





THE SWEET-BOONE SHOW The Bowl came to life — the audience stood on their seats and clapped, danced or sang with the Sweet — everyone forgot their inhibitions and really enjoyed themselves . . . and one of the biggest controversies for quite a time was started. People swam across the lake, reached the bottom of the stage, climbed onto it and danced. Of course the show was condemned from many quarters, because of the noise (it was loud) and because of the swimming episode, but apart from these incidents the fact remains that this was definitely one of the best shows to ever play at the Bowl of Brooklands.

DANIEL BOONE WAS A MAN

The show opened with the Yandell Sisters, ABOVE. They managed to get their biggest crowd reaction (and their only applause) when they announced 'this is our last song.' Then came Daniel Boone. Though not a very big man, Boone walked tall onto the stage and very soon had the immense crowd at the Bowl singing along with him through his popular hit songs like 'Annabelle,' 'Beautiful Sunday' and "Daddy Don't You Walk So Fast.' Perhaps Boone was miscasted on what was basically a rock show, but he proved that he had a magnificent voice and was capable of turning on the older audience as well as some of the young ones through his





THE BOWL CONTROVERSY

The Sweet-Daniel Boone Show and the Lulu Show at the Bowl of Brooklands were undoubtedly the two most exciting shows to have played here this season. At both shows members of the audience swam the lake, thereby endangering themselves and disrupting the show. This lake is a danger. It has been treated with insecticide in an effort to kill the lake weed and as such is unfit to be consumed. Already people have been taken to hospital as a direct result of swimming in the lake. We at "Photo News" are concerned with the dangers of the lake swimming and in an effort to get clarification that something will be done about it, we spoke to Mr D. V. Sutherland, chairman of the Bowl of Brooklands Trust.

Photo News: "We at Photo News are concerned

about the dangerous situation that has developed with the lake swimming episodes at the Bowl. What measures do you think can be taken to prevent this?' Mr Sutherland: "I suppose that if this lake was a matter of only two or three feet deep with a sealed base, it wouldn't matter a great deal whether people went into the lake or not. But we who are associated with the Bowl know how dangerous this lake is. It has cables under the water, it has got snags, a heavy growth of weed, and the lake itself, in terms of pollution, is not very good water, so it is a very dangerous practice indeed to the swimmers themselves. And the point that I make is, how would anyone else feel in my position as chairman of the Trust, and Mayor of the City of New Plymouth, if they had to stand up after a concert and announce to the public, "We've had a wonderful night at the Bowl, it's been a tremendous success, and I'm sorry that a couple of lives were lost in the lake.' Photo News: "Can you give an assurance that some preventive measures will be taken regarding this?" Mr Sutherland: "If people want to be clowns over this sort of thing it's very difficult to stop them. We can only emphasise the danger and we are looking, as the result of this, at the possibility of re-arranging the seating to bring it much closer to the water's edge, so that we virtually have got no roadway and no space other than an aisle between the seating and the water's edge. Route the road for traffic and for pedestrians around the back of the seating. If we can do this to keep the people away from the water's edge I think

that this would be a great help."

Photo News: "There has been some publicity, over 'the past few weeks, to the effect that you would not allow any further pop or rock concerts at the Bowl. Can you clarify the position?"

Mr Sutherland: "Well, that of course is utter nonsense. It's purely a case of interpretation, and it has never been stated or intended by either myself or any member of the Trust that we would not continue to have pop and rock concerts in the Bowl. We've always endeavoured to make good pop and rock a part of our festival season. This question of 'Never Again,' which seem to be the two key words that have caused the trouble, were directed purely and simply at the conditions under which we let the Bowl.

Photo News: "I take it these conditions have now been altered?"

Mr Sutherland: "This is so right. We would never again let the Bowl under the same conditions that we rented it for the Sweet and Daniel Boone Show."

One point that is gratifying to see is that as a result of the publicity surrounding the aftermath of the Sweet-Boone Show, a large and enthusiastic crowd of young people turned up after the Lulu Show and thoroughly cleaned up the remaining debris.

Mr Sutherland commented "It was good to see so many new faces helping out and this gives us renewed faith in the Bowl project."





















Sticks and stones may break your bones . . . An old, but very true saying. In this instance substitute bottles and cans. And while they (bottles etc.) are a necessary part of every-day life, they weren't invented specifically as lethal weapons. Bottles, filled with petrol or other explosive

mixtures, have been (still are) used in warfare. They appear from time to time as weapons — broken and presenting jagged edges to the fore —

during gang clashes, mauls and so on.

They sometimes (far too often) mean serious injury – a permanent maiming of some innocent

young boy or girl.

Take your family, or go yourself, to almost any beach, to our magnificent and numerous parks and reserves, to just about anywhere that people congregate and look for broken glass.

Then imagine what would have happened if you – more specifically your family – inadvertently stood,

jumped or fell upon it.

A sermon? No, just a realistic discussion about a real problem.

Were you among the huge crowds at the Bowl of Brooklands for the Lulu, Daniel Boone and The Sweet concerts?

Were you aware of flying beer cans and beer and soft drink bottles?

Were you struck by any of the aerial ammunition fired by a few irresponsible types who, naturally, sat towards the back of the auditorium — for obvious reasons? Perhaps you were one of those who sat at the back!

Did you know that cans and bottles inflicted a number of cuts to the heads of patrons — people who, like everyone else, paid their admission to watch and enjoy the shows? One member of the audience at the Lulu concert had a number of stitches inserted in a head wound caused by a flying bottle. There were other injuries, too.

The barrage (an unfair use of word, perhaps, for the objects were undoubtedly thrown by a small minority of irresponsible types) was not confined to bottles and cans; lighted cigarettes flicked through the air as well.

A grass fire in the prevailing drought-like conditions would have created havoc and panic: and there's no telling what damage was actually inflicted to clothing and body by smouldering butts.

Great chunks of glass were found embedded in the jumping pit, too.

Think before you act, or jump. Next time, the injured — or maimed — party could be you.










