











DELICATE ART OF MARQUETRY

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

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





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


THE BIG POUR

FIRST OF 7000 YDS OF CEMENT

Just before 9 a.m. on February 1 the big pour began on the chimney down at the power project. This is the beginning of a pour that will be continuous for something like 52 days, 24 hours a day. Now, for those who have interested themselves in the progress, there will be a marked difference as the chimney will steadily rise to its full height of 650 feet. Into this job will go some 7000 yards of cement, brought to the site by a fleet of Conroc trucks, each carrying in the vicinity of seven yards. Stringent tests are carried out from time to time to ensure strength and mixing quality.

LEFT—The very first pour goes into the foundation of the chimney. BOTTOM LEFT—Soon, the chimney will rise by about six inches an hour. BELOW-Masses of steel rods go into the project, and these will continue to tower over the project.

Next a bucket is filled with the first cement to be poured for the chimney. Next the first cement goes up, up and away to the site, and lastly is suspended over the position for the pour. 

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


DANGER AT THE WHARVES

The Taranaki Harbour Board have at last reluctantly put an embargo on fishing from the wharves when ships are being worked. Not too good for the kids who fish there, but a darned sensible idea when one stops to think of the dozens of dangers that lurk in that area, particularly with so much work going on in other directions. We were taken on a tour of inspection of the wharves by the deputy harbourmaster Captain David Giles, who pointed out where accidents had occurred in the past. Though he was very loathe to see the kids done out of their fishing possies, it was for their benefit that the rule was made. We show you, who are possibly parents of fishing addicts, some of the dangers there. ABOVE LEFT—Did you realise that it one of these mooring lines broke, it would uncoil so fast that it could sever a limb? ABOVE CENTRE—Trap for the wary is the space at the wharf edge. 
