




MONEY, MONEY, MONEY!








LARGE CROWD AT POINT-TO-POINT





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

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

It Just Can't Be Done

In our May issue, we advocated that the NP racecourse should be shifted out to the old drome at Bell Block. We spoke of a Grand Prix circuit too, and many other amenities that could have made one of the finest sporting areas in the Southern Hemisphere.

We had endless phone calls and letters from interested people, many of whom thought that this was the best idea yet for the benefit of the city, particularly as there is so much talk of our becoming the forgotten tourist area. We were approached by many organisations which would have been interested, such as the car club and cycle club, the motor cycle club and many others.

So thrilled were we with the response that we thought it might be a good idea if the thing was gone into a little bit further.

We did a bit of fast calculating and found out that the present racecourse would make over 250 good housing sections (best part of New Plymouth you know) and all would possibly bring over the £2000 mark. Some nest-egg for the NP City Council! Add to this that these section holders would pay something like £15,000 annually in rates which makes the whole thing a good-looking proposition.

But there's a snag. Part of the racecourse is defined as a recreational area, and it would only require ONE objector to scotch the whole thing.

So that sort of leaves the racecourse where it is in the meantime.

Making further enquiries, we found out that the old aerodrome at Bell Block is already spoken for.

It is more or less the promise of the NP City Council, or should we say agreement, that the old drome should be sold. When a buyer comes along, then a large proportion of the sale money must go to the Government to repay them for the money spent on the new drome at Brown Road, and a lot more would have to go to the local bodies which have contributed to the cost of the new drome.

We have been assured by the Mayor, Mr A.G. Honnor, that this project has been looked into, but found to be impracticable. Personally, we don't think so, but can see that with so many irons in the fire, all waiting eagerly for the council to sell the property, it is virtually impossible to see anything coming out of our idea.

We can't get tourists to Taranaki, we don't seem to get the best in racing fields at the few meetings we have at the racecourse, and it is on the cards that we might be losing the Paritutu circuit for motor racing—plus the fact that the racing cyclists are becoming an ever increasing problem on the roads. We can't say stop, because it's a good clean, healthy sport. What is to become of all our sports?











DISTRIBUTOR contact breaker points which are dirty, oily, burnt or the gap incorrectly set will not operate correctly. If they are too badly burnt, replace them - they only cost a few shillings. To set the gap, turn the engine over until the points are fully opened, loosen the breaker plate screws and move the plate until the gap is correct. The mamufacturers' handbook will tell you the exact thickness of the feeler gauge to use.



BACKFIRING when running down hill with the foot off the accelerator is usually due to a weak mixture or a retarded spark. Enrichen the idling mixture and set the spark correctly. Backfiring can wreck a muffler and is rather disturbing to the passengers. A weak mixture is also likely to burn out both exhaust valves and spark plugs.








CARBURETTOR air cleaners should be properly cleaned every 5000 miles. Remove the top of the cleaner, usually secured with a wing nut, and take out the filter gauze. Wash it with petrol or kerosene, allow it to drain for about 15 minutes, lace it with oil and replace it. Replace the oil in the bottom of the container but don't refill above the recommended mark. If the filter is a paper type, renew it.



ANOTHER way of cleaning spark plugs is to soak them in ordinary household ammonia. Pour the ammonia into a wide-mouthed bottle to the depth of an inch to two. Place the plugs in the bottle and seal it with a piece of plastic sheeting and a rubber band. Leave the plugs to soak for several hours and you will find that carbon, dirt and oil accumulations have been removed.







FLOODING is caused by pumping the accelerator pedal. This sends raw petrol into the cylinders, preventing the car from starting. If this happens, push the accelerator pedal to the floor, switch on the ignition, and press the starter button until the engine fires ...it will beat unevenly at first but hold your foot hard on the pedal for a few seconds longer until the engine begins to roar. Flooding can also be caused by excessive fuel pump pressure or a leak in the float.



A HANDY gadget for cleaning clogged oil and fuel lines is an ordinary metal type tyre valve stem which has been ground down on an emery wheel. The lower steel shoe should be placed about the middle of the stem to facilitate holding the air hose on the stem. The high pressure will blow out the lines in no time.
