

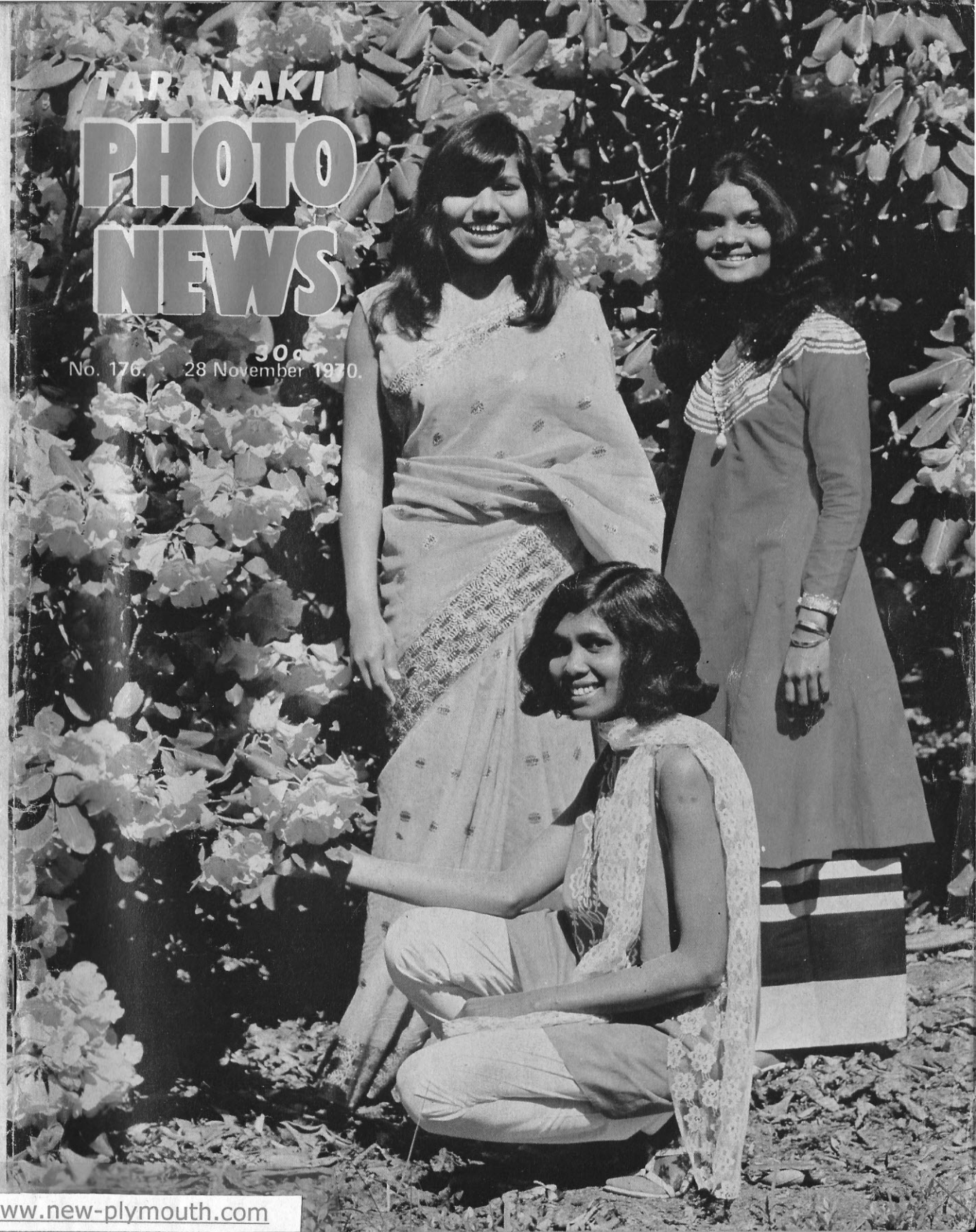

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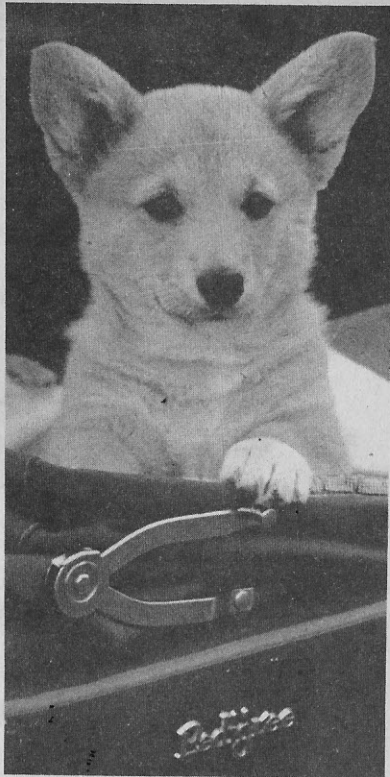
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HIGHLANDS EXTRAVAGANZA

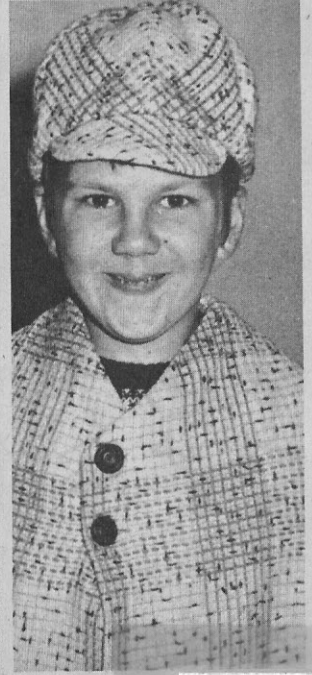

CONROC CABARET

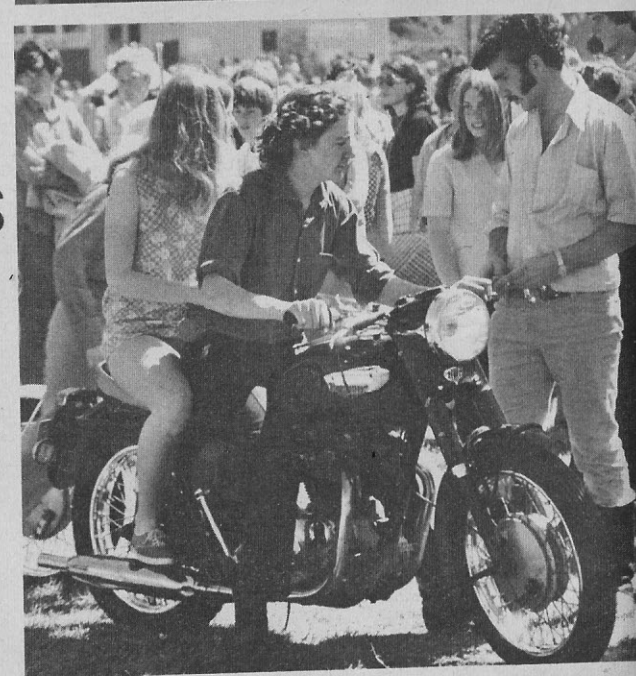

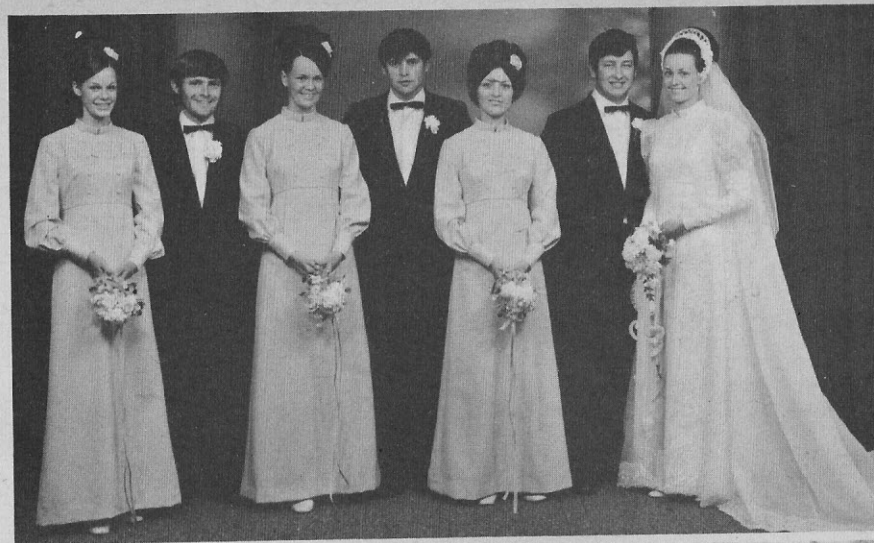

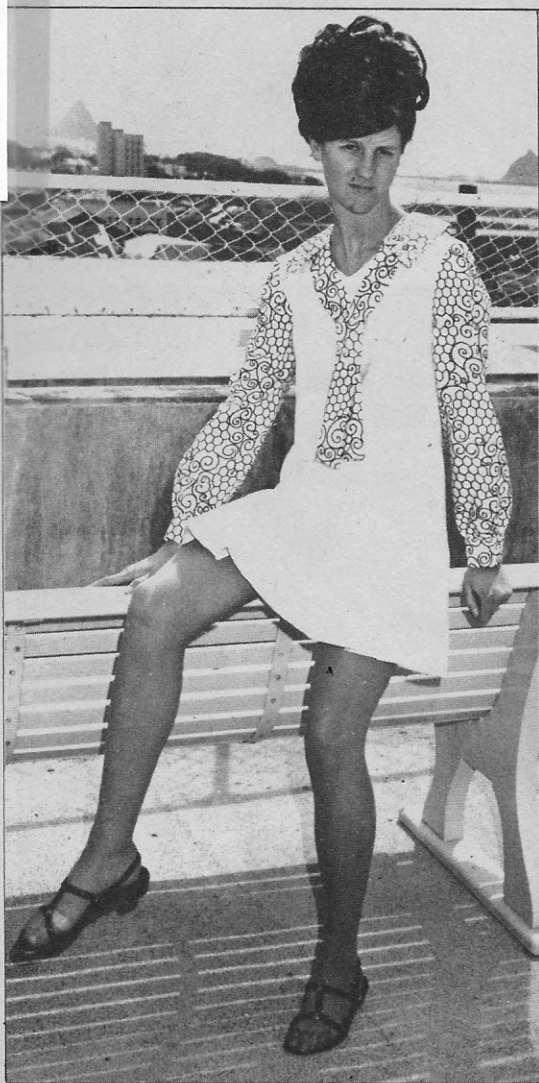


FASHION FEATURE FOR SPRING & SUMMER

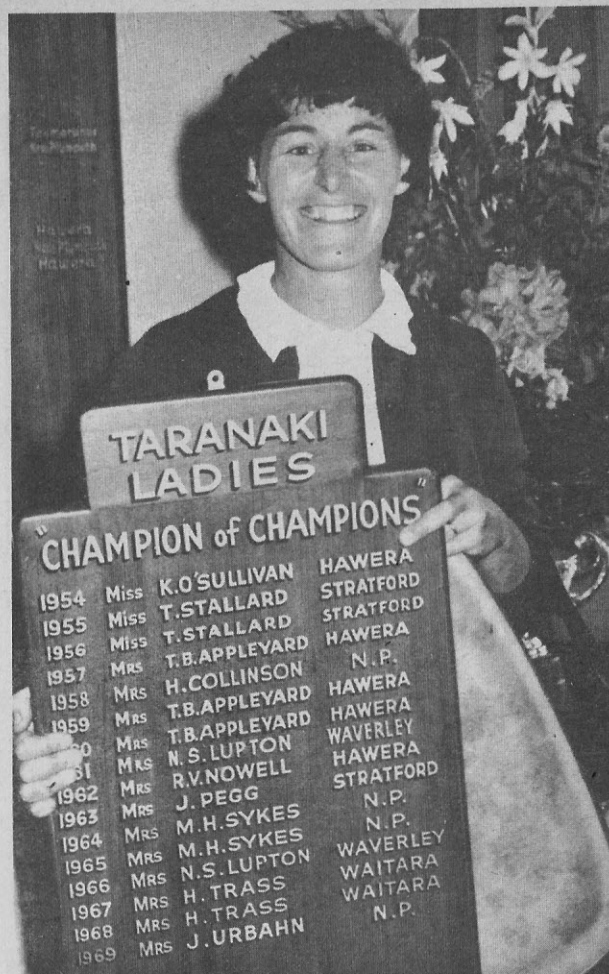

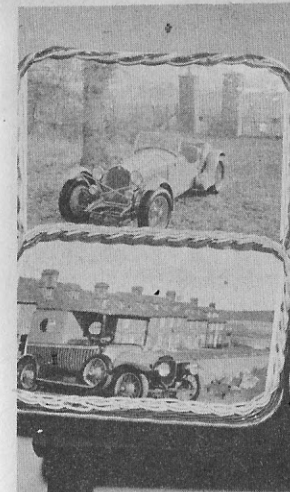


WAITARA SEA SCOUT WATER-BOAT—AT LAST

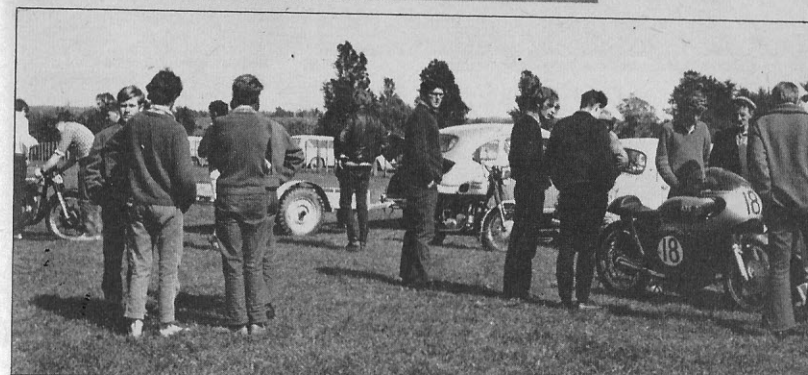
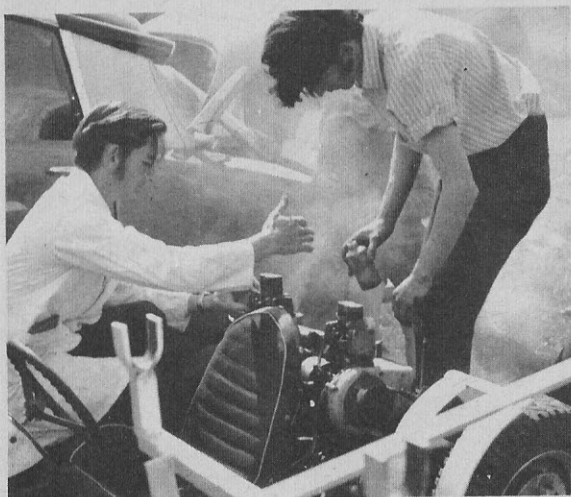

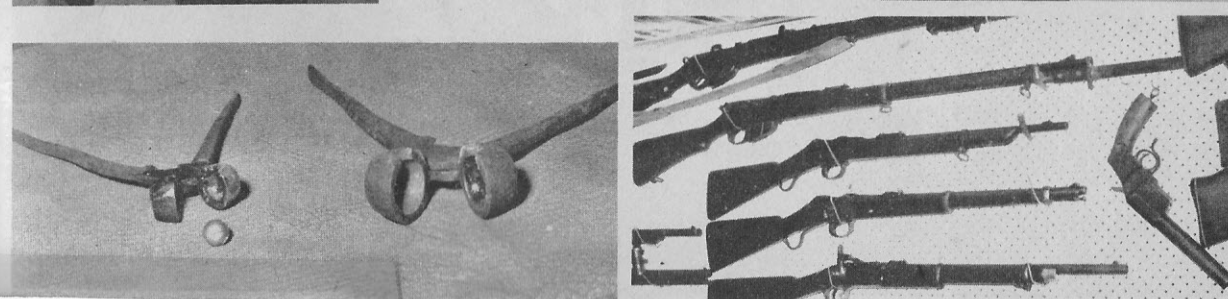

ARMOURY FROM THE WARS

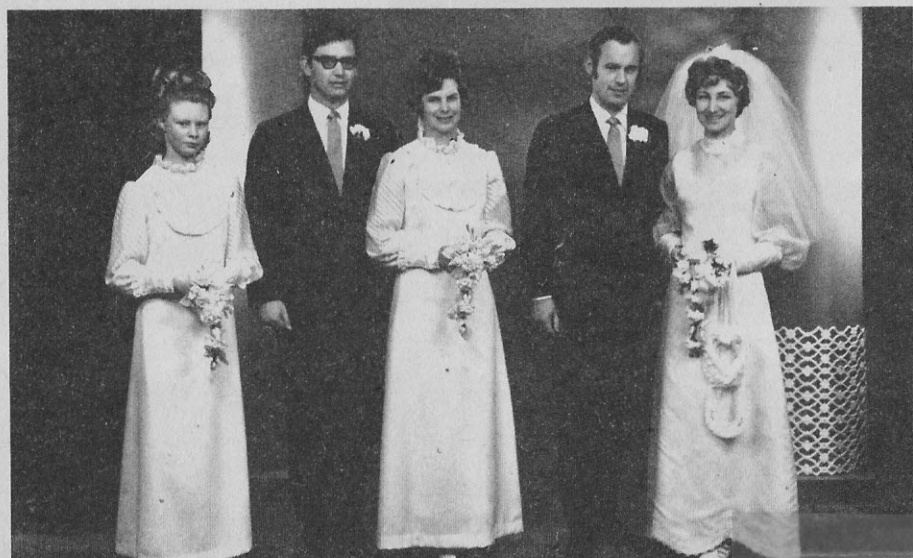
Bill Tippins, of Waitara, has a collection of armoury from both World Wars and from the Maori Wars. This includes such weapons as a German mine, a 100-year-old gun which was used by early settlers in Tikorangi and a hand grenade from the 1914-18 war. ABOVE LEFT-Bill stands beside a once deadly piece of mechanism, and a grim reminder of the past. ABOVE RIGHT-This is an American land mine detector, shown by Kimble Tippins. LEFT-A long rifle which was used in the Maori Wars. They were of the muzzle-loader type, and often used with a deadly bayonet attached. RIGHT-A German flare pistol, brought back from a battlefield fifty years ago from World War I. BELOW LEFT-Two of the oldest forms of bullet moulds used in the Maori Wars, and the type of bullets they produced. BELOW RIGHT-These are some of the rifles in Mr Tippins' collection, among which there is an old Lee-Enfield 303 from the 1939-45 war.

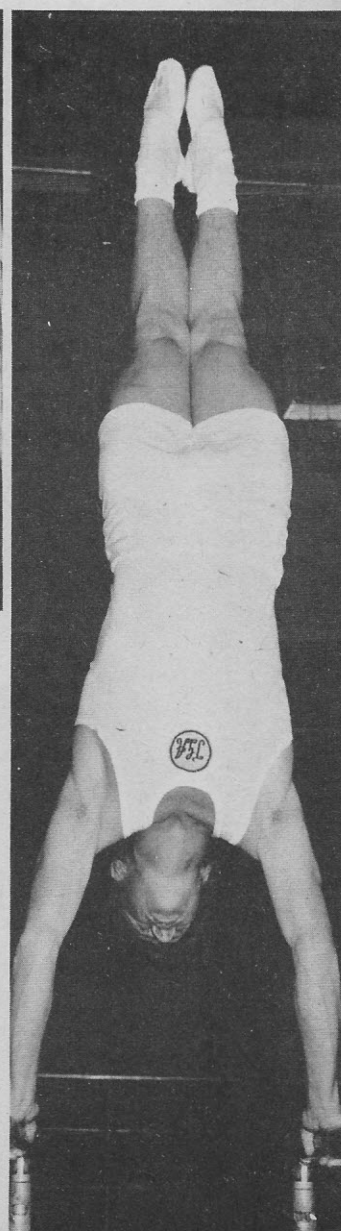
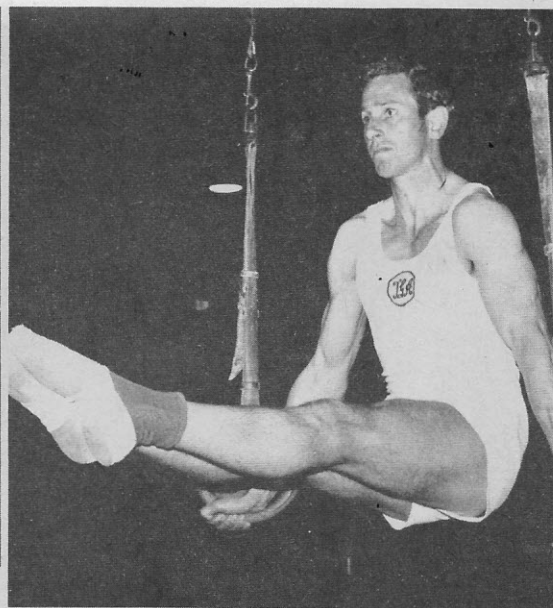
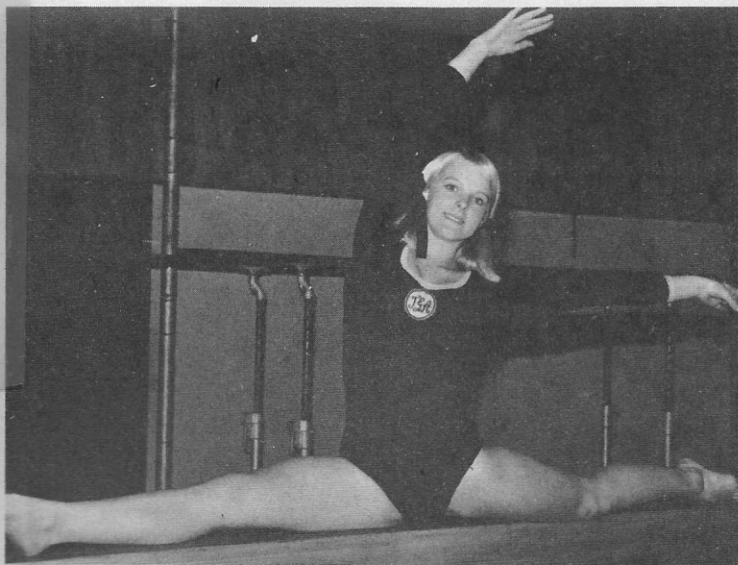




SAILING DOWN THE RIVER...!

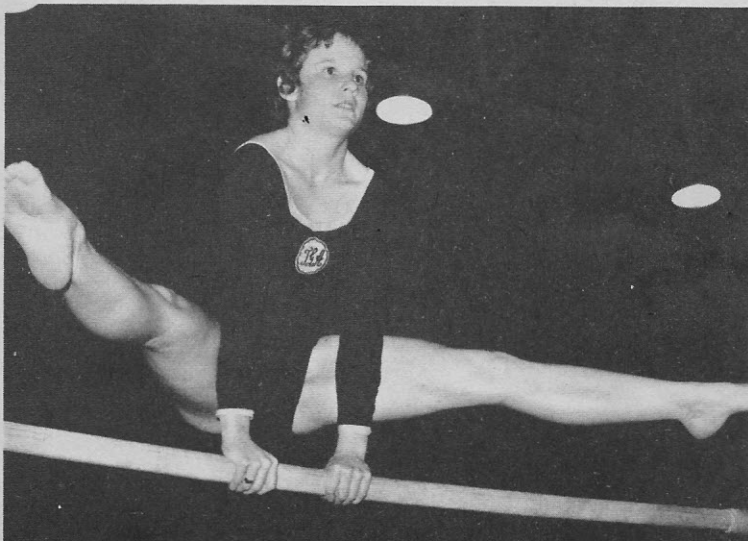

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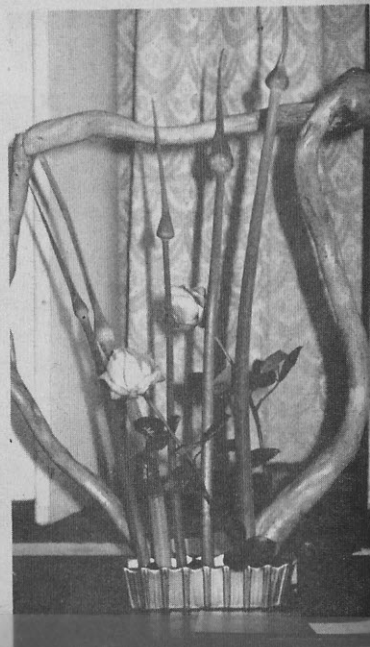

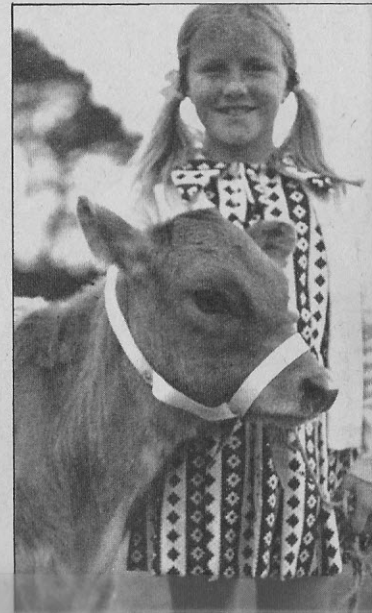

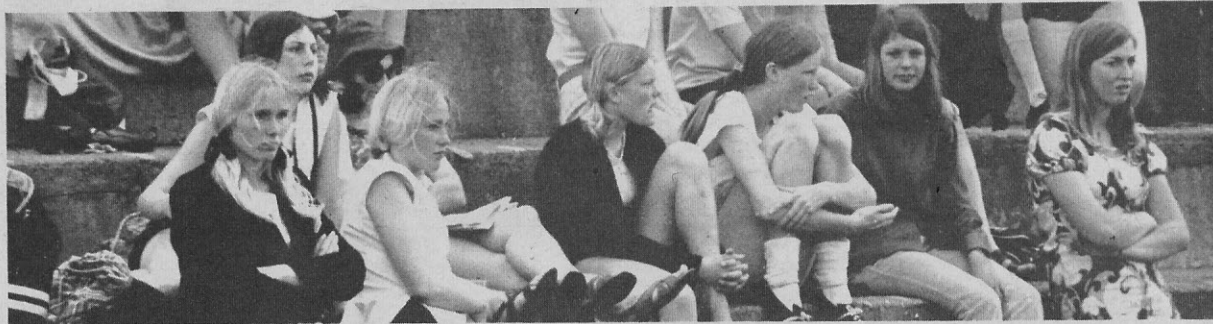




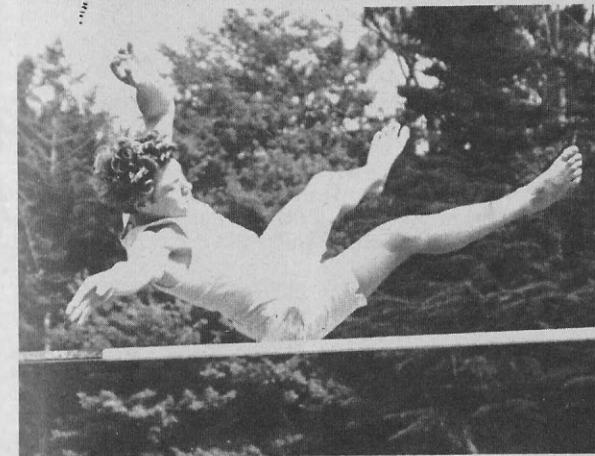

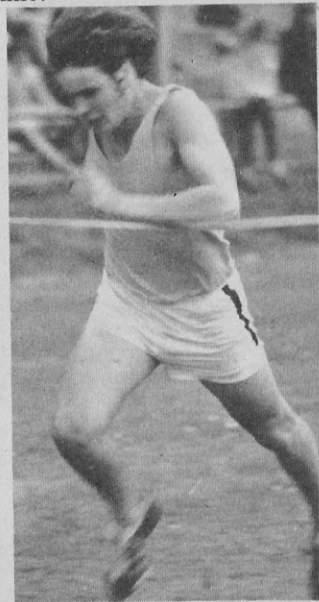

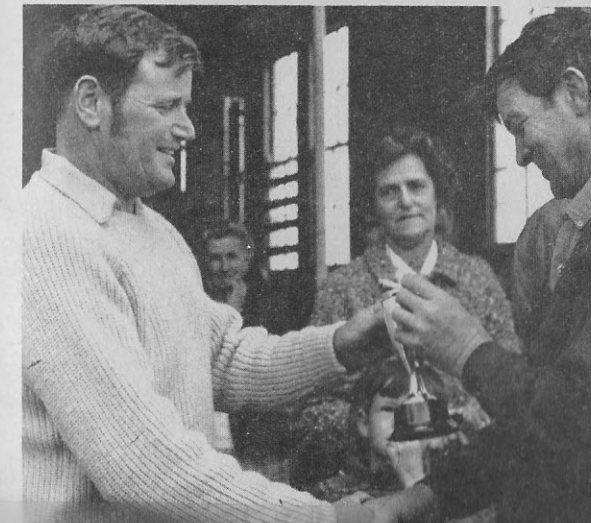

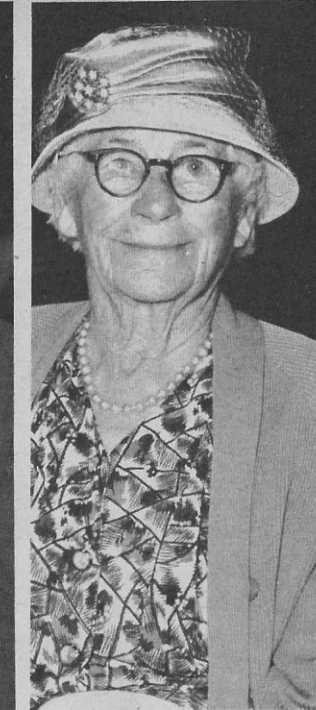

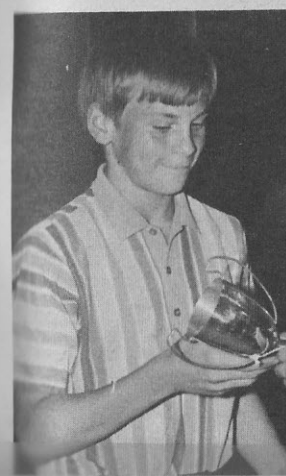

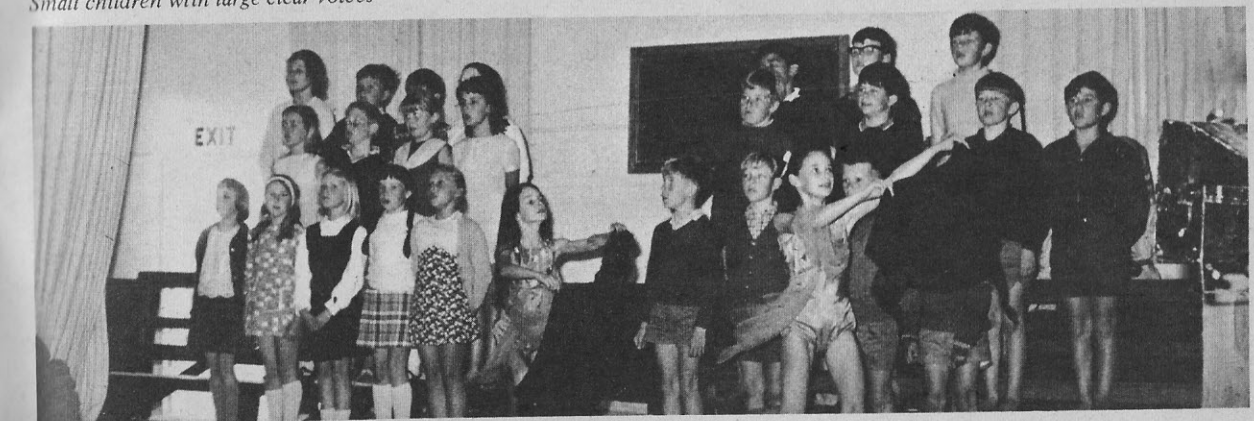

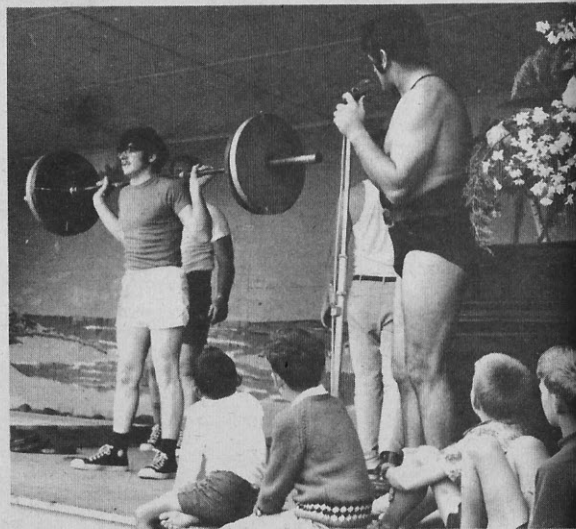

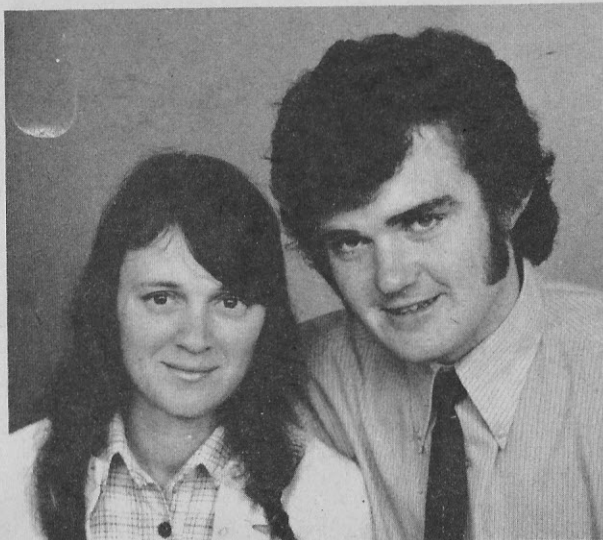
