




## CAKE ICING EXHIBITION






# STRATFORD SHOW











## STOCK CAR OPENS SEASON






#### OLD LAMP COLLECTOR






# HAWERA A.&P. SHOW




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## FASHION SHOW AT NPGHS

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
### **Eltham School Sports**








#### PROMENADE CONCERT IN CITY


