





ROYAL AERO **CLUB RALLY**





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





























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SET TO BREAK OUT

Wellington-based Steve Allen has just completed a national tour as a support act on the Lulu Show.

Such has been his audience reception on the tour that it now seems that Steve Allen is set to break out nationally as a major New Zealand entertainer.

The first thing you notice about Allen is his neat tailored clothing. Then, almost at the same moment, you notice how slick and professional his act is. Though seemingly unrehearsed, Allen seldom stops for air. If he does, it is to rap with the audience. He may not have the prettiest face in the business but he wins the audience through his polished performance and his ability to project his personality through the amplifier barrier and right out to the audience.


Steve Allen has already had one mediocre hit disc called 'Life on Mars.' This disc was one of the finalists in last year's Gold Disc Award and certainly has played its part in establishing him. He has a new single out with a country flavour called "Top of the World.

Invariably, on a show, Allen will perform the old favourite "Marvellous Toy.' In this he calls upon three children from the audience to participate by operating the sound effects. The result is that he becomes an immediate hit with his audience, is right on side with them, and can follow through with virtually whatever he wishes and still be right on their side.

The Lulu tour is not Allen's first tour with an overseas act but it is definitely his most memorable. He has previously toured as a support with Australia's Russell Morriss, South Africa's Dave Mills, Solomon King and Jerry Lee Lewis.

The Steve Allen musical bag is versatile and varied, swinging from old favourite Beatles' songs to popular hit songs of today, but invariably in the middle-of-the-road mould. This way he manages to get onside with both older audiences as well as being highly acceptable to younger people.

Steve Allen is very obviously star material. He is a star in the making and I'm sure when he finally arrives he is going to be around for many many years to come. He has that elusive magical quality that stands him apart from his contemporaries.







THE OSMONDS - SUPERSTARS

The average age of the Osmonds is only 19. There is Allan, 23, Wayne, 21, Merrill, 19, Jay, 17, Donny, 15 and little Jimmy, who is only a part time member, at this stage.

The average age may be young, but these kids are the new generation's superstars. And make no mistake about it, superstars they are. Their track record speaks for itself. Over a dozen gold discs, two platinum discs (for sales in excess of two million copies each), a total of about 14 million record sales. They are proven concert drawcards and parallel the top acts in the world for attendance records and, in addition, have had considerable success in the field of

The Osmonds' first appearance was at a cousin's wedding. They sat on the tables for their performance and afterwards relatives threw money at them. During the early Sixties they made a round of appearances on the Andy Williams and Jerry Lewis T.V. Shows, co-starred in two T.V. shows - 'The Travels of Jamie McPheeters,' a series, and 'The Seven Little Boys,' a special - and made several personal appearance tours of Sweden and Japan, as well as many appearances throughout U.S.A. But, as well as this, they studied their craft and studied it well, learning all they could and becoming top-notch singers, dancers and musicians.

Although the Osmonds started their careers as singers they have become accomplished musicians, playing several instruments on stage as well as on their recordings. Alan, the eldest, has also become involved in production and now co-produces the group's material. Alan and brothers Wayne and Merrill have also developed their song-writing talents to the stage where a good deal of the group's record output now consists of their own compositions.

The group has now formed its own record label, called 'Kolob,' and with this move they plan to get involved with producing and writing for other artists as well as themselves.

Audience reaction to the Osmonds varies tremendously. In London recently they had the teeny-boppers stamping and screaming, yet they are also known to perform at adult night clubs, change their repertoire to a more sophisticated balance of ballads and standards and confidently await the polite handclapping at the end of each number.

Much can be said about the Osmonds – they are this new generation's equivalent of the Beatles, they bridge the generation gap, and they feature a solo superstar, as a member, in Donny. But most important, the Osmonds are not an overnight flash-in-the-pan success. They have worked long and hard for the success they have earned. Theirs is a success that seems destined to last.






