



They are all engaged in the task of cleaning up after the flood and counting their losses, most of which are in the thousands of dollars bracket. ABOVE—Eric Parsons, manager of Smith and Brown's, the hardest hit store of all, spent almost 48 hours non-stop in trying to save stock, but to no avail. 



LIGHT INDUSTRY IS TAKING OVER








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MORE THAN A LITTLE "BULL!"





RECORD CROWD AT SHOW










"SAILATHON"






