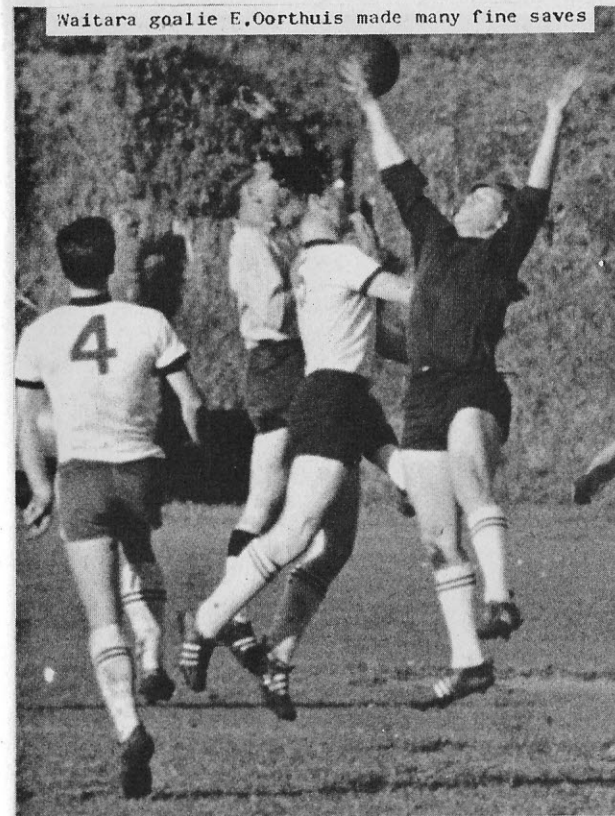

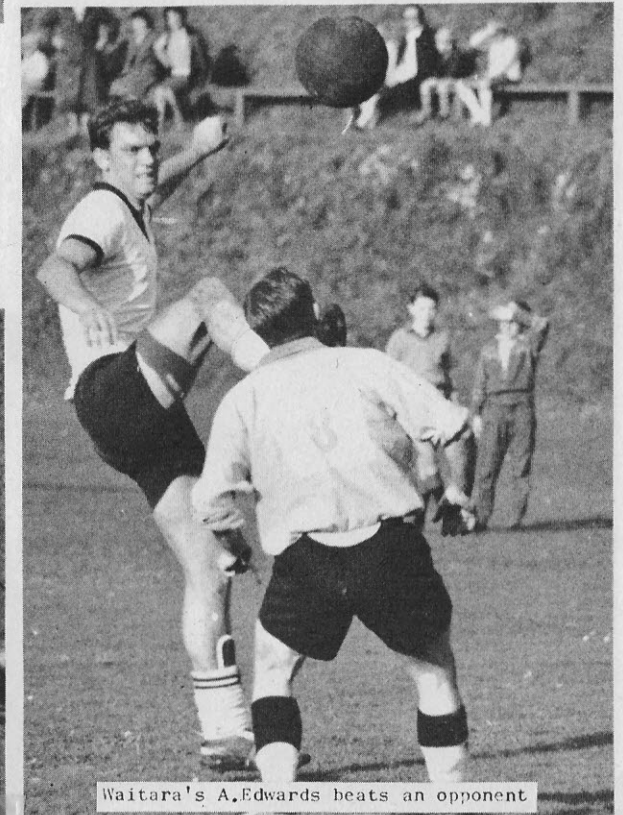

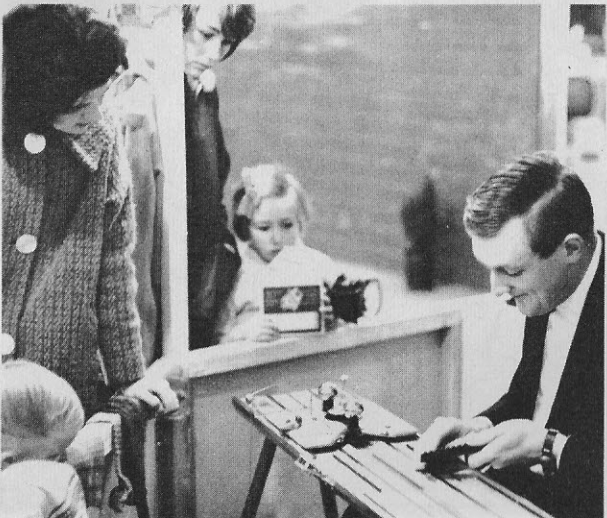
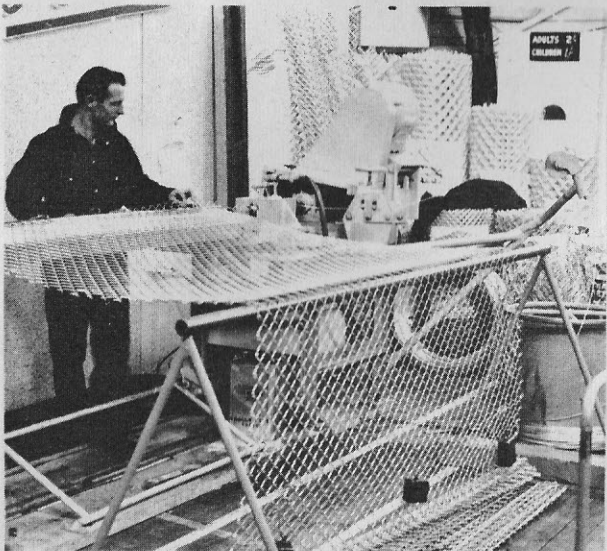

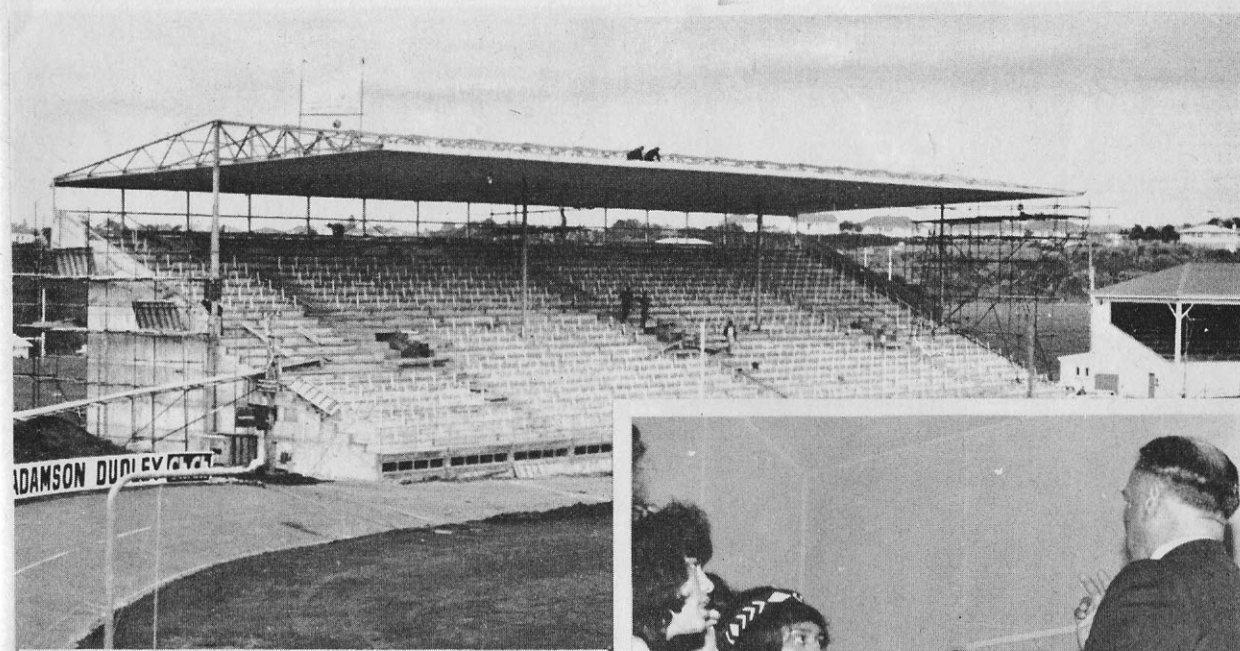

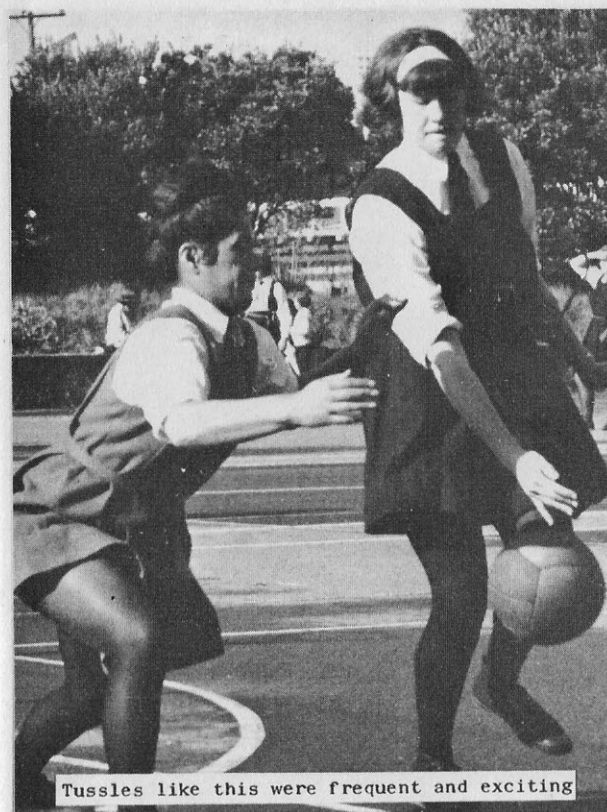

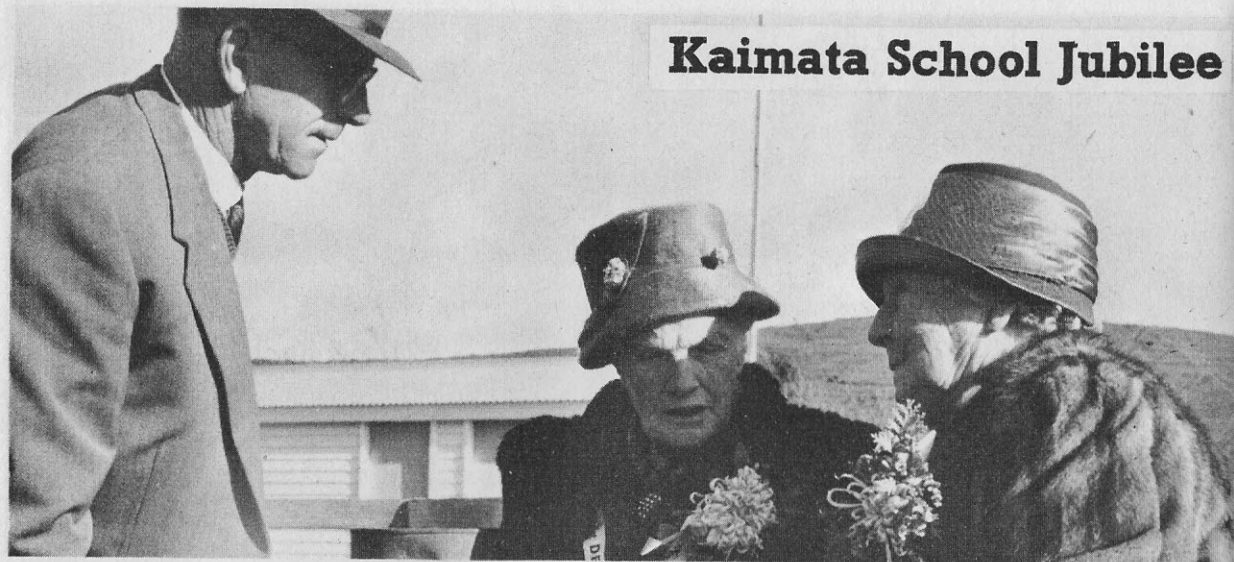

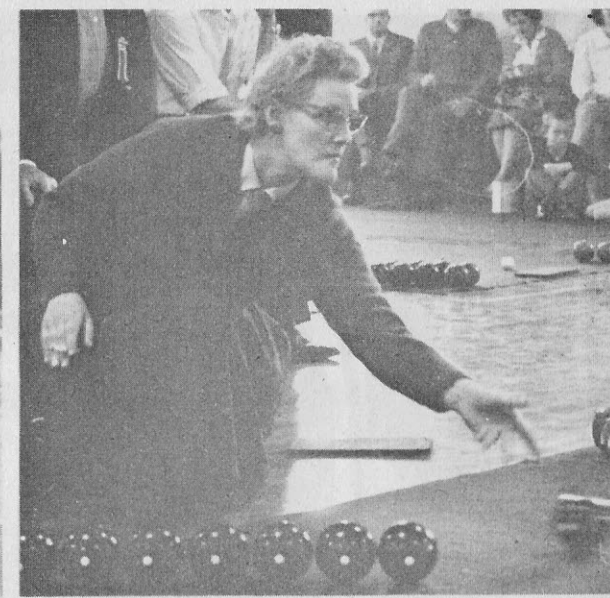

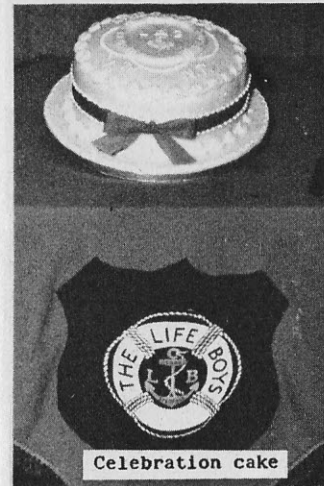

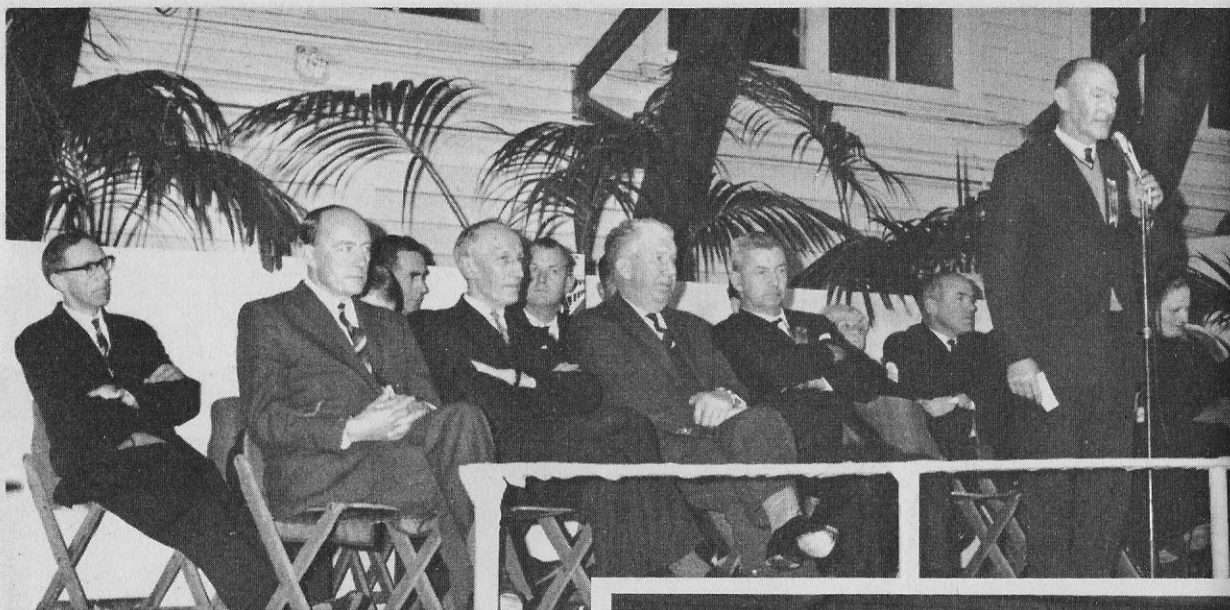

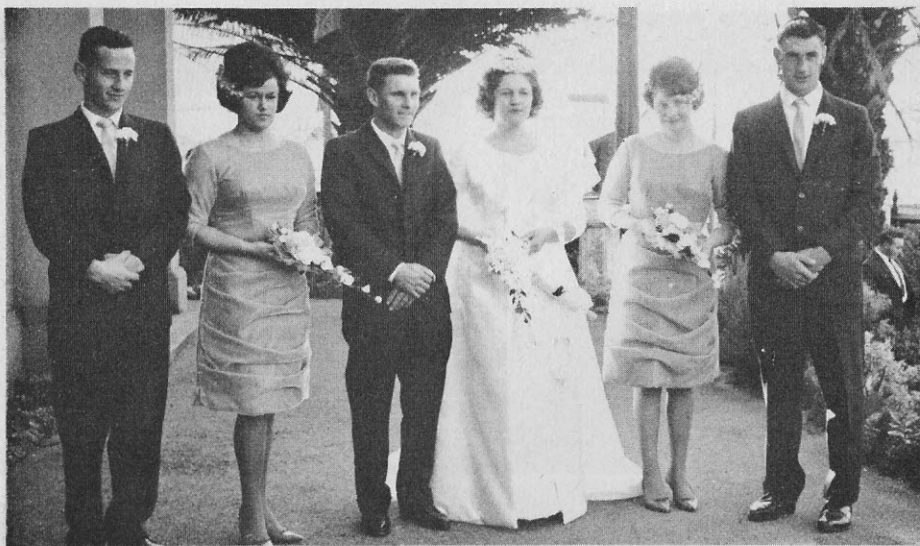

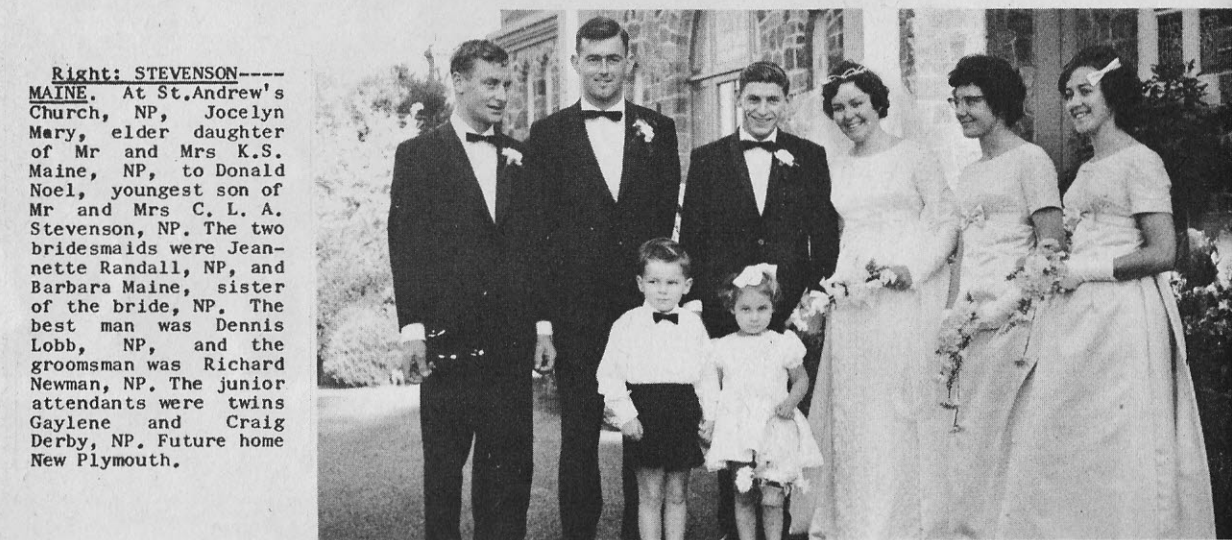

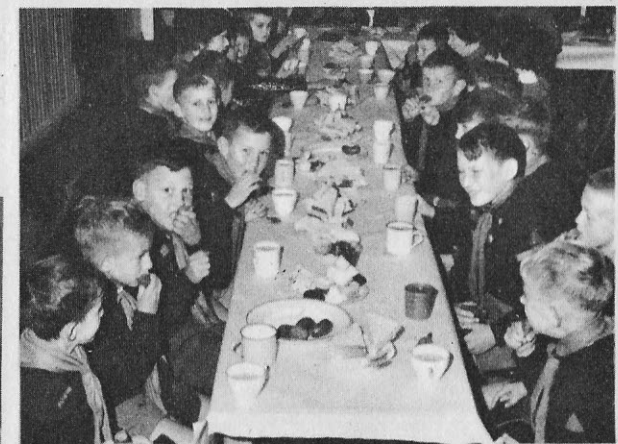

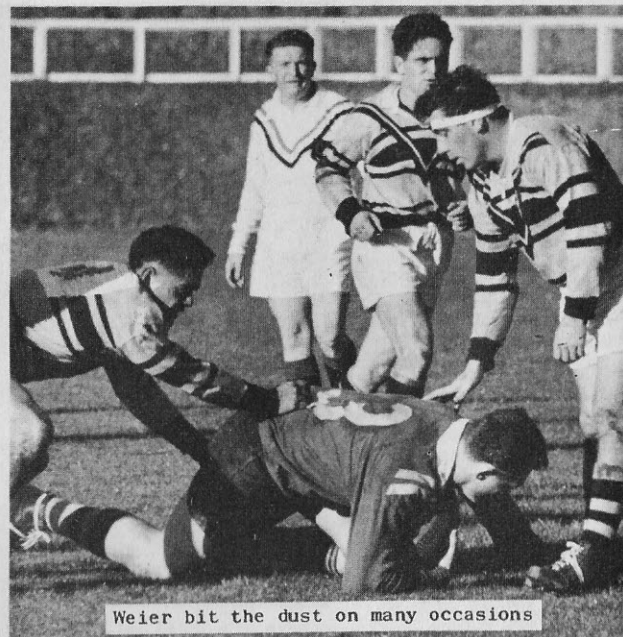

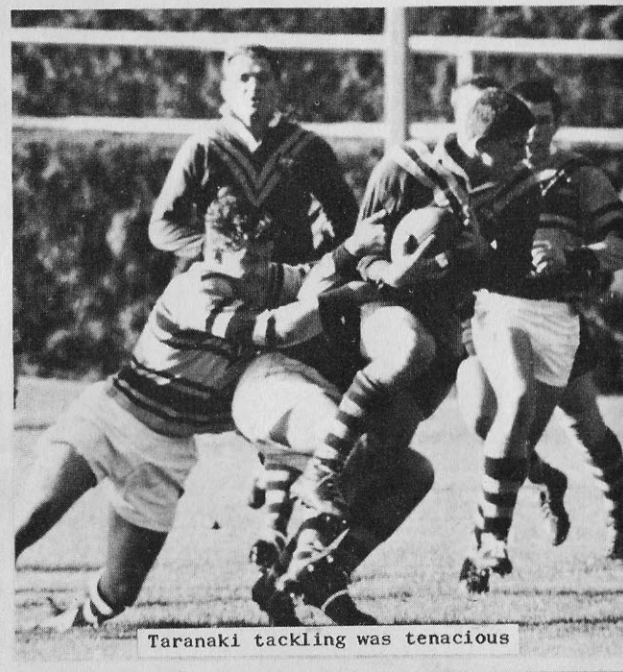

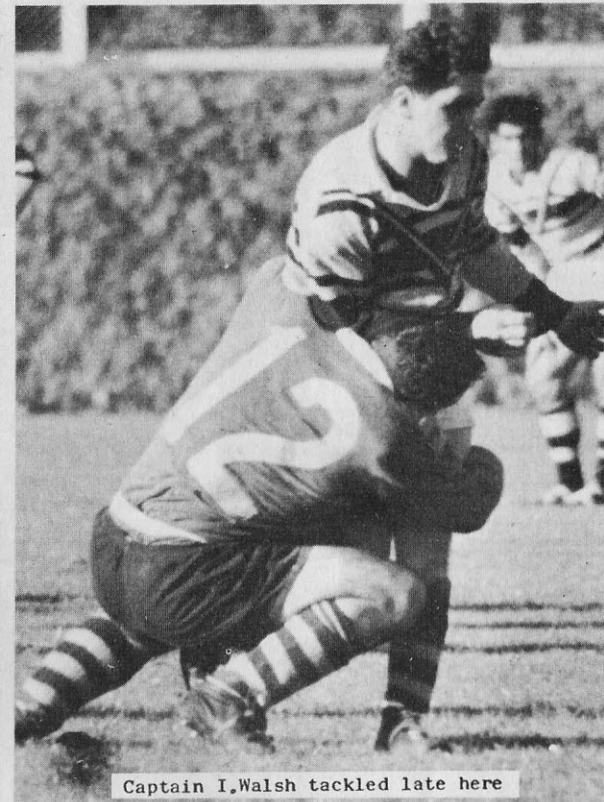

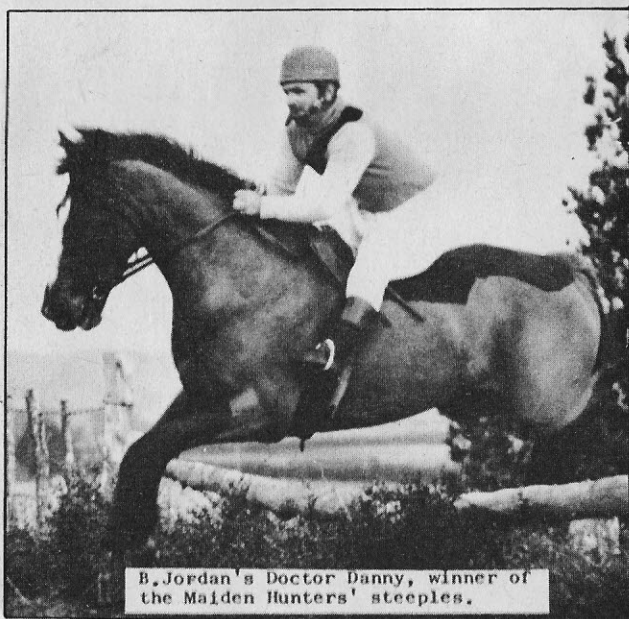


Steeplechase Meeting

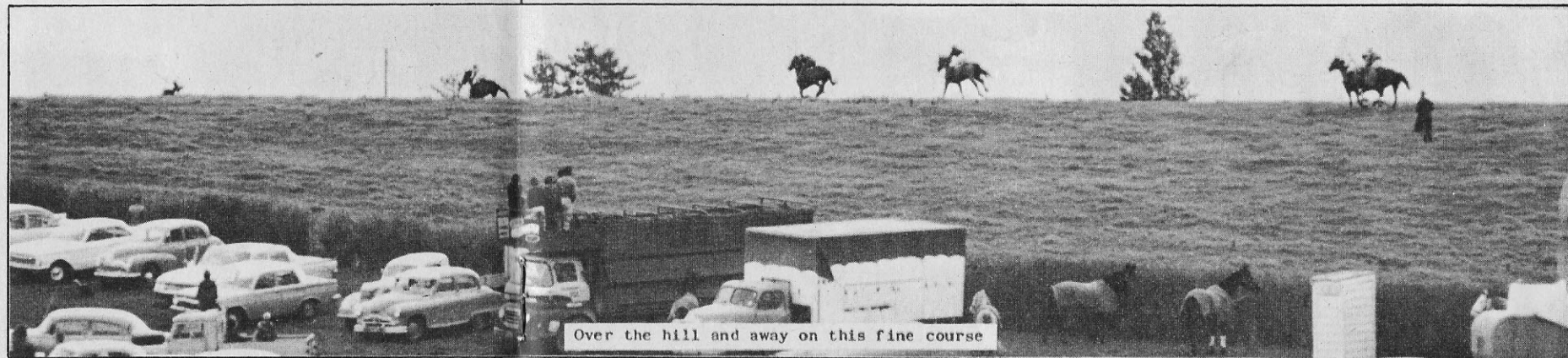

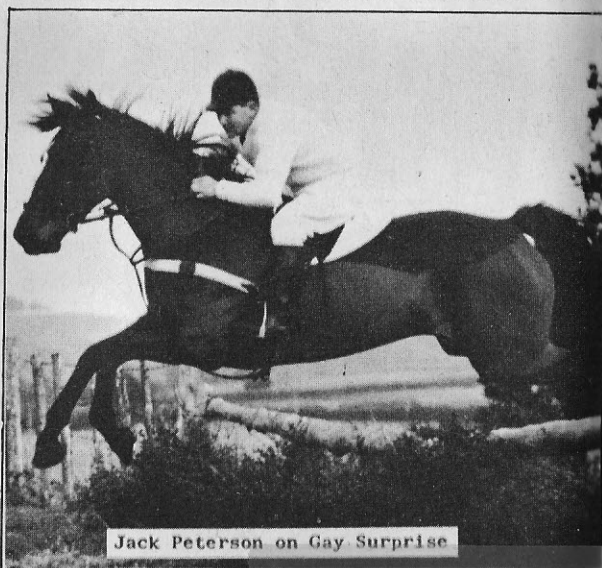

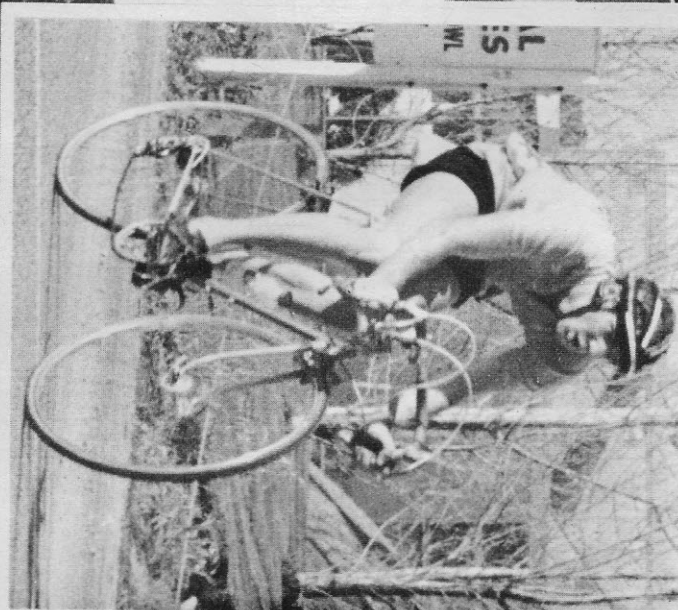
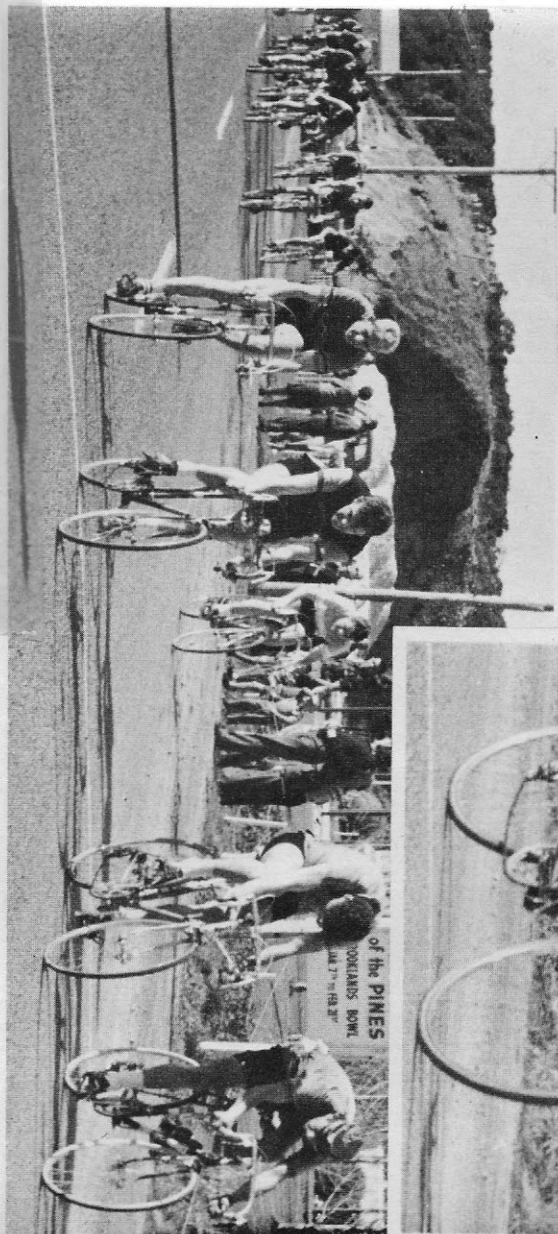
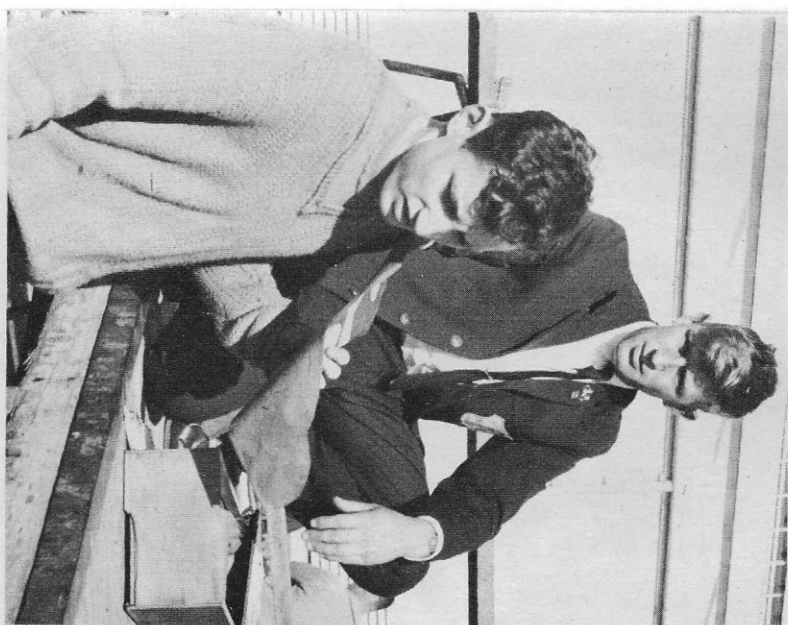


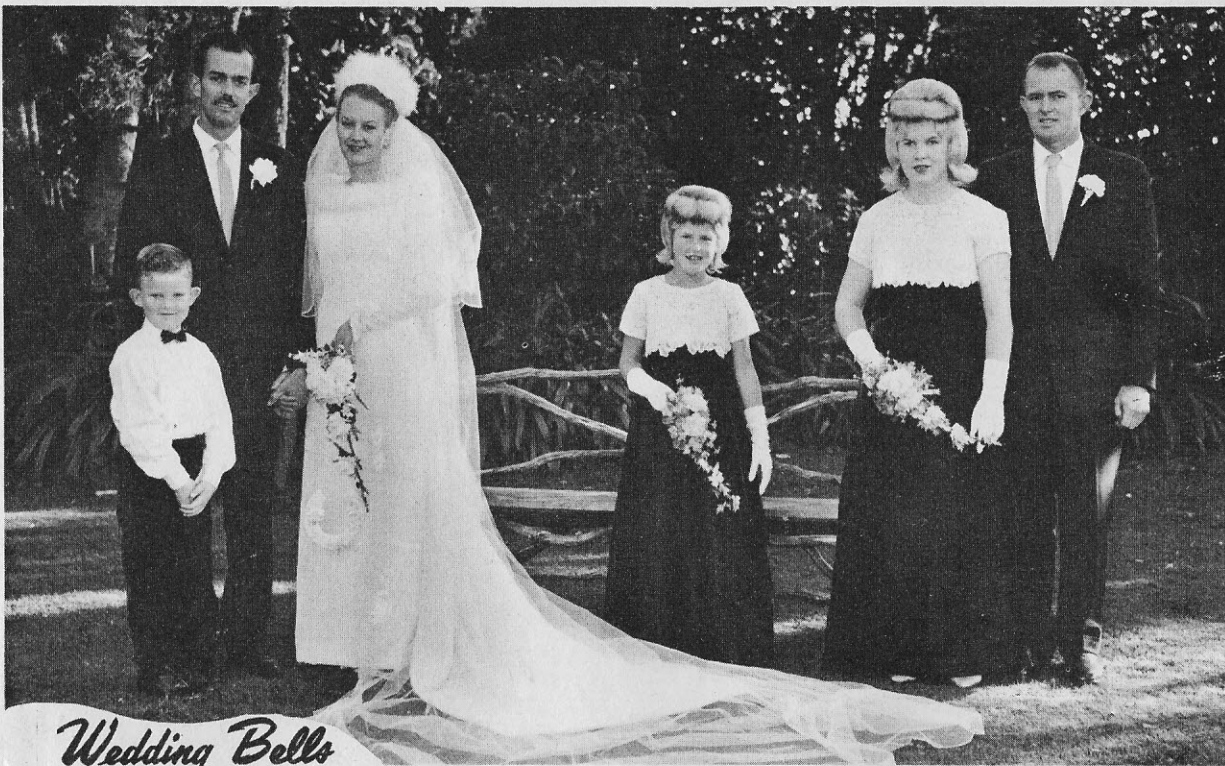
N.P. Club's Open "25"

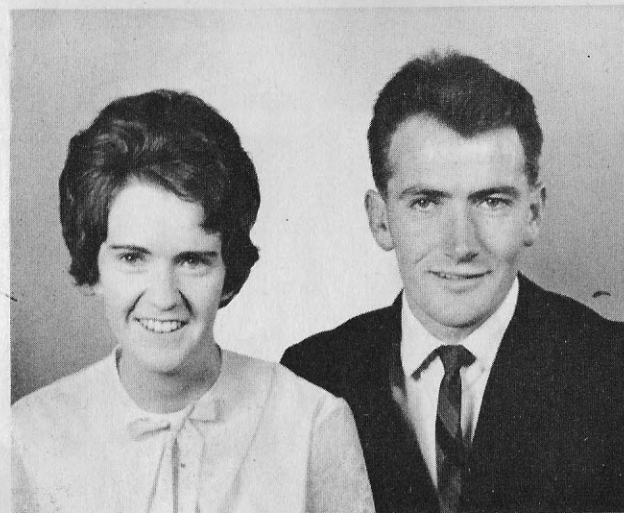

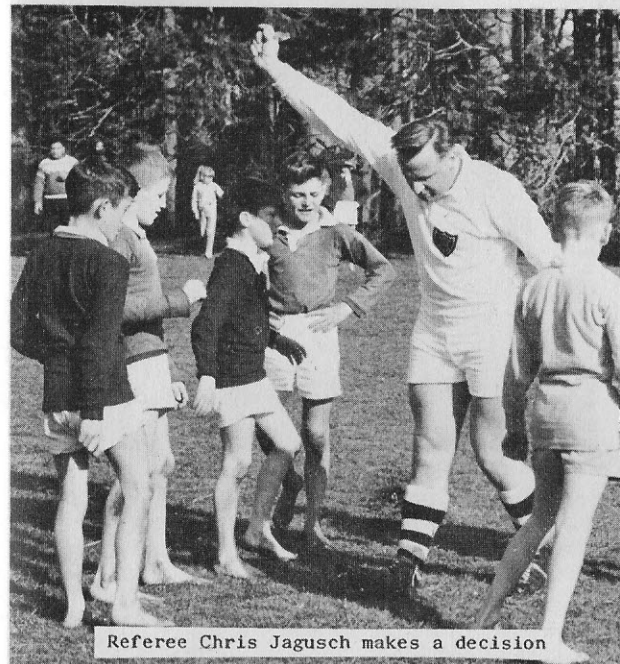

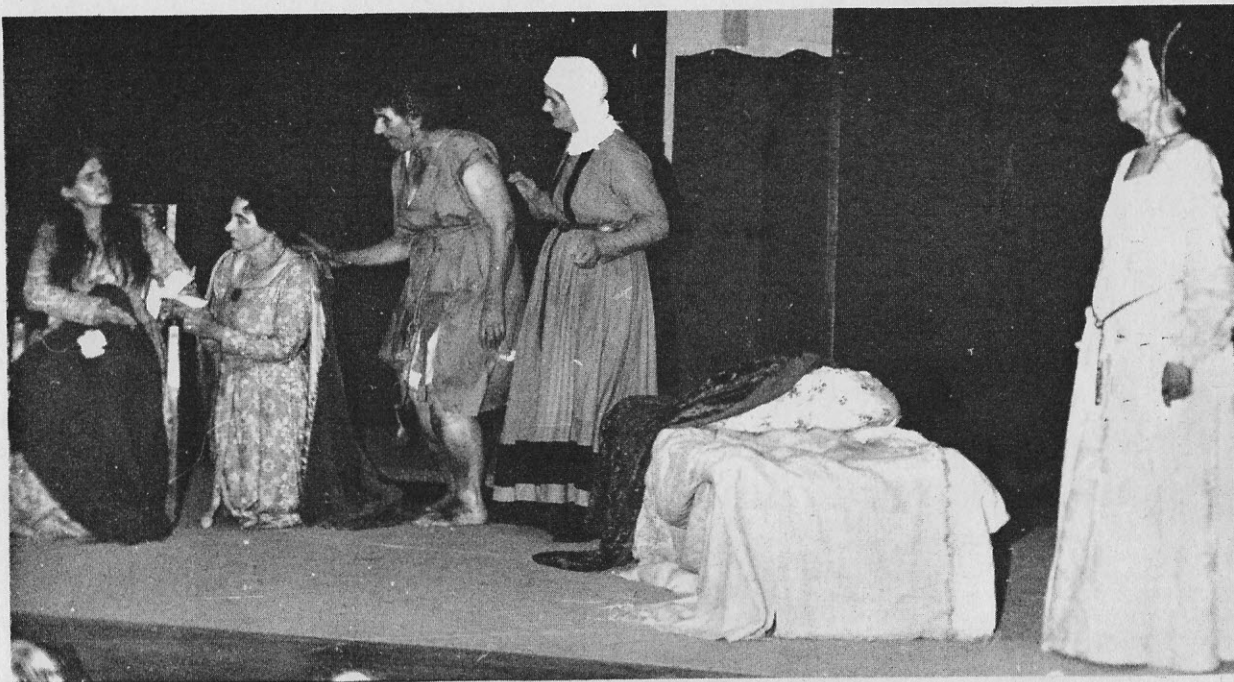

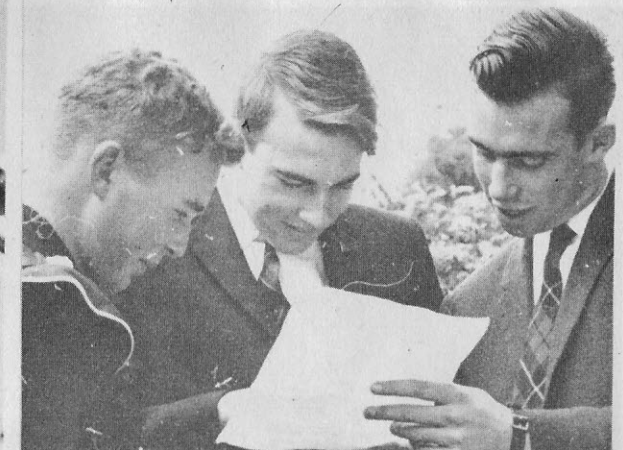

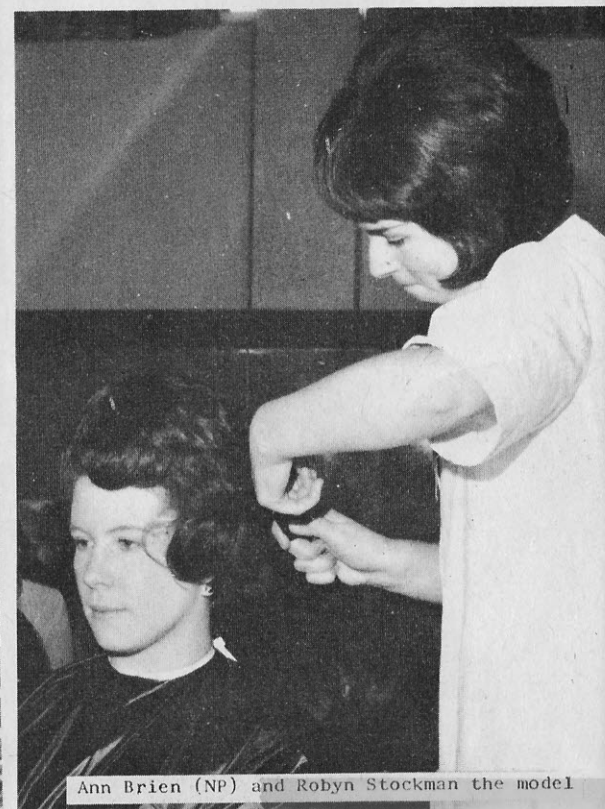

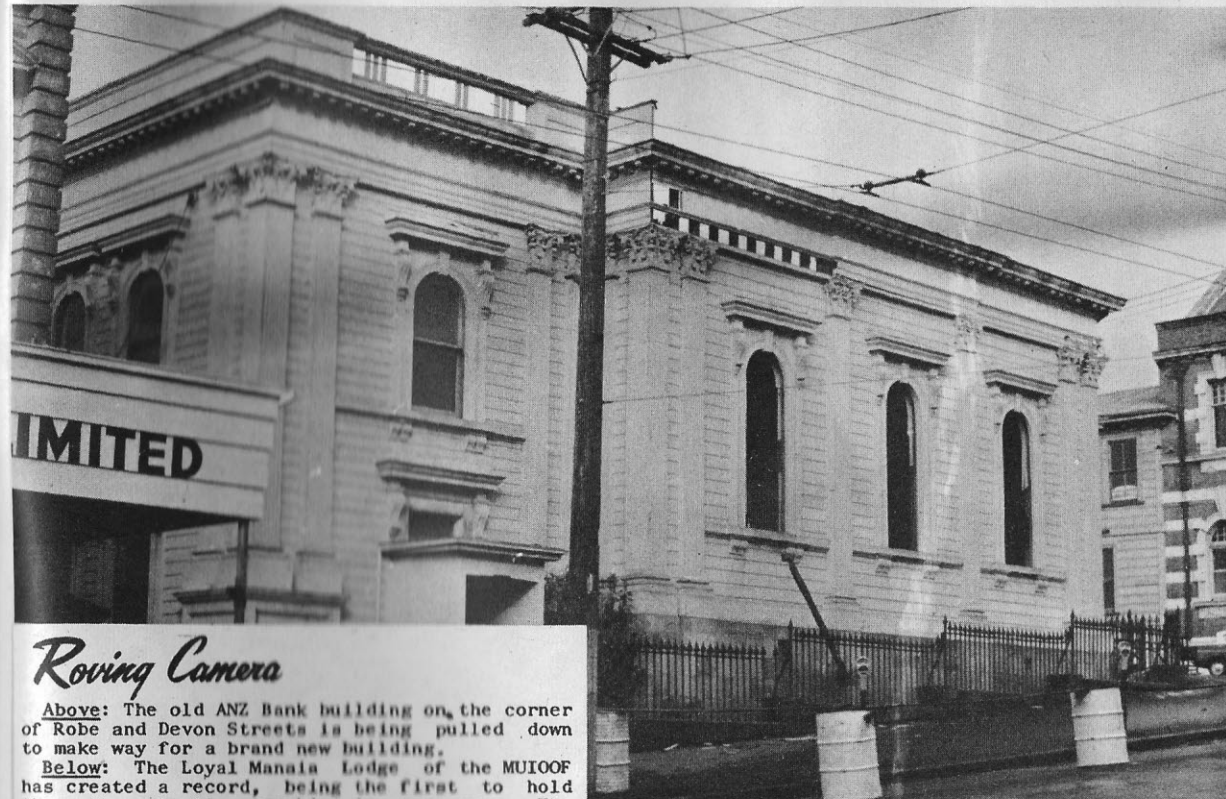

Gridiron Football Is Coming

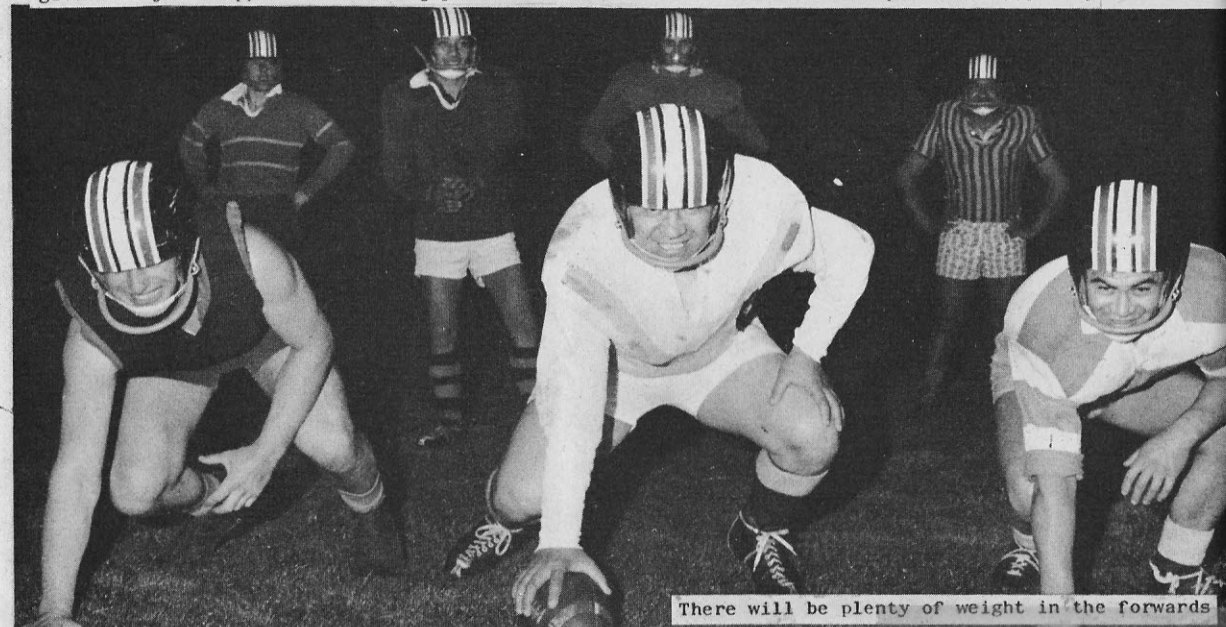
