






#### OVER-70 DRIVERS




#### WONDERFUL GESTURE







#### EGG SHORTAGE

Yep! There's an egg shortage in Taranaki, and make no mistake about it, it could become very much more acute than it is. We paid a visit to a local poultry farm/recently and asked a few questions. The farmer told us that this shortage is seasonal, with about 40% of the birds laying at this time of the year, but, should any flock be plagued by disease, then the shortage could become acute. Being an egg farmer is by far a very much more dicey business than most, with risks greater, and stock to be built up much more rapidly than with most other animal farms. It appears that the same shortage does not occur in the south of the province, since there are a greater number of farmers in that area, with not nearly as many in the north of the province. 











#### INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AT BELL BLOCK

We suppose that one day Bell Block will become a suburb of the city of New Plymouth. If this is to be the case, then it will be the industrial area of the town, so fast are new industries being encouraged to the area, and not small industries either. There are some pretty large buildings in that area now, and from reports, there will be many more yet, as the larger firms realise the potential of the area, with it proximity to rail and port facilities. In a short cruise around the area, we counted many new factories, subsidiaries of companies which are normally based around the four main centres. First in the area was McCechnies, above. In our picture below are the new premises of E.C.C. Transformers, and at the bottom is the new factory nearly completed for Canada and New Zealand Cable Corporation. With other industries like the Broomham Chicken Company and the Bell Block Engineering Company, the area is growing very fast.



# BRIDGE RENEWED OVER EGMONT ROAD

The Railways Department line gang recently performed a smart piece of work when they renewed the overhead bridge in Egmont Road. Out on the job early on a Sunday morning, they had the job completed by early afternoon, and ready for the first goods train on Sunday night. First the old bridge had to be lifted clear and preparation made in the concrete piers to accept the new span, then the heavy crane lifted the already prepared new section into position, and the gang made it secure. 





#### WAVERLEY TOWER DEMOLISHED






### BREAKWATER EXTENSIONS ALMOST FINISHED





#### The Road Toll

"ROAD USER" OF HAWERA WRITES:

Every day one reads or hears of death' on the road. It is all too plain to me that the fault lies squarely on the shoulders of youth. You've only got to read the papers to find out what age those are who are getting killed. Young people up to about 22 years of age are usually involved so why not stop issuing licences to youngsters of 15, and make the minimum age say 17 or 18? Would this help?

Well, "Road User" we are not experts on this type of subject, but we did get a few facts and figures from the Transport Department which speak volumes in support of your argument. Here they are: In 1965 there were 101 fatalities in the 15-20 age group, 74 in the 20-25 group, 38 In the 25-30 group, 35 in 30-35 and 29 in the 35-40 group. Your argument suggests that had no licence been issued to anyone below the age of say 18, then half of that figure of 101 MIGHT be alive today. Well 50 lives to us seems a very reasonable saving. Of course, you know that now anyone under the age of 18 is on a provisional licence, which can be cancelled by a court for some dozens of different offences.







As the volume of traffic increases on our roads, so then must the accident rate, and we are inclined to agree with some aspects of your argument. We do know that in most countries where there is a thick traffic population, the age limit for gaining a drivers' licence is 17.

On receipt of your letter, we went along to just ONE of our local garages, and photographed the four wrecks you see on this page, and we could have taken another six pictures just as bad...all in the same place!

A spokesman for the Transport Department says that public conscience and courtesy on the roads are just two of the things which would help to solve the growing rate of death on the road. We agree very heartily with that sentiment. It is better to be an old but careful driver, than a dead or maimed young fool.














