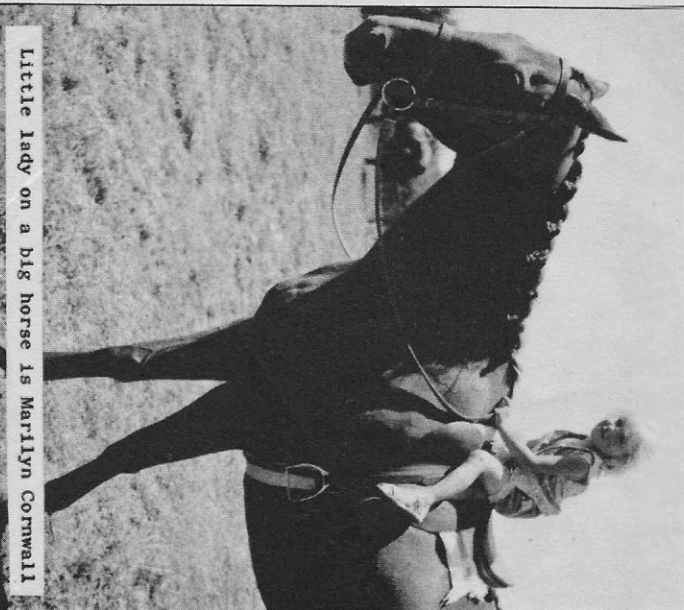
