



















An American travel editor, whose syndicated travelcolumn reaches 14 million readers, considers that all the extravagant claims made for New Zealand's tourist attractions are true.

During his first trip to this country recently as a guest of the Tourist and Publicity Department, he found that NZ condenses 'a world of scenery'. He said it was easier to list what NZ didn't have than to continue describing its attractive features.

It didn't have deserts or wastelands, nor pollution and large crowds; and it should be considered a destination in its own right rather than just a stopover on the way to or from other places. On his return to the United States the writer said: 'If you think mine is just another voice adding to the praises of New Zealand, please withhold judgement until you can look into these extravagant claims yourself.

Taranaki is exceptionally well patronised by visitors for much of the year, but especially so at major holiday periods. The region is recognised as a family vacation area but there is a continuing improvement in tourist figures with awareness of our many attractions

As organisations such as the Taranaki Promotion Association gain even greater promotional impetus, so more visitors from within NZ and overseas will come here to savour and enjoy our wares. I know that we gained from the increase in off peak traffic from Australia (35.8 per cent) in the period April 1 to September 30, 1973.

Sutherland, commended Mr McCallum's lead and hoped that other areas of Taranaki would be willing to be associated with the 1976 celebrations. It would be an opportunity to demonstrate the strong provincial unity, he said.



This years Winter Show will be the last until new buildings on the Showgrounds site are ready for occupation.














New Cars By The Hundreds


