









ROWERS AND YACHTIES AT NGAMOTU








PHILATELISTS

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






LAND AND DEEDS OFFICE PULLED DOW

































SURF CADETS TRAIN


Two years ago the NZ Surf Life Saving Association introduced a surf cadet scheme to supply trained lifesavers to surf teams. The youngsters are taught all aspects of the drill so that after reaching fourteen years of age they could go into a surf team fully trained. Three Taranaki surf clubs, Fitzroy, Old Boys and East End, have introduced the scheme into their organised team work, the first being Fitzroy. These youngsters, under the able guidance of Mr Les Sporle, have progressed to the stage where they could in an emergency perform mouth to mouth resuscitation and assist regular team members with line work and other duties.
