






















10,000 SEE HAWERA'S HOBBIES EXHIBITION



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MOUNTAIN RESCUE

One of the largest Search and Rescue operations ever mounted in the province was alerted recently when a party of 25 girls and four teachers from the Spotswood College were reported missing on the mountain. This was the largest-ever party to be reported missing on the rain-swept slopes of the mountain. In the early hours of the morning, a 10-man YMCA rescue team found the girls huddled to-gether in a dry riverbed, using palm fronds as blankets. Most were foot-sore, weary and scratched by undergrowth, but apart from that were unharmed by their adventure. Our picture shows the party walking out of trouble, little the worse for the experience.





INGLEWOOD'S GREATEST SHOW



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
NEW PLYMOUTH HARRIER RACE






Y.M.C.A. Activities










Last Rep Soccer Game

Our Trolley Buses Have Gone



GARNISHING OF REFLECTIVE TAPE on the front of a car can be left to the jalopy owners. However, it can be handy if it's fastened to inconspicuous places so that its warning can be flashed to other motorists - only when the bonnet or boot lid is raised.

Left: RUSTPROOF TAILPIPE EXTENSIONS that will outlast commercial extensions can be made from bathroom drainpipe. Get some chromed brass or copper pipe that will fit snugly and drive it into, or over, the tailpipe with a soft hammer.


> <u>Right:</u> DIRT collecting in blind corners in the tailgate slots of a utility or trailer often prevents the tailgate from closing properly. You can eliminate these dirt traps by cutting about one inch off the bottom of the tailgate cleats on each side.

Left: THIS MASK will keep paint off the tyres when you spray or touch up the wheels. Cut a carton as shown and stand it beside the wheel. Make a ring of cardboard and slide it through the hole until it bears firmly against the rim. The mask can be used over and over again.

> <u>Right</u>: ANCHOR your test meter firmly in place with suction cups to prevent vibration from knocking it to the ground. You can buy the rubber cups with nuts molded in them. Drill holes in the back of the meter case for bolts to hold the cups.



When your car has to be left standing for long periods it is better to chock the wheels rather than to apply the hand brake, otherwise the hand brake cable tends to stretch.




