









North Island Judo Champs










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15,000 See Spectacular Racing











Port Activity











HAWERA CHURCH DEDICATION










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VW OWNERS' CLUB RALLY




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CRANEDRIVER'S VIEW AT PORT






















Scouts' and Cubs' Competitions
