




Two Fashion Shows

Harriers Start 40th Season




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SPOTSWOOD COLLEGE SPORTS





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

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
SPOTSWOOD COLLEGE LIBRARY OPENED






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FLANNAGAN CUP SWIM




C. Workshop Opened

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


CHILDREN VISIT BRITISH WARSHIP




CUB RALLY AT DEVON SCHOOL








New Building Going Up
