#### Heavy Rain In The City Made Streets Hazardous



Striking in the early hours of the morning, the tornado swept in from the sea, and cut a path of damage across Devon Street East, and whirled its way across the back of Waiwhaka terrace, where it seemed to have disappeared. The result of this phenomenon was evident in the form of blown-down sheds, iron torn from roofs, and general damage to fences.






















Above, left: Semi-finalists in the light-heavyweight division provided plenty of action. They were D.Feaver (Stratford) and G.Newport (Manaia).









#### **New Police Station Opened**






#### St. Mary's School Presents "Mikado"




#### Old Building To Come Down





















#### The Changing Face Of New Plymouth City









Above: The New Plymouth railway station in the year 1896. Quite a different skyline from the photograph below, taken only a few days ago. The bridge in the foreground of the old photograph is still in use today, and in fact, was used by our photographer for the picture below. So, in the space of 66 years, there has been a marked alteration in both the station and the skyline from vantage point.





The two pictures on this page were both taken from the same spot at the intersection of Brougham and Powderham streets. What a marked difference there is in the two photographs. The old picture above shows far more buildings than the more modern one taken only days ago. It would seem that in this era, the business area began to creep up towards Marsland Hill, as the old picture shows, but now, it is more residential. The reason for the empty section on the corner in the bottom picture, is that it is reserved for the NZBC's new building to house station 2XP.






Above: Here is an old picture of Devon Street, which is almost unrecognisable, with the river bridge. The bridge is in almost the exact spot on which stands Newton King's bottom shop, just at the side of King's buildings. It is a far cry from the photograph below, which tells a completely different story; with a main thoroughfare that is a hive of hustle and bustle. We often wonder what it was like in Devon Street in those old days. Parking, or rather hitching, would not have been such a problem, and there would probably have been little danger from floods. New Plymouth, judging from the old photo, which we believe to be over 80 years old, must have been a peaceful little town.





Seventy years ago Brougham Street was a far different place to what it is today. These two pictures were taken from approximately the same spot, looking up Brougham Street from Devon Street. By the look of the weeds on the roadsides, the Council of that day was having a job keeping up with the maintenance. Note at top right the barracks on Marsland Hill, which in their day were defence headquarters against the threat of invasion in the Maori wars.






### Taranaki Beaten In Last Minute

#### McKechnie's Staff Raise £325 For Blind








#### Modern Buildings Planned For City









#### **Tame Professional Bout**




#### **Church Of Christ Celebrates Silver Jubilee**


