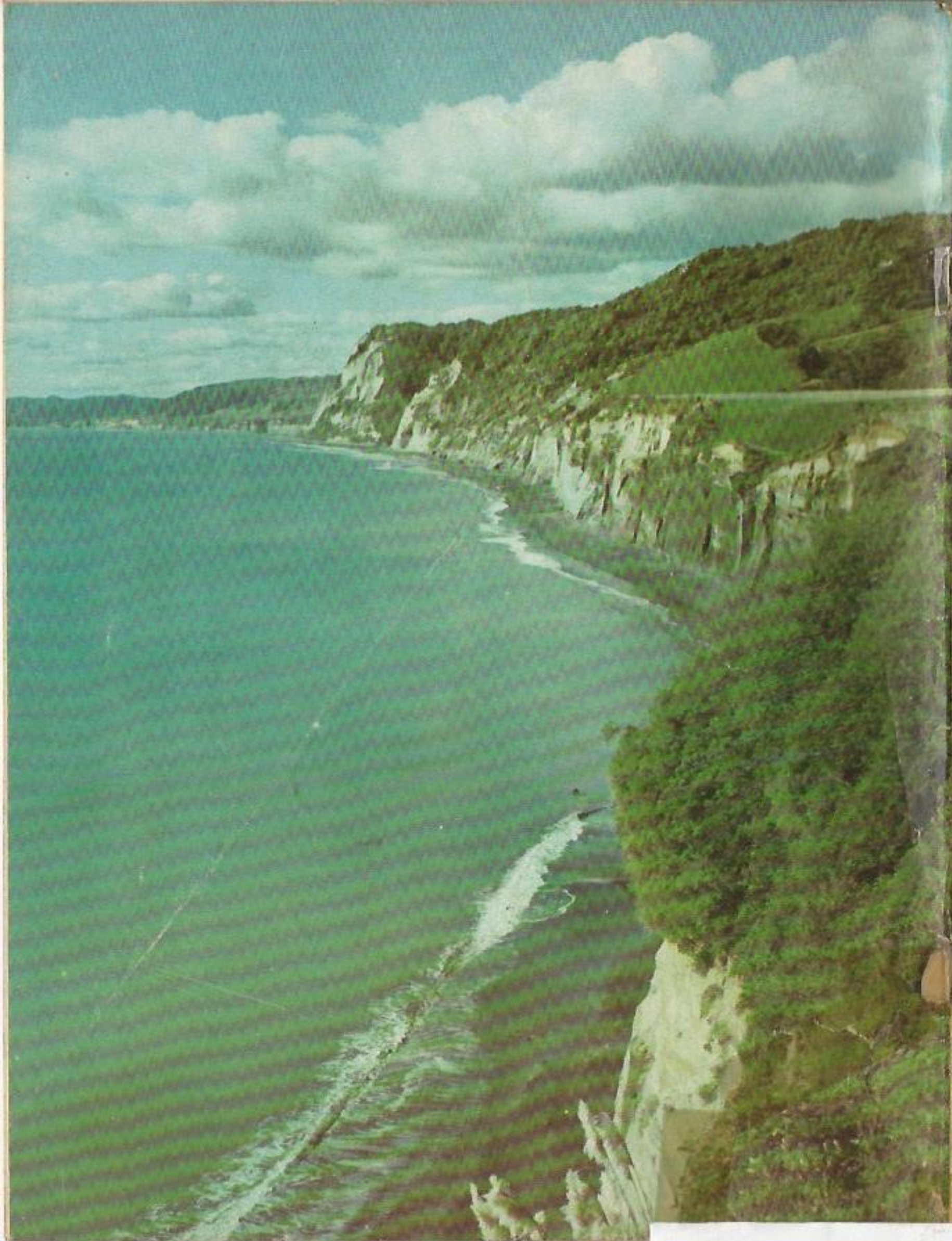

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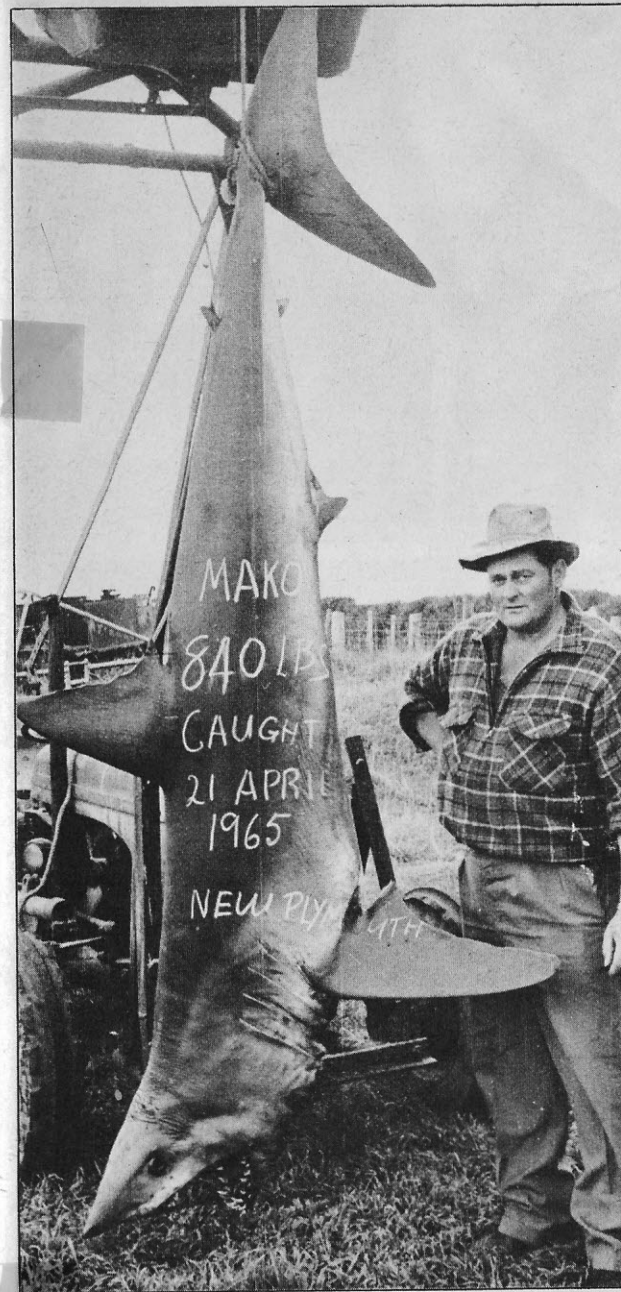
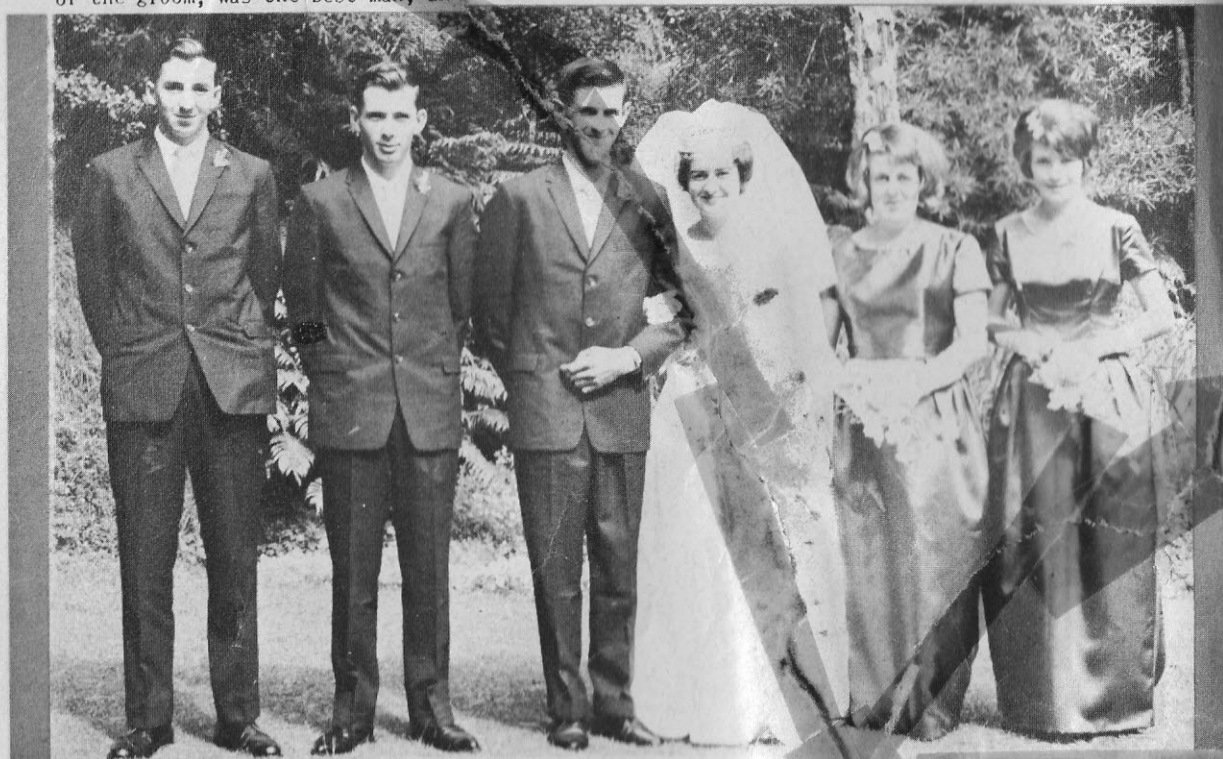

BACK COVER

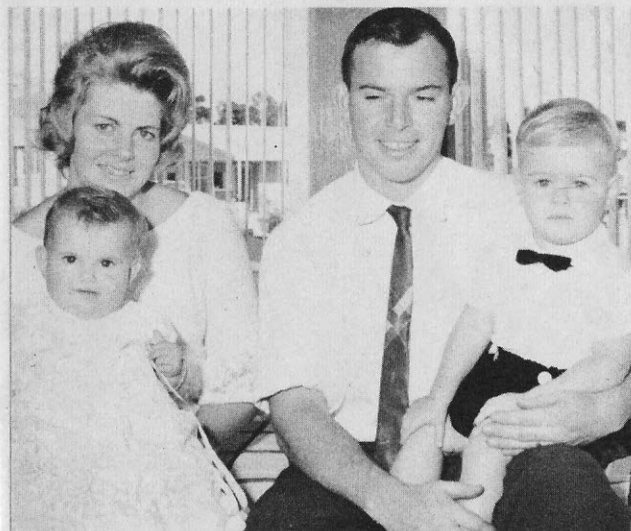

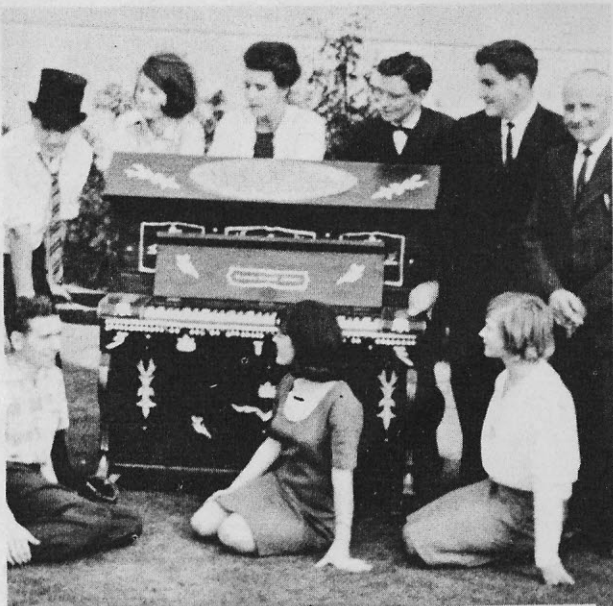

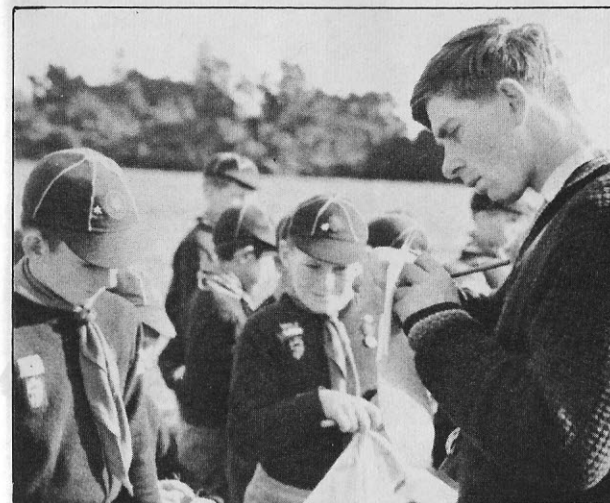

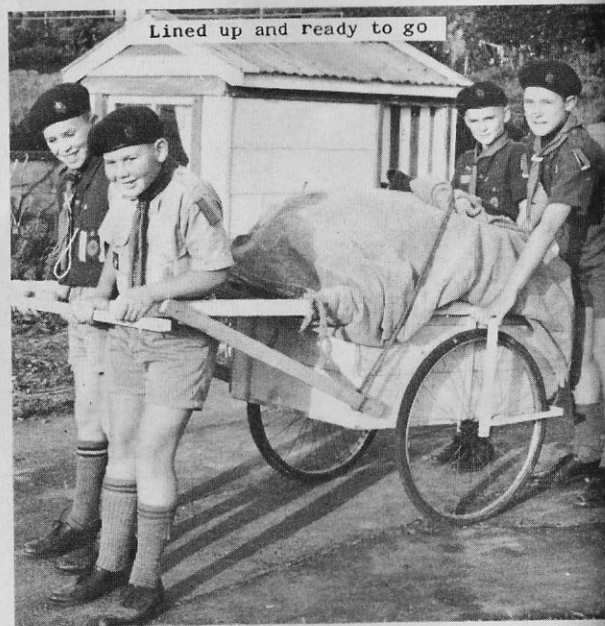

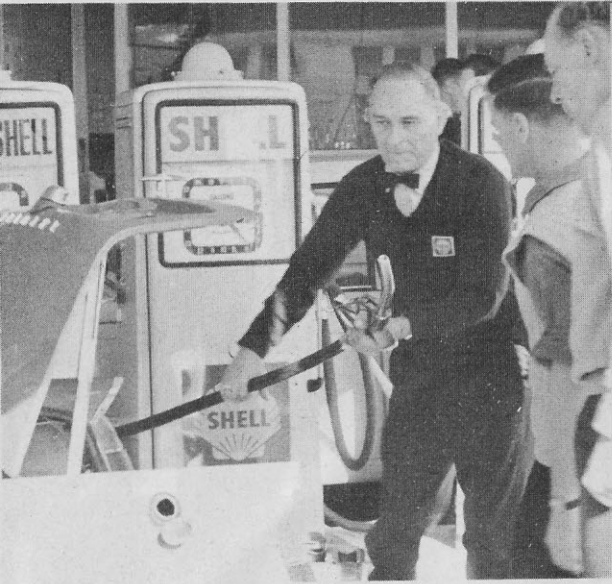

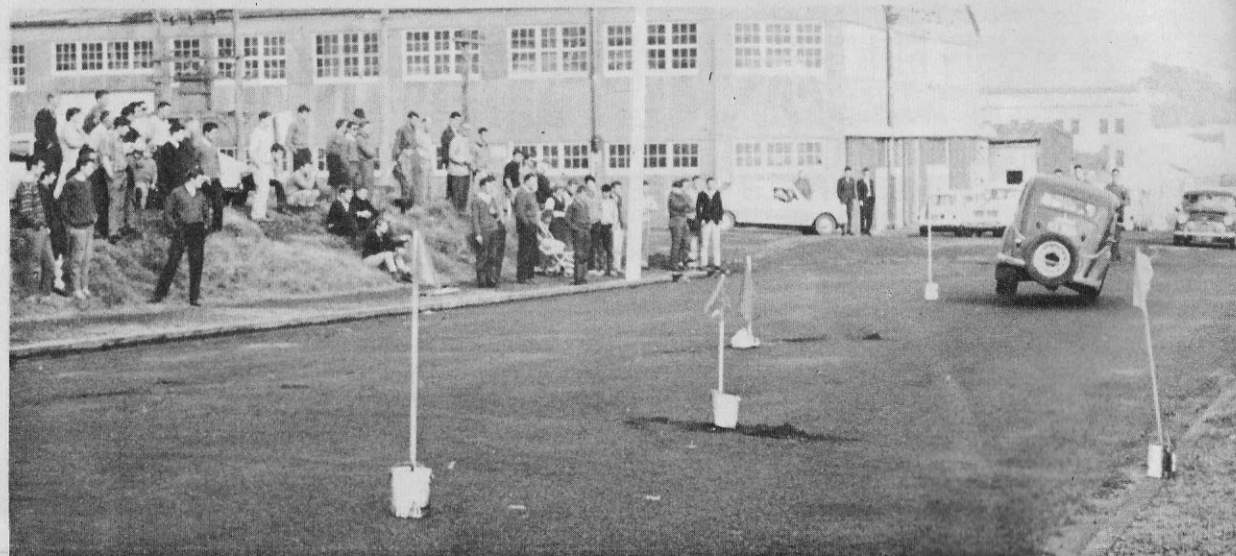

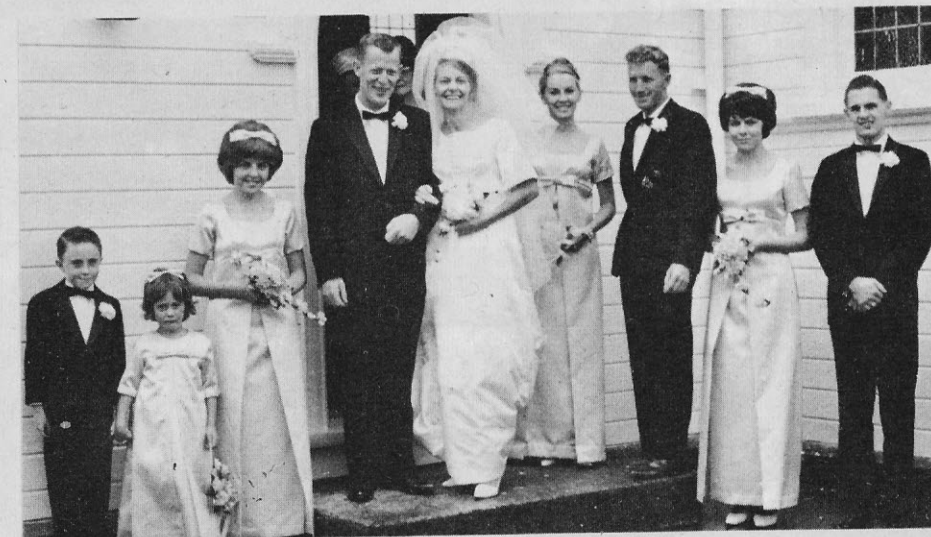

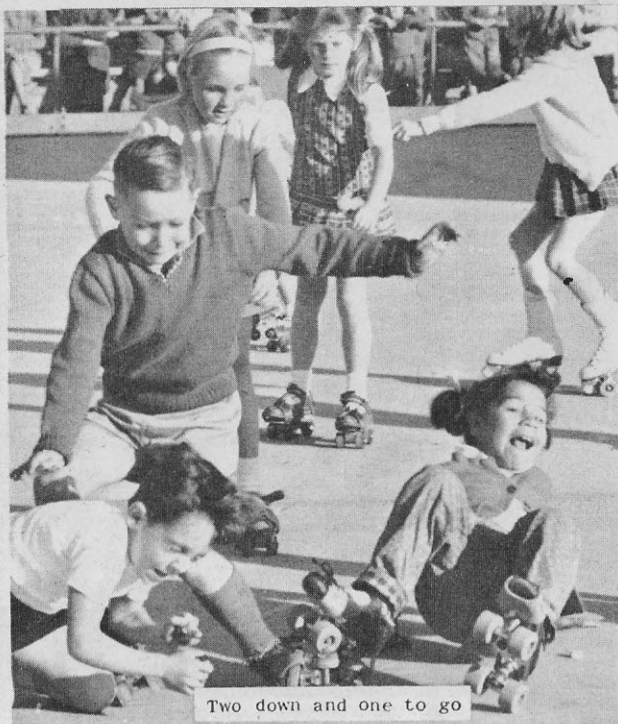
Scramble At Omata

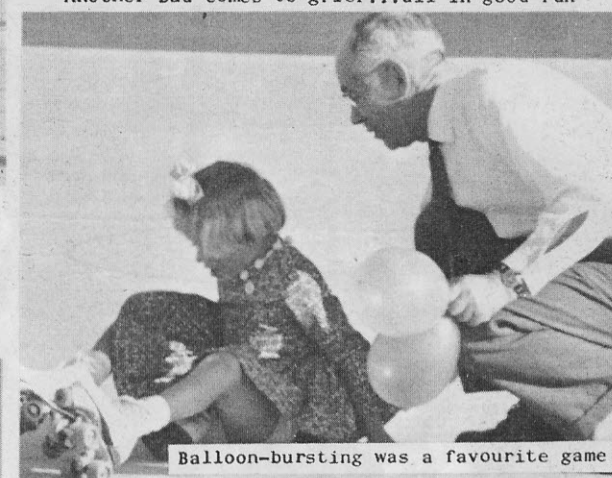

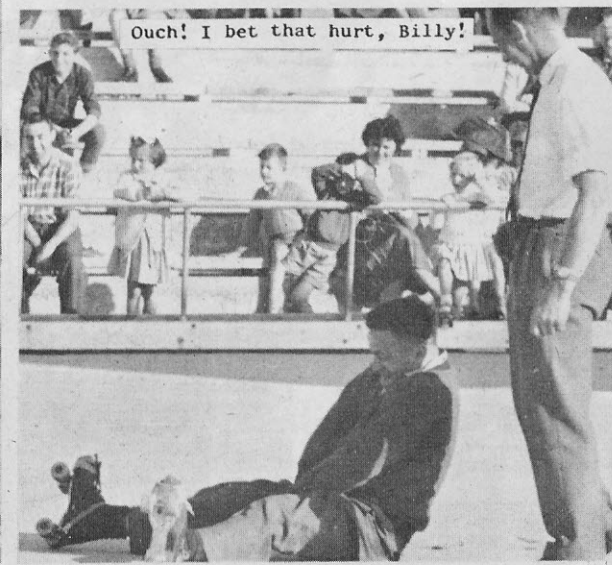

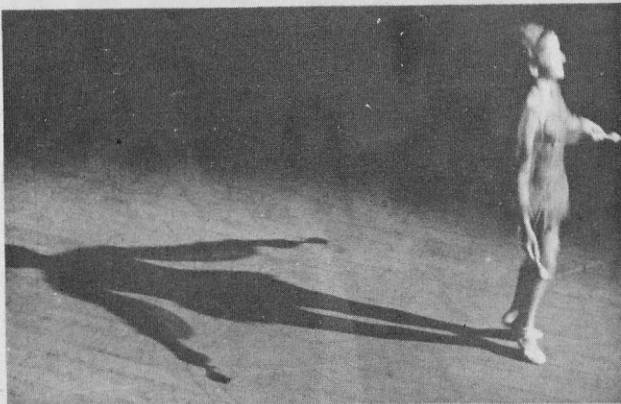

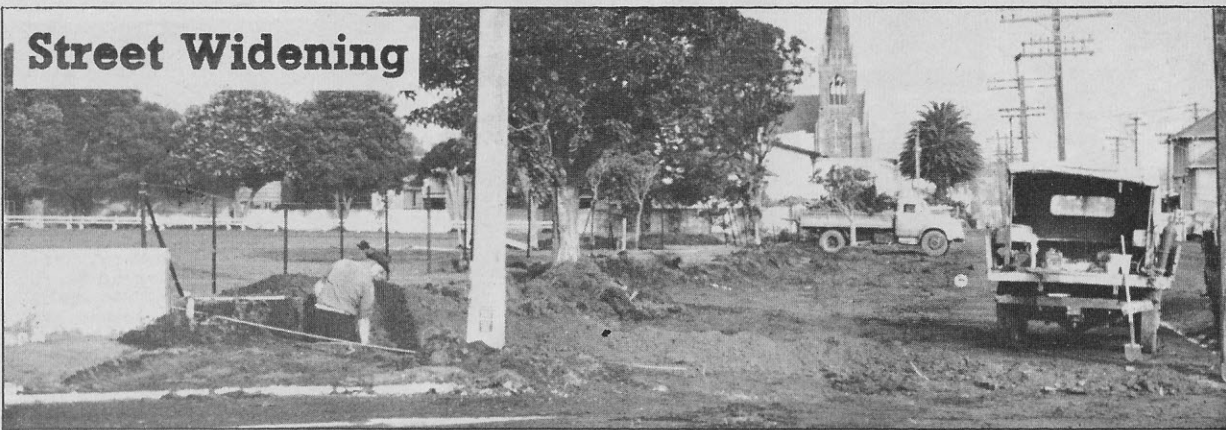

Vintage Rally Attracts Well-Kept Veterans

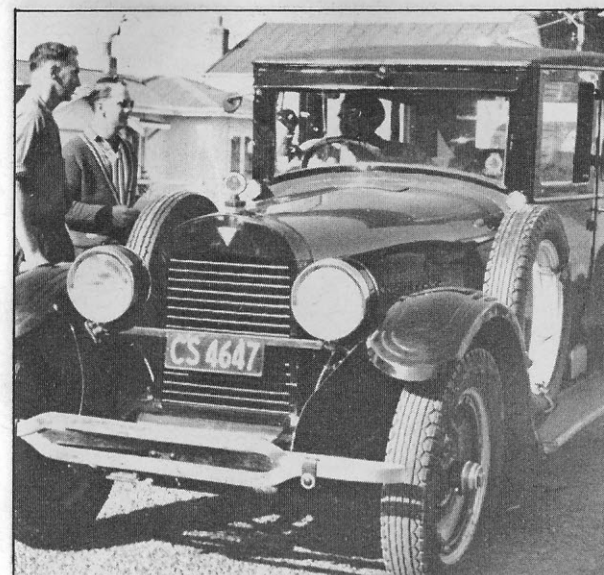

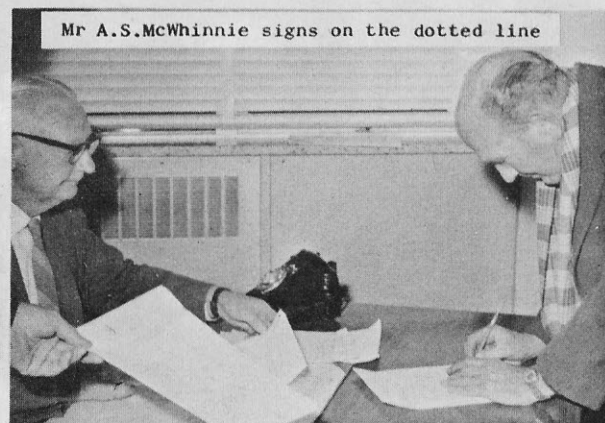
Voluntary Civil Defence Police Sworn In

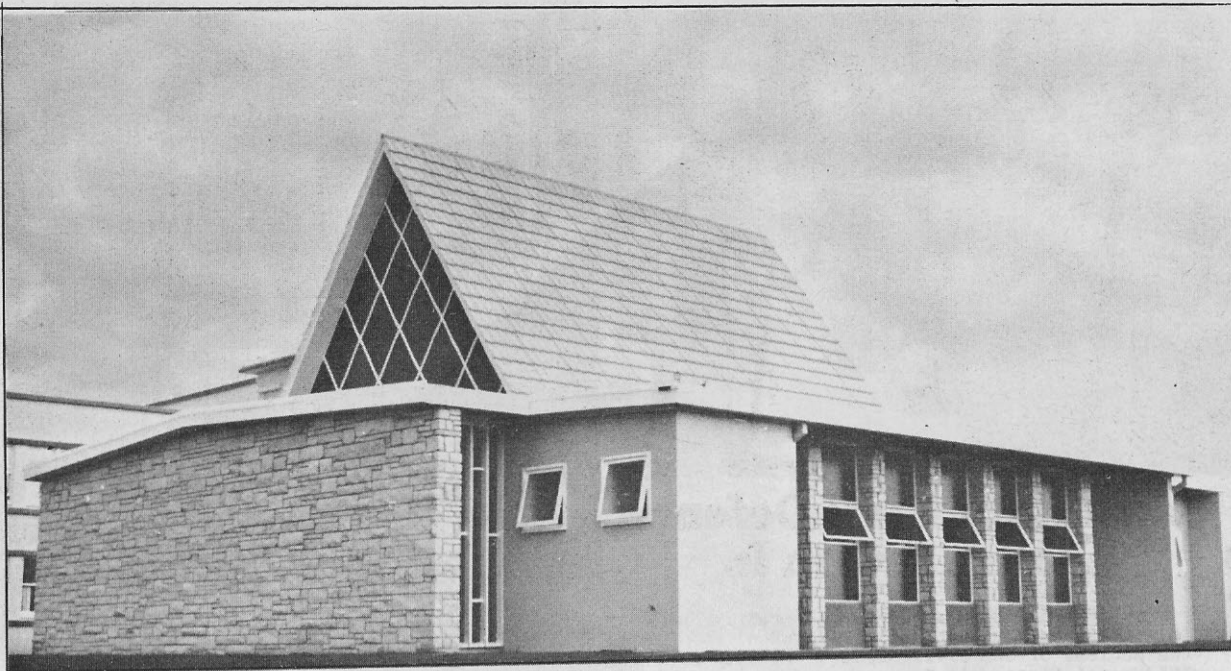

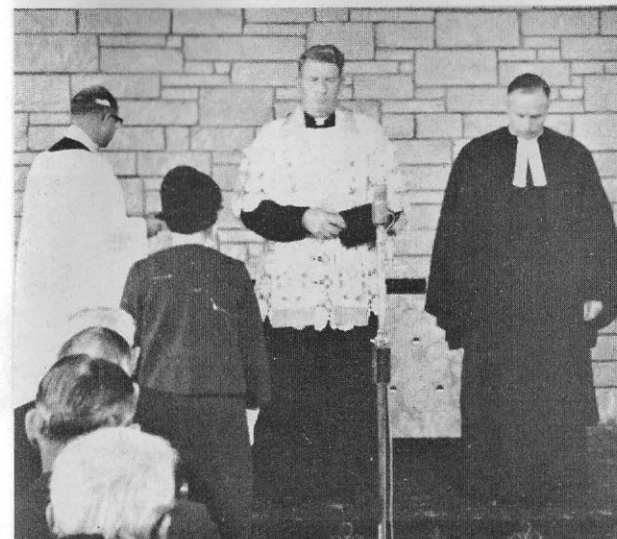

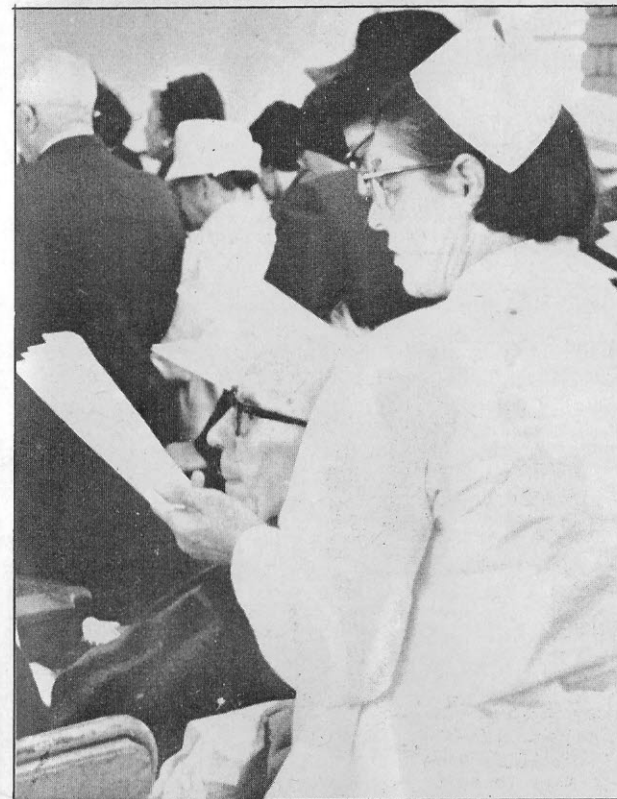
Opening Of Hospital Chapel

Beach Racing At Ngamotu

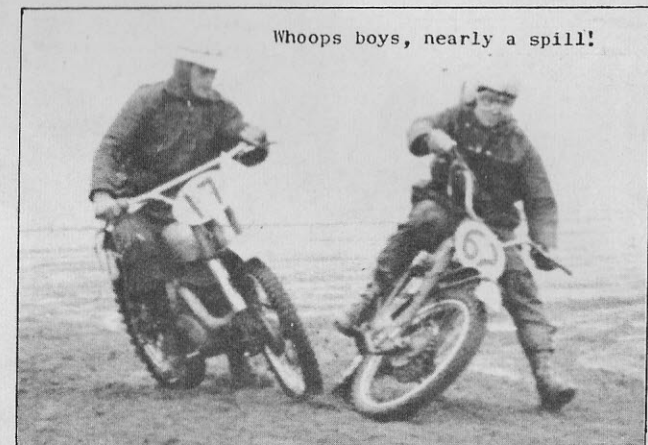

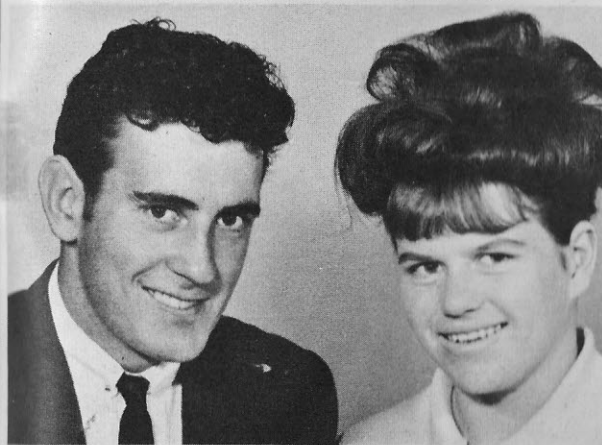
